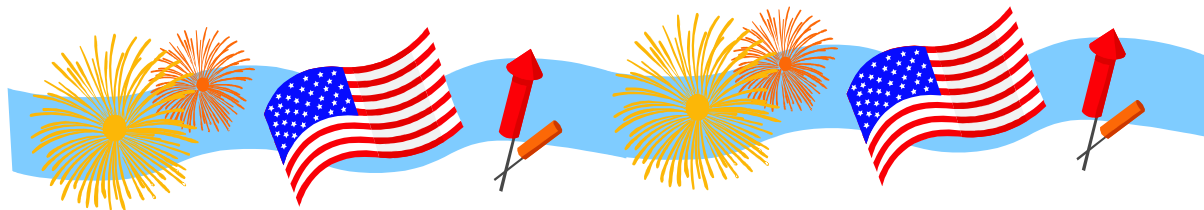
4TH OF JULY REFUSE & RECYCLING ROUTES

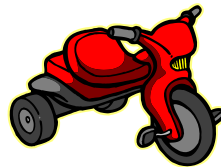

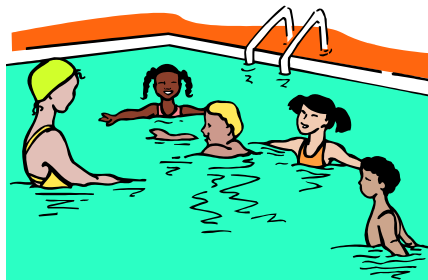

Energy prices dip despite the heat

Energy prices closed lower this week as natural gas storage numbers came in higher than normal. The amount of natural gas in storage has been slowly closing the deficit to historic amounts but still sits 33 percent below the five-year average. This slow but steady chipping away at the deficit has led to a drop in both natural gas and power prices.

July natural gas ended the week \$0.18 lower than last week ending the week at \$4.58/MMBtu. 2015 on-peak electric prices fell \$0.68/MWh from last week with AD Hub closing at \$47.19/MWh.

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AFEC weekly update

A combination of hot and cold weather led to the plant being dispatched online some days and not on others. Cooler weather last weekend resulted in the plant being dispatched offline Friday through Sunday. Hotter weather caused the plant to then come online Monday morning and operate at base maximum levels during the on-peak hours. The plant was dispatched offline Monday night, but then returned Tuesday morning.

The rest of the week the plant operated at base maximum levels during the day and base minimum levels during the overnight hours. Duct burners were used six hours this week during the Wednesday evening peak due to robust prices during that time. The plant ended the week with a load factor of 32 percent (based on a plant rating of 675 MW).

Barge carries stators, distributors to Smithland hydro project

Earlier this week, Voith Hydro shipped three stators and three distributors from its plant in Hannibal, Ohio, to AMP's Smithland hydroelectric project, located about 62 river miles upstream of the confluence of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers in Livingston County, Kentucky.

Smithland is the last of AMP's four projects under construction on the Ohio River to receive its shipment of rotors and distributors. When the four projects are completed, they will add more than 300 megawatts (MW) of new renewable generation to the region and represents the largest deployment of new run-of-the-river hydro in the nation.

Manufactured by Voith Hydro, the stators and distributors are key components in the 72-MW Smithland project. The stators are more than nine meters in diameter and weigh in at 165 metric tons.

APPA approves two AMP-and OMEA-sponsored resolutions

AMP and OMEA sponsored two of the resolutions that were approved by American Public Power Association (APPA) members at the 2014 National Conference this past week – Resolution 14-03: In Opposition to Sequestration of Direct Payment Bond Payments, and Resolution 14-05: In Support of Improving the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Hydropower Practices; and co-sponsored Resolution 14-07: In Support of Reforming the Centralized Capacity Markets Operated by Regional Transmission Organizations.

There were nine resolutions that were formally adopted by the APPA Legislative and Resolutions (L&R) Committee during the 2014 APPA L&R Rally in March. In addition to the nine resolutions, APPA member utilities also approved two new policy resolutions at the National Conference on June 17, one supporting municipal broadband services and the other opposing a proposed rule on waters of the U.S.

The resolution on municipal broadband urges Congress

to “state in clear and unequivocal language that it supports the ability of local governments, including public power utilities, to provide advanced communications services that meet essential community needs and promote economic development and regional and global competitiveness.”

The resolution opposing a proposed rule by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Army Corps of Engineers states that the redefinition of U.S. waters under the Clean Water Act “represents a significant expansion of the historical scope of federal jurisdiction.” APPA's resolution calls on the agencies to suspend consideration of the proposed rule and the association's willingness to help create a rule that adds clarity and certainty to the Clean Water Act while respecting local needs and solutions.

Public Power Certification Training Program session overview:

1. Electric Utility 101: An American Public Power Association (APPA) representative will instruct this session, which will cover the basics of electric system generation, transmission, distribution workings, as well as an explanation of the different types of electric providers. Electricity is mysterious to most lay people and some of the popular expectations about the changing industry are not based on a sound understanding of the technical and operating principles that make it possible for utilities to deliver electricity to customers when and where they need it. This session will help clear up some of these mysteries.
2. Electric Utility Governance: Also led by an APPA representative, this session will present an overview of public power governance and best practices throughout the nation and will be instructed by an APPA representative. Topics covered will include: how public power is governed; the duties, responsibilities and legal obligations of public power governing boards; strategic issues facing public power and governing boards; rate making for utility boards and city councils; strategic planning for utility boards and city councils; and performance monitoring and accountability for boards.
3. AMP Organizational Overview: This session will be led by AMP officials and will provide an overview of the reasons municipal electric systems joined together to form AMP, as well as the benefits of joint action, AMP's structure, management, and services, and ways to be involved.
4. Power Supply Overview: This session will be led by AMP officials and will focus on power supply considerations specifically tailored to AMP members. It will include an explanation of regional transmission organizations, transmission, capacity and energy markets, long term power supply planning, and generation project development.
5. Financial: This session will be led by AMP officials and will include an explanation of the AMP service fee structure, credit scoring program, project financing, on-behalf-of financing, billing and other topical issues.
6. Legislative/Regulatory: This session will be led by AMP and OMEA officials and will discuss the key issues of concern to public power, explain AMP/OMEA efforts and the importance of grassroots involvement.

In order to earn the AMP Public Power Certification, participants must complete all six webinars. Each session will last approximately one hour. The live sessions will be recorded and available for viewing following the session. Individuals can either participate in the live webinar or view the recording to receive credit for the session. Participation is limited to elected/appointed officials from AMP member communities.
