Weygandt honored with AMP DNA Award

Today I had the pleasure of presenting the 2018 AMP DNA Award to Kyle Weygandt, director of member safety.

I initiated the annual DNA award in 2008 to recognize an employee who advances AMP's vision and mission - to be public power's leader in wholesale energy supply and value-added member services, and to provide members with the benefits of scale and expertise in providing and managing energy services, respectfully.

AMP, four others acquire majority of Hometown Connections International

Effective June 1, AMP and four other joint action organizations purchased a majority of the Hometown Connections International (HCI) assets from the American Public Power Association (APPA). This joint investment will undoubtedly provide further benefit to AMP members and their customers.

The exploration and negotiation of the opportunity to invest in HCI was authorized by the AMP Board of Trustees in early 2017, with final approval granted in April 2018 after considerable due diligence. Much of the decision for this investment was based on AMP's historic experience and involvement with HCI, as well as the role we see for the organization to help public power leverage greater economies of scale to meet the challenges of our rapidly evolving industry.

AMP became a marketing affiliate of HCI in February 2000 and transitioned to a sales affiliate role two years later. Since then, 95 AMP members across seven of our footprint states have had 210 buying experiences with products and services through HCI. AMP has been recognized as the HCI sales affiliate of the year three times.

The structure of the new organization enables additional public power joint action membership in the future and the APPA maintains a seat on the Board of Directors of the new Hometown Connections. Among new services that HCI will offer is the advanced metering program developed by AMP, which, as a result of significant economies of scale, should materially lower AMP's costs to provide this service to our members.

At a time when AMP and our members are addressing and embracing the "new norms" in our industry, this venture will provide a stronger engine and the ability to implement bigger strategies.

DEED Grant awarded to AMP for development of a Public Power Electric Vehicle Toolkit

AMP's Public Power Electric Vehicle (EV) Toolkit was one of 11 projects selected by the American Public Power Association (APPA) DEED Board of Directors for their spring round of grants. Additional information about the DEED program is available [here](#).



This project is designed to identify opportunities and mitigate challenges faced by our 135 member communities. AMP will partner with the Smart Electric Power Alliance (SEPA), to develop a Public Power EV Planning Toolkit and accompanying guidebook. These resources will allow members to:

1. conduct preliminary economic analyses assessing municipal EV fleet options; and
2. identify potential budgetary impacts of increased residential EV adoption.

It will be developed in Microsoft Excel to ensure widespread compatibility among public power utilities. Default values for key assumptions will be incorporated into the toolkit while also allowing users to tailor assumptions to their specific service territory.

In evaluating the potential economic impacts to municipal utilities from customer EV adoption, three specific use cases will be considered:

1. Fixed rate tariff - A fixed, or flat-rate tariff representative of a typical residential rate structure will serve as the default and baseline;
2. TOU tariff - A generic time-of-use (TOU) tariff and the associated impacts on customer EV charging behavior will be included; and
3. EV managed charging - A utility-implemented EV managed charging option will be incorporated to help quantify potential benefits including avoided transmission and capacity charges, and delayed or avoided distribution upgrades driven by higher penetration rates of residential EVs.

AMP expects to kick-off the project this July with a completion date scheduled for March 2019.

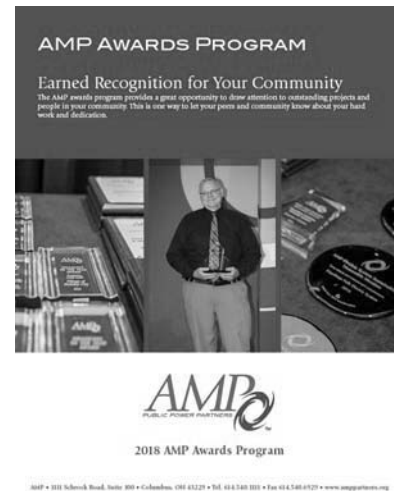
Seeking nominations: 2018 AMP Awards Program

May 2018: Record warm temperatures continue run of high prices

After this April finished as one of the coldest ever, May ended at the top of the record book as the warmest ever. All 31 days of the month saw above normal temperatures in Columbus, Ohio. Although May's 7x24 prices were even with April, 5x16 prices averaged \$3.50/MWh higher. The highest hourly day-ahead price for the month was on May 31 at \$116/MWh in AEP and \$147/MWh in ATSI. The PPL zone's highest day-ahead price was \$77/MWh on May 29. Real-time prices were much higher and exceeded \$100/MWh for 48 hours in ATSI. The high real-time price was on May 29, with a max of \$328/MWh in AEP and \$564/MWh in ATSI. On the other side, the PJM system saw a low real-time price of -\$173/MWh in the PPL zone on the morning of Memorial Day.

Energy markets update

The July 2018 natural gas contract increased \$0.034/MMBtu to close at \$2.93 yesterday. The EIA reported an injection of 92 Bcf for the week ending June 1, which was slightly above market expectations of 90 Bcf. Gas in storage now stands at 1,817 Bcf. This is 22 percent under the five-year average of 2,329 Bcf.

On-peak power prices for 2018 at AD Hub closed yesterday at \$35.59/MWh which was \$.19/MWh lower for the week.

The AMP Fremont Energy Center was available for 2x1 operation for the week. The plant was online last Saturday and during the peak hours on Sunday. PJM dispatched the plant offline Sunday morning, due to low loads and prices. The plant cycled offline again Monday morning and then remained on for the balance of the week. PJM cleared the plant offline Thursday HE 2 through HE 5 in their day-ahead market clear, but the plant remained online during real-time operation. Duct firing operated for 91 hours this week. The plant generated at a 73 percent capacity factor (based on 675 MW rating).

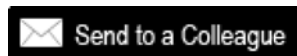

**CALL TO ACTION:
TESTIMONY NEEDED FOR BILL LEVELING
PLAYING FIELD FOR LOCAL TAX COLLECTION**

Next Tuesday, the House Ways and Means Committee will hold a second hearing for proponent, opponent and interested party testimony on HB 571. This bill, sponsored by Rep. Greenspan (R - Westlake), requires all entities selling hotel accommodations to remit the tax they already collect at the full rate for the price the consumer pays for the room.

Currently, Online Travel Agencies (OTAs) are collecting tax on the full rate a consumer pays for a hotel room they book through the OTA online. However, the OTA is not remitting that full tax to the local governments. This results in a loss of millions of dollars for Ohio's municipalities. It is important to make clear that this bill is in no way creating a new tax, nor is it increasing the price a consumer will have to pay for a hotel room when they book through an OTA. The price the consumer currently pays already

includes full tax on the full price. The issue lies with the OTA, who is not remitting that tax to the local governments.

HB 571 will guarantee fairness by ensuring OTAs must remit the full tax they are currently collecting. It will protect local governments and Ohio's travel economy from being denied the taxes they are rightfully owed. HB 571 has the potential to generate millions of dollars in revenue for Ohio's local governments without creating any new tax.

The League is encouraging our members to come to the Statehouse to express their support for this legislation. The hearing will be held at **10am** in the **House Ways and Means Committee** in **Room 121** on **Tuesday, June 19th**. HOUSE COMMITTEE CONTINUES HEARINGS ON URBAN BLIGHT LEGISLATION

This week, the House State and Local Government Committee held a second hearing on a bill that would help municipal officials deal with urban blight within their jurisdictions. HB 633, sponsored by Rep. Boggs (D - Columbus) and Rep. Miller (D - Columbus), would prohibit individuals who own or control private property in municipal corporations from depositing litter on that property.

During its second hearing before the House State and Local Government Committee, proponents testified to the importance of this bill stating that it grants municipalities another tool with which to address urban blight and closes a loophole in current Ohio law that prevents municipalities from targeting litter on private properties. Two Columbus residents in the Hilltop area, both supporters of the bill, testified as to how the bill could help address environmental and public health issues within their neighborhood, as urban blight has demonstrably created substantial sanitation issues where they live. SMALL CELL INFRASTRUCTURE DEPLOYMENT TRAINING WEBINAR

We want to alert our members to an upcoming webinar hosted by the Ohio Municipal League and the Ohio Municipal Attorneys Association titled "Small Cell Wireless Service & Placement of Facilities in the Public Way" on June 21st from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. The program, which will be a discussion of the new law, will be presented by Gregory J. Dunn from Ice Miller law firm who was instrumental in the development of the language adopted by the legislature. Mr. Dunn has represented municipal and telecommunication clients for over 33 years and has a comprehensive understanding up public utility and broadband issues.

This webinar is an important opportunity to learn about HB 478, legislation recently passed by the Ohio General Assembly that sets guidelines for the deployment of small cell infrastructure in municipal public right of ways. The legislation becomes effective August 1, 2018 and it is important municipal leaders are familiar with the changes and

actions local leaders will need to consider in the interest of managing future requests by telecommunication providers and the anticipated increase in installation applications.

COMMITTEE RECAP: BILLS OF MUNICIPAL INTEREST

This week, both legislative chambers cancelled session and by proxy, all but one committee cancelled their hearings. The full Legislature should resume its normal calendar next week. Here are the bills of municipal interest that received committee hearings this week:

- SB 239 - REGIONAL COUNCILS OF GOVERNMENT. Sponsored by Sen. Dolan (R - Chagrin Falls), the bill would modify the law concerning regional councils of governments. During its first hearing before the House State and Local Government Committee, the bill's sponsor explained that the bill is designed to facilitate further transparency for regional COGs. The League is supportive of this legislation.
- HB 662 - IMMIGRATION LAWS. Sponsored by Rep. Howse (D - Cleveland) and Rep. Ramos (D - Lorain), would clarify a municipal corporation's authority to enact policies to effectively allocate its resources in order to satisfy municipal law enforcement needs and comply with federal immigration laws as appropriate. During its first hearing before the House State and Local Government Committee, the bill's sponsor explained that the bill allows local governments to dictate how local law enforcement and its resources are deployed without requiring them to comply with federal immigrations policies that political subdivisions deem will be harmful to their local communities or businesses. The League is still reviewing this bill.
- HB 664 - NALOXONE USE. Sponsored by Rep. Ramos (D - Lorain), would cease payments to a subdivision that materially hinders or prevents its personnel from carrying and using naloxone. During its first hearing before the House State and Local Government Committee, the bill's sponsor explained that the bill targets local governments that don't allow first responders to carry naloxone or that restrict whether or not a first responder can administer naloxone if an individual has had a certain number of prior overdoses. The League is still reviewing this bill.
- HB 670 - MUNICIPAL TAXES. Sponsored by Rep. Barnes (D - Cleveland), would enact the "Simplified Alternative Withholding Tax Compliance Act" authorizing an employer to enter into an agreement with a municipal tax administrator to prescribe, subject to certain parameters, the portion of nonresident employee wages that will be subject to the municipal corporation's income tax. During its first hearing before the House State and Local Government Committee, the bill's sponsor explained that the bill would let a small business work out an allocation schedule with a municipal taxing authority at the discretion of the tax administrator. The League is still reviewing this bill.

Portman and Johnson raise awareness for hydro-reform

Senator Rob Portman (R-OH) and Congressman Bill Johnson (R-OH) both spoke up this week urging FERC to reform the hydro-permitting processes. The Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee held a FERC oversight hearing with all five commissioners present that was mostly a discussion about retirements of coal and nuclear plants. Sen. Portman specifically referenced AMP and our permitting experience when he asked the commissioners about the FAST-Act.



A few days earlier at a hearing in the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee on Energy, Rep. Johnson expressed AMP's concerns to FERC commissioners about the unpredictability of the permitting process when adding hydropower to a federal dam. He said, "for instance, we've heard the Corps might provide a different water quality standard than FERC late in the permitting process, which can significantly affect the financial viability of a hydro project."



On Sept. 7, 2017, Marc Gerken, president/CEO, testified before the U.S. Senate Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee Permanent Subcommittee on Investigations regarding oversight of federal infrastructure permitting. His testimony can be viewed [here](#).
