Mayor Behm asked that Mayor's Presentation On Spending Plan remain tabled.

Tuition Assistance For Paramedic Training Chief Bennett said one of the applicants for tuition assistance decided not to go to school now after all. This dropped our need by \$8,600. Our original request was for \$20,000. The second applicant is already a RN and will only require partial tuition. There is \$4,500 in grant money from the State EMS Board. Last fall, we asked for additional funding for a new recruit class of 8. We didn't get enough applicants, so some of that money is still available. This makes a total available of \$9,915. We will be short about \$1,485. Since we don't know the costs of books and lab fees, he rounded the \$1,485 up to \$2,000.

Bennett said part-time people go to school on their own time. There is no payroll involved. Upon completion of the classes, they owe us 3 years of service before the debt is relieved. The applicants are local. Hiring residents of the City reduces turnover. Both of the applicants are currently on the Civil Service Commission list. The RN scored 98%, but we can't hire this person since they don't have paramedic certification.

Helberg asked if one person dropped out due to the budget issue. Chief Bennett said the person decided not to go to school at this time because of personal reasons.

MEMORANDUM

The Tax Levy Law (R.C. 5705.01 to 5705.71) provides that each state subdivision must establish certain funds, including:

- (1) A general fund;
- (2) A sinking fund, whenever the subdivision has outstanding bonds other than serial bonds;
- (3) A bond retirement fund for the retirement of serial bonds, notes, or certificates of indebtedness;
- (4) A special fund for each special levy;
- (5) A special bond fund for each bond issue;
- (6) A special fund for each class of revenues derived from a source other than the general property tax, which the law requires to be used for a particular purpose;
- (7) A special fund for each public utility operated by a subdivision; and
- (8) A trust fund for any amount received by a subdivision in trust. See, R.C. 5705.09

In addition to the funds provided for by statute for state subdivisions, generally, statutes authorize the establishment of certain other subdivision funds. For example, a taxing authority of a subdivision, by resolution or ordinance, may establish:

- Reserve Balance Accounts, R.C. 5705.13(A).
- A Special Revenue Fund, R.C. 5705.13(B).
- A Capital Projects Fund, R.C. 5705.13(C).

Thus, municipalities are authorized to establish **reserve balance accounts** in the general fund for the purposes of stabilizing budgets against cyclical changes in revenues and expenditures, to provide for payments of claims under a self-insurance program, or to provide for payment of claims under a retrospective ratings plan for workers' compensation. See, RC 5705.13(A). Municipalities may also establish a **special revenue fund** for accumulating resources for paying, among other things, accumulated sick leave and vacation time. See, RC 5705.13(B). Municipalities may also establish a **capital projects fund** for the purpose of accumulating resources *for acquisition, construction, or improvement of fixed assets*. See, RC 5705.13(C).

A taxing authority of a subdivision, by resolution or ordinance, may establish a capital projects fund for the purpose of accumulating resources for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of fixed assets of the subdivision. More than one capital projects fund may be established and may exist at any time. The ordinance or resolution shall identify the source of the money to be used to acquire, construct, or improve the fixed assets identified in the resolution or ordinance, the amount of money to be accumulated for that purpose, the period of time over which that amount is to be accumulated, and the fixed assets that the taxing authority intends to acquire, construct, or improve with the money to be accumulated in the fund.

A taxing authority of a subdivision shall not accumulate money in a capital projects fund for more than ten years after the resolution or ordinance establishing the fund is adopted. If the subdivision has not entered into a contract for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of fixed assets for which money was accumulated in such a fund before the end of that ten-year period, the fiscal officer of the subdivision shall transfer all money in the fund to the fund or funds from which that money originally was transferred or the fund that originally was intended to receive the money.

A taxing authority of a subdivision, by resolution or ordinance, may rescind a capital projects fund. If a capital projects fund is rescinded, money that has accumulated in the fund shall be transferred to the fund or funds from which the money originally was transferred.

Notwithstanding sections 5705.14, 5705.15, and 5705.16 of the Revised Code, the taxing authority of a subdivision, by resolution or ordinance, may transfer money to the capital projects fund from any other fund of the subdivision that may lawfully be used for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, or improving the fixed assets identified in the resolution or ordinance.

Finally, the taxing authority of a subdivision may establish, with the approval of the Auditor of State, such other funds as are desirable and may provide, by ordinance or resolution, for the payment directly into such funds of money derived from specified sources other than the general property tax. The Auditor of State must consult with the Tax Commissioner before approving such other funds. See, R.C. 5705.12.

What Does This Mean?

It appears the City can set aside funds for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of fixed assets. While, this does not include the ability to pay down debt on existing projects this fund would allow the City to have money in reserves to pay for a portion of a project so less money would be subject to debt for the project. Additionally, the City currently has a "rainy day" fund whose funds could be used to pay down the debt on existing projects. This matter will be more fully discussed in the meeting.

Subject: Golf Course Revenue and Expense Report – June 2013

Per the request of City Council, I've attached a breakdown of revenue and expenses for the Golf Course. This report shows year to date data for 2013 and how it compares to figures for 2012.

As you will note, revenue in 2013 is up nearly \$15,000 from 2012 despite poor weather experienced in the month of April. We have seen increases in nearly all revenue categories including memberships, greens fees, cart fees, and concessions. We have instituted several promotions to boost play and believe that has helped overall sales. Beer sales have also given revenue a boost from previous years and should continue to provide steady revenue during our peak season. The golf course experienced only one minor flood event in May that reduced our operation to five holes of play for a three day period.

With regard to expenditures, we've made significant efforts to minimize expenses in all areas. We've adjusted our chemical applications to more of a curative approach rather than a preventative program to help reduce costs. We've minimized labor costs as much as possible without compromising the aesthetics of the course. We've eliminated professional services such as deep tine aerification. This is not normally an advisable omission in the overall agronomic program but we chose to temporarily suspend that practice for additional cost savings. Despite a reduction in our maintenance budget, the facility is in excellent playing condition.

Although there were some Capital Improvement items that were approved in this year's budget, we will only be making those expenditures if absolutely necessary. We opted to not replace any golf carts this season and will try and get another season out of the mower deck that was in the budget to replace. Currently, no expenses have been made out of the Capital Improvement fund.

As we move forward, our golf course staff will continue to be as efficient as possible with regard to expenditures. The staff in the clubhouse, together with the Golf Course Advisory Committee, will look for new ways to generate revenue and promote the course to increase play. The golf course will host two new scramble events (in addition to our regular events) which draw many non-member players and generate additional revenue. Our Junior Program, which began in early June and is held each Wednesday morning, has seen the most participation since its inception. There are 65 boys and girls participating this season. We've marketed the golf course utilizing special promotions, cross selling techniques, and partnering with local businesses through various forms of media (internet, radio, print, etc.) to stimulate additional business.

As part of the above referenced project, lawns have been re-seeded. In an effort to help insure that grass grows, the City of Napoleon's Engineering Department encourages homeowners to water their lawns.

If you choose to water your lawn, please contact us. We will notify the City of Napoleon's Utility Department and have your water/sewer bill credited. This is done by billing you for the number of units of water used in the corresponding month the year before. For example, if you get credit for your September 2013 bill, you will be billed for the number of units of water used based on what you used in September 2012. Although the water/sewer rate will be based on the 2013 rates, the amount used will be based on what you used in 2012.

Generally we credit water/sewer bills for two (2) or three (3) months, depending on when the seeding is done. We will credit water/sewer bills for the remainder of June, July and August.

In order to receive this credit, you must contact the City of Napoleon's Engineering Department. Also, if your lawn is not watered, the grass will NOT grow. If you seeded your own lawn, you are still eligible for the water/sewer credit.

Please water your lawn either before 9:00 a.m. or after 6:00 p.m. and contact us to receive your credit. If you have any other questions or require additional information, please contact us at your convenience.
