I spoke with Rex regarding the wetland issue and it sounds like it was never delineated when Cygnet Homes owned the property. He met with Mannik and Smith yesterday to discuss. They are drafting up a proposal with all cost related to determine if this indeed a jurisdictional wetland for the ACOE or an isolated wetland for the EPA. This proposal is being sent to the HCRW&SD on behalf of all the entities and the 5000+ customers. Also, sounded like the previous owner had a permit to move forward with the property but never did. They were going to purchase in the land bank and some onsite wetlands as part of the project.

Jon Bisher did hear back from the EPA today but they are still talking deliberating on what action they will require.

There were 2 areas of concern form the EPA. The first being the manganese and iron results from the pilot study. EPA is not real familiar with the treatment process for iron and manganese. They are familiar with the Bowling Green WTP and how they are trying to deal with these ores. There may have to be additional data collected for the treatment. Jon is meeting with the Director of Utilities for BG.

The other are of concern is the use of the Wauseon reservoir, or little use. The EPA was under the impression that Napoleon used the reservoir quite often. This is not the case. Additional testing may be required for this reservoir source as well but yet to be determined.

This is what is known to date and if anything further comes up it will be forwarded on.

SCHEDULE FOR SPRING SEASONAL PICK UP

April 28 through May 2, 2014

- The following General Rules and Regulations shall be effective for the April 28 May 2, 2014 Spring Seasonal Clean Up:
 - 1. MATERIALS MUST BE IN CONTAINERS AND KEPT DRY.
 - 2. NO CONTAINERS LARGER THAN THIRTY (30) GALLONS, OR WEIGHING MORE THAN 50 LBS.
 - 3. ALL UNMARKED CONTAINERS WILL BE CONSIDERED AS LEFT FOR DISPOSAL.
 - 4. ALL MATERIAL MUST BE COVERED DURING RAIN OR STRONG WIND TO AVOID WETNESS AND BLOWING.
 - 5. <u>ALL BUILDING MATERIAL SHALL NOT BE LARGER THAN FOUR FEET (4') IN LENGTH AND THREE FEET (3')</u> <u>WIDE . ALL LOOSE ITEMS MUST BE BOXED OR BAGGED. THE WEIGHT OF SUCH CONTAINERS SHALL NOT</u> <u>EXCEED 50 LBS. CARPETING OR PADDING SHALL BE IN ROLLS NO WIDER THAN FOUR FEET (4') AND TIED</u> <u>WITH A CORD.</u>
 - 6. NO MATERIAL SHALL CONTAIN NAILS THAT HAVE NOT BEEN BENT OVER.
 - 7. IT IS PROHIBITED TO HAVE ROCKS, BRICKS, CONCRETE BLOCKS OR PLASTER WEIGHING IN EXCESS OF 50 LBS.
 - 8. IT IS PROHIBITED TO MIX REGULARLY SCHEDULED REFUSE WITH MATERIAL SCHEDULED FOR THIS PICK UP
 - 9. IT IS PROHIBITED TO PLACE FOR PICKUP BRUSH, LIMBS, OR OTHER YARD WASTE MATERIAL.
 - 10. IT IS PROHIBITED TO PLACE FOR PICK UP LIQUID WASTE, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO: PAINT, HOUSEHOLD CHEMICALS, USED MOTOR OIL, ANTIFREEZE, AND TAR. HOUSEHOLD CHEMICAL CONTAINERS AND PESTICIDES MUST BE RINSED PRIOR TO PLACEMENT FOR PICKUP AND WHEN APPLICABLE, IN ACCORDANCE WITH PRODUCT LABELING INSTRUCTIONS (TRIPLE RINSE FOR PESTICIDES).
 - 11. PAINT CANS OR TAR BUCKETS MUST HAVE THE LIDS REMOVED AND REMAINING PAINT OR TAR COMPLETELY DRY. PAINT WILL BE ACCEPTED IN THE FOLLOWING WAYS: (i) WOOD OR CARDBOARD MAY BE PAINTED TO USE UP THE REMAINING PAINT; OR, (ii) CAT LITTER OR FLOOR DRY MAY BE USED TO MAKE THE PAINT A THICK PASTE; THEREAFTER, SO LONG AS THE CONTAINER IS DRY, THE MATERIAL MAY BE INCLUDED FOR PICKUP.
 - 12. ALL REFRIGERATORS AND/OR FREEZERS MUST HAVE THE DOORS REMOVED AND THE CONTENTS EMPTIED PRIOR TO PLACEMENT FOR PICKUP.
 - 13. WHITEWARE SHALL BE TAGGED IN ACCORDANCE WITH APPROVED TAGS AND AMOUNTS AS ESTABLISHED BY THE CITY. TAGS FOR REFRIGERATORS AND/OR FREEZERS MUST BE ON THE UNIT AND NOT ON THE REMOVED DOOR.
 - 14. ANY ITEMS NOT PROPERLY TAGGED OR PLACED FOR PICKUP, IN A MANNER THAT APPEARS TO BE INTENDED FOR PICKUP, SHALL BE DEEMED AUTHORIZED BY PICKUP AND WILL BE TREATED BY THE CITY AS A "SPECIAL PICKUP" WITH CHARGES BEING ACCORDINGLY ASSESSED.
 - 15. MATERIAL OR OTHER ITEMS PLACED FOR PICK UP SHALL BE AT THE CURB NO MORE THAN FIVE (5) DAYS IN ADVANCE OF THE SUBSCRIBER'S SCHEDULED SEASONAL PICK UP DAY. ITEMS PLACED AT THE CURB EARLIER THAN FIVE (5) DAYS IN ADVANCE OF THE SCHEDULED PICK UP DAY WILL BE TREATED BY THE CITY AS A "SPECIAL PICKUP" WITH CHARGES BEING ASSESSED TO THE SUBSCRIBER OR PERSON RESPONSIBLE FOR PLACEMENT.

The City shall require the use of City *Refuse Tags* to cover the disposal cost of the following items:

1. Whiteware with Freon	5 tags
2. Air Conditioner	5 tags
3. Passenger Car Tire	1 tag
4. Semi-Truck Tire	4 tags
5. Tractor Tire	6 tags

The City of Napoleon, in cooperation with Zack's Recycling, will again accept used <u>computers, printers, and keyboards</u> as part of this year's "spring seasonal clean up". Please set the equipment out apart from your regular material. A separate truck, which picks up recyclable materials, will stop and collect the electronics for proper recycling. <u>Monitors are to be placed with</u> regular pick up items.

ALL RULES AND REGULATIONS, ALONG WITH ANY ACCESSED CHARGES, WILL BE ENFORCED. All materials are to be at the curb by 7:00 a.m. the morning of your pick up. Return trips will not be made for items set out late.

May natural gas prices ended the week up \$0.09/MMBtu from last week to finish trading yesterday at \$4.74/MMBtu. 2015 on-peak electric prices rose \$0.23/MWh for the week with AD Hub closing at \$44.47/MWh.

Trends in Sustainability

The Obama Administration's goal of reducing GHG emissions by 17 percent below 2005 emission levels by 2020 could be severely hampered by the announced early closure of a number of large nuclear power plants, primarily for economic reasons. Regulatory uncertainty, costly mechanical repairs, and low natural gas prices have all contributed to the decisions by nuclear plant owners to retire their plants before their licenses expire, forego costly refurbishments, or cancel major expansions. *PO-LITICO* reported in March that Exelon Corp. in particular – the nation's largest nuclear operator – is facing some difficult decisions regarding its six nuclear plants in Illinois, each of which failed to make a profit in the last five years, according to the *Chicago Tribune*.

Not long ago, the U.S. nuclear industry was looking at a renaissance prompted by a carbon-constrained economy and promising new modular designs that would result in streamlined permitting and licensing and lower costs for power. Instead, Cap and Trade legislation failed and cheap natural gas made even lower-cost nuclear uneconomic. The nuclear industry also points to competitive wholesale electric markets in various regions that are currently pricing nuclear generation out of the market.

In 2013, Southern California Edison decided to close its 2,150 MW San Onofre station. For some in the environmental community, the outcome provided conflicting results. California regulators last month approved replacing 1,500 MW of San Onofre's power – with 600 MW coming from renewables and energy efficiency and up to 900 MW from natural gas, creating a net increase in carbon emissions.

Municipal electric systems assess vulnerability to Heartbleed

Cybersecurity is back in the spotlight with the Heartbleed bug being publically disclosed earlier this month. The vulnerability lies with the encryption library known as OpenSSL, which is widely used in web and email servers, network infrastructure, VPN gateways and embedded devices. According to Internet research firm, Netcraft, about 500,000 sites have been affected.

AMP, along with organizations such as the American Public Power Association (APPA) and the North American Electric Reliability Corp. (NERC), is working to develop solutions for utilities to protect against vulnerability. The Electricity Sector Information Sharing and Analysis Center (ES-ISAC) issued an industry advisory on April 11 related to Heartbleed.

AMP recommends the follow actions for systems regarding Heartbleed:

- Thoroughly assess the products that rely on the OpenSSL library
- Contact vendors and have product version numbers available to see if the product is vulnerable
- Use testing tools available online (remember that some of these could potentially expose confidential information if vulnerable)
- Use Metasploit or Chromebleed tool for checking websites
- Check DMZ systems and web servers facing the public Internet
- If systems are vulnerable, they should be disconnected until patched
- Cover user systems and mobile devices (lower risk) Android most exposable
- Change passwords on the websites that were vulnerable

Longer-term prices continue to rise

After several consecutive weeks of smaller than expected injections of natural gas into storage, this week's storage number finally came in slightly above forecast. This news was enough to help send next month's natural gas prices slightly lower.

May natural gas prices ended the week down \$0.04/MMBtu from last week to finish trading yesterday at \$4.70/MMBtu. June natural gas prices are currently trading just \$0.02/MMBtu higher than May finishing yesterday at \$4.72/MMBtu.

This news was not enough to overcome the concerns about how far storage levels are below normal (48 percent below last year's levels). This has caused future prices to continue to climb. 2015 on-peak electric prices rose \$1.14/MWh for the week with AD Hub closing at \$45.61/MWh. These prices are up over \$4.00/MWh or 10 percent from this time in March.

AFEC weekly update

Lower loads due to mild weather led to AFEC seeing varied production this week. On April 18 the plant was online all day, seeing base maximum production during the morning hours. The plant was then dispatched offline for the entire weekend and returned Monday morning.

Weekdays this week saw the plant operating at base max for most of the daytime hours, but dispatched offline during the overnight hours (with the exception of the plant staying online Wednesday night into Thursday morning). Duct burners were only used nine hours this week, on Wednesday and Thursday. The plant ended the week with a 43 percent load factor (based on 675 MW).
