you going to establish the goal, is it a certain amount or is it a number? O'Boyle replied the unencumbered balance is a cash carry-in. Maassel cited as an example let's say the goal is one million dollars for the wastewater plant and we lose a major piece of infrastructure during the year and if our goal is to always have a million dollars in there and we have to go below that because we have to have this one-time thing, are we breaking our policy and giving ourselves a ding on the audit. O'Boyle said this will not be tied to the reserve policy that we will bring up later. When department budgets are done the goal is to try to have them stay within that revenue, the appropriation of their budget, to not use the unencumbered balance for on-going operations so if there is an emergency, that is exactly what that cash balance would be used for. Maassel asked if it is used for an emergency how does the money get back in? O'Boyle said there would have to be more revenue or less budget next year or raising fees depending on the fund.

O'Boyle stated, the Capital fund should be items that are capitalized. The fixed assets limit is \$7,500 and sometimes there are items less than that in the capital fund. We would like this referred to the Finance and Budget Committee for their October 28, 2019 meeting. At the Finance and Budget Committee meeting on October 28, 2019, we'll talk about the split of the income tax for the general fund and capital. Maassel said can you do a budget in ten days if you don't have that split? Sheaffer said my opposition is not to having a wellness plan, it should not be the organization's place to tell employees you have to go to the doctor that should be their decision as a person, not to the effect of \$600 a year I could see if it was a one- time \$50 charge. Bialorucki pointed out in the future he would like to see a reward for going to the doctor instead of a surcharge for not getting your wellness check done, it could equal the same thing. Sheaffer chimed in it is much easier to attract with a reward. Mazur said there is a reward, those who get their wellness check receive a \$50 gift card. Chapman and Chapman recommended the monetary penalty to drive participation, if we don't hit the 75% mark, we don't get the 1% credit. Lambert stressed of all entities we had the highest participation rate in the wellness, we had 98%. Sheaffer noted I would like to see rates go up 1% and if you get your wellness check you get the \$50 monthly discount, with the goal of rewarding. There should be enough participation to take it back down to 1%. Mazur said to clarify, you want the premiums raised across the board and offer an incentive that way. ## AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CITY INCOME TAX CODE, SECTION 194.03 DEFINITIONS, TO ADOPT SECTIONS 718.01(YY) AND 718.01(ZZ) OF THE OHIO REVISED CODE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

**WHEREAS,** House Bill (H.B.) 166 of the 133<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly, the State's operating appropriations and tax levy bill, includes an amendment by addition of two definitions added to Chapter 718, Municipal Income Taxes, R.C. Section 718.01 regarding supplemental executive retirement plan (SERP) exemptions; and,

**WHEREAS**, Section 757.220 of H.B. 166 makes clear that the amendment by this act of section 718.01 of the Revised Code applies to municipal taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2020; and,

**WHEREAS,** the relevant income tax definitions added to R.C. 718.01 include a definition for "Pension" and one for "Retirement Benefit Plan;" and,

**WHEREAS,** in recognition of the above-listed changes and with a desire to keep the City's Municipal Income Tax Code up to date the City intends to add the two new definitions contained in R.C. 718.01 to the City's Municipal Income Tax Code. **Now Therefore,** 

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, section 194.03 of Chapter 194 of the Codified Ordinances of the City shall hereby be amended to add the following definitions for tax years starting on or after January 1, 2020:

"Pension" means a retirement benefit plan, regardless of whether the plan satisfies the qualifications described under section 401(a) of the Internal Revenue Code, including amounts that are taxable under the "Federal Insurance Contributions Act," Chapter 21 of the Internal Revenue Code, excluding employee contributions and elective deferrals, and regardless of whether such amounts are paid in the same taxable year in which the amounts are included in the employee's wages, as defined by section 3121(a) of the Internal Revenue Code.

"Retirement benefit plan" means an arrangement whereby an entity provides benefits to individuals either on or after their termination of service because of retirement or disability. "Retirement benefit plan" does not include wage continuation payments, severance payments, or payments made for accrued personal or vacation time.

Section 2. That, the definition for "Pension" currently contained in Chapter 194 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio remains in full force and effect for all taxable years prior to 2020.

Section 3. That, Chapter 193 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio remains in full force and effect for all taxable years prior to 2016.

Section 4. That, the Council hereby finds that this Ordinance was deliberated upon and passed in open meetings in compliance with Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 5. That, this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, such necessity arising from the City's need to effectively manage and control municipal income taxes, and therefore this Ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

WHEREAS, the Health Care Cost Committee has recommended to City Council to approve a surcharge to City of Napoleon employees' health insurance premiums as follows: to add a fifty dollar (\$50.00) monthly surcharge to employees' health insurance premiums starting December 1, 2019 to employees that do not complete a wellness check, and also to employees' health insurance premiums whose spouse does not complete a wellness check as appropriate, by a licensed physician prior to November 30, 2019. Further, employees and spouses that complete the wellness check during the dates of December 1, 2018 through November 30, 2019 and turn in the Preventative Care Physician form by November 30, 2019, will not be assessed a surcharge to the employee's insurance premium. New employees will be afforded an opportunity to get a wellness check in their first year prior to being assessed a surcharge; and,

**WHEREAS**, there was no recommendation to change the health plan in the year 2019 regarding the out-of-pocket in network deductible currently; **Now Therefore**,

# BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, upon recommendation of the Health Care Committee, in and for the year 2019, this Council approves amending Resolution No. 012-18, approving a fifty dollar (\$50.00) monthly surcharge to employees' health insurance premiums starting December 1, 2019 to employees that do not complete a wellness check and also to employees' health insurance premiums whose spouse does not complete a wellness check as appropriate, by a licensed physician prior to November 30, 2019. Further, employees and spouses that complete the wellness check during the dates of December 1, 2018 through November 30, 2019 and turn in the Preventative Care Physician form by November 30, 2019, will not be assessed a surcharge to the employee's insurance premium. ## AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A REVISED COMPREHENSIVE PLAN WITH THOROUGHFARE PLAN PROVISIONS IN AND FOR THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:**

That, the revised "Comprehensive Plan," currently on file with the City Finance Director, being the Master Plan with Thoroughfare Plan provisions, consisting of maps of the City, charts and diagrams showing proposed additions to and improvements of the City streets, parks, public buildings, sewage disposal systems, water system and other systems; and, referencing rules and regulations related to street construction and paving; the planning and zoning code; the subdivision regulations; the flood plain regulations, as well as other referenced codes and programs, is hereby adopted.

Section 2. That, any reference to the official plan as described in Section 1 of this Ordinance shall be taken to mean and include all of the items listed or referenced in Section 1 of this Ordinance as now enacted or later amended.

That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 6. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. Further,

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 061-19**

## AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 301 – DEFINITIONS AND ENACTING CHAPTER 343– OPERATION OF LOW-SPEED VEHICLES, UNDER-SPEED VEHICLES, UTILITY VEHICLES, OR MINI-TRUCKS, RELATIVE TO THE TRAFFIC CODE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, in recognition of the increased trend of personal use of golf carts and other similar low or under-speed vehicles on City streets, Council seeks to clarify the legality of golf carts and other low or under-speed vehicles on City streets; and,

**WHEREAS**, in 2017, R.C. 4511.215 took effect providing that a local authority may authorize the operation of certain low or under-speed vehicles, including golf carts, on streets within its jurisdiction; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Napoleon seeks to allow the operation of low or under-speed vehicles, including golf carts, within its jurisdiction. Now Therefore,

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That, the following definitions be added to Chapter 301 - DEFINITIONS:

"*Under-speed vehicle*" means a three- or four-wheeled vehicle, including a vehicle commonly known as a golf cart, with an attainable speed on a paved level surface of not more than twenty miles per hour and with a gross vehicle weight rating less than three thousand pounds

"*Low-speed vehicle*" means a three- or four-wheeled motor vehicle with an attainable speed in one mile on a paved level surface of more than twenty miles per hour but not more than twenty-five miles per hour and with a gross vehicle weight rating less than three thousand pounds.

"*Mini-truck*" means a vehicle that has four wheels, is propelled by an electric motor with a rated power of seven thousand five hundred watts or less or an internal combustion engine with a piston displacement capacity of six hundred sixty cubic centimeters or less, has a total dry weight of nine hundred to two thousand two hundred pounds, contains an enclosed cabin and a seat for the vehicle operator, resembles a pickup truck or van with a cargo area or bed located at the rear of the vehicle, and was not originally manufactured to meet federal motor vehicle safety standards.

"*Utility vehicle*" means a self-propelled vehicle designed with a bed, principally for the purpose of transporting material or cargo in connection with construction, agricultural, forestry, grounds maintenance, lawn and garden, materials handling, or similar activities.

Section 2. That, Chapter 343 – Operation of Low-Speed Vehicles, Under-Speed Vehicles, Utility Vehicles, or Mini-Trucks, is hereby enacted as follows:

## 343.01 – OPERATION RESTRICTED FOR LOW-SPEED VEHICLES, UNDER-SPEED VEHICLES, UTILITY VEHICLES, AND MINI-TRUCKS

- (A) No person shall operate a low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a mini-truck upon any street or highway within the City except upon a street or highway having an established speed limit of thirty-five (35) miles per hour or below. A low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a mini-truck will be permitted to cross intersections with higher speeds, so long as they remain on a street that has a posted speed limit of thirty-five (35) mph or below.
- (B) Notwithstanding Napoleon Ordinance §343.01(A), no person shall operate a lowspeed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a mini-truck within the City upon Scott Street north of Lagrange Street.
- (C) The owner of a low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a minitruck who wishes to operate on a public street or highway must first submit the vehicle to an inspection that complies with the requirements established by the Ohio Department of Public Safety under Section 4513.02 of the Revised Code.
- (D) Every low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, and mini-truck operated upon any street or highway within the City must have a seat safety belt installed at each designated seating position.
- (E) Low-speed vehicles, under-speed vehicles, utility vehicles, and mini-trucks operated on public streets or highways must successfully pass the required vehicle inspection, be registered in accordance with Chapter 4503 of the Revised Code, and be titled in accordance with Chapter 4505 of the Revised Code.
- (F) Occupants of a low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a minitruck shall be seated at all times on the seat of the vehicle and buckled by the seat belt when the vehicle is on and in motion. Standing on any portion of the vehicle while it is in motion is prohibited.
- (G) Any child who falls under the child restraint criteria set by Ohio R.C. 4511.81 is prohibited from being a passenger in a low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a mini-truck operated on any street, highway, right of way, public area, or private property used for vehicular travel within the City.
- (H) No person shall operate a low-speed vehicle, under-speed vehicle, utility vehicle, or a mini-truck upon any sidewalks within the City.
- (I) Except as otherwise provided, all sections of the Napoleon Traffic Code and State of Ohio Traffic Laws, or substantially similar offenses, shall apply to low-speed

vehicles, under-speed vehicles, utility vehicles, and mini-trucks operated upon any street, highway, right of way, public area, or private property used for vehicular travel within the City.

#### 343.99 - PENALTY

Whoever violates any provision contained in Chapter 343 is guilty of a minor misdemeanor for a first offense and a misdemeanor of the fourth degree for each subsequent offense. Nothing in this section shall limit the City from filing other violations of law including but not limited to license violations.

Section 3. That, the City Clerk is directed to notify the director of public safety of this local authorization as required by R.C. 4511.215.

Section 4. That, this Ordinance is enacted pursuant to the home rule powers of the City of Napoleon as set forth at Article XVIII, Section 3, of the Ohio Constitution.

Section 5. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 6. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 7. That, this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, such necessity arising from the City's need to effectively manage and control the use of golf carts and other low speed vehicles upon the City's roads, and therefore this Ordinance shall be effective upon passage.

Please find in this packet to be presented to Council, the required documentation for the purchase of a new Terex Commander 5050 model hydraulic rotating digger derrick with a turntable winch. Sourcewell (formally NJPA National Joint Powers Alliance) Contract Number: 042815-TER (Reference QU10364 C5050), Quote Number: QU3048, Unit: C5050. The cost details for this purchase are as follows:

- Purchased under approved 2019 Budget
- Account # 503-6110-5700 Machinery & Equipment
- Budgeted Amount: \$300,000 to replace Line Truck #56 (2005 International Lift All)
- Quoted Amount: \$260,195
  - Includes: \$21,000 Trade in Allowance
  - Add Option: \$1,636 Terex Texoma 18" TXD (dirt tooth auger) x 104" long 60" of 5/16" flighting, 2 5/8" hex bushing. Rollup dish and cable pin welded in place and auger painted Terex Red.
- Vendor: Terex Utilities Inc.
  - 500 Oakwood Road
  - Watertown, South Dakota 57201
- Sales Representative: Brian ODell, cell number (330) 461-7943

The justifications for the elimination of competitive bidding are outlined as follows:

- 1. The lifting capacity required by the City Electric dept. is 17,300 lbs., however the other vendors researched could only offer a lifting capacity of 15,100 lbs. The Terex truck will meet the future needs for lifting capacity which are increasing with growth of Industrial customers needing larger transformers, and existing customers are aging and may need transformers changed in non-business hours when a crane is not readily available. Also, the existing truck is 15 yrs. old and is no longer able to lift our heavier transformers.
- 2. There will be a cost savings to the City by purchasing the Terex, as Terex is allowing us to trade in our old truck with pre-determined price of \$21,000; in researching the other vendors, there was no trade in option available.

- 3. The City Electric dept. requires a 24" auger for transmission poles, which the Terex truck can handle, however in researching the other vendors, the augers were only 18" which is not sufficient for City projects.
- 4. The steel boom on Terex is heavier duty for added long term stability.
- 5. The City Electric dept. prefers the hydraulic controls, which are offered by Terex; in researching the other vendors, the controls are electronic.

It is my recommendation to trade in our existing line truck #56 due to condition of truck and liability of resale by the City of Napoleon. I feel the \$21,000 offered for our trade in is a very fair price.



The primary goals of this project are to replace the aging Van Hyning Pumping Station that is past its useful life and to increase pumping capacity to reduce surcharging near the Oberhaus Creek and Van Hyning Creek during heavy rainfalls.

The proposed pumping station will be located along East Riverview Avenue and be constructed adjacent to the existing pumping station. During design a small wetland area was delineated near the ROW for the Napoleon Defiance & Western RR. As part of the design, efforts were made to ensure that the wetland will be protected and will not be disturbed during the construction of the project.

The project will be funded through the Ohio EPA Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) and is part of the City's Long-Term Control Plan to reduce overflow activity and protect the water quality of the Maumee River. The new pumping station will greatly improve collection system reliability, provide the WWTP staff with better control of flows entering the plant and provide additional capacity to reduce surcharging of the interceptors during heavy rainfall events.

Review Tree Call Reports	Deblin reported he received four tree calls. 816 Daggett, 414 Rohrs and 422 Brownell all asked what the process was for getting stumps we ground in the spring cleaned up and seeded. 607 Sheffield has a Red Maple that he's worried is starting to show signs of hollowing on a couple of limbs we recently pruned, take a look at. We can remove the tree in the spring if we need to, I still believe it's due to the depth of grinding stumps. Next spring, I hope to get back on the topsoil contract like we have done in the past to give it a chance to settle and the following season address topsoil. Fitzenreiter said he had the resident at 1125 Hurst Drive contact him regarding the Norway Maple that has a couple of branches in the power lines. The tree is on private property; however, it is really close to the right-of-way. Deblin said due to potential problems with the power lines, we'll just go ahead and trim. Moore stated the owners of Moxi asked if a tree will be planted where the one was removed, they prefer a tree not be replanted. Deblin said we send letters out before we replant trees, if they don't want a tree replanted, we're good with that. Clausing asked if there was any wind damage? Deblin said we had one at 703 Daggett, the top broke out it.
Fall Contracts Update	Deblin reported the Fall Removal Contract started with 16 trees and 25 stumps (some of the stumps are from when the Electric Department removed trees). The contractor is down to 10 trees and 17 stumps, he started work on August 27 <sup>th</sup> .
Award Fall Planting Contract Award Fall Trimming Contract	Deblin stated three fall planting packets were sent out with just one proposal being submitted. North Branch Nursery's proposal was \$5,781 for 24 trees. All but four of the trees are on Park Street the others are on Haley, Clairmont, Highland and the tree well by Snyders. The Commission approved awarding the Fall Planting Contract to North Branch Nursery at \$5,781.00. Deblin said two invites for the fall trimming were sent out with just Tawa Tree submitting a proposal. Their base bid is \$180/hour, their Alternate Bid adds a

Begin Spring Planting List	second truck and another worker at \$360/hour. My recommendation would be to go with the Alternate Bid with the two crews. That's 36 hours at \$360/hour and gets them in and out, that worked well last Spring. The Committee approved awarding the Alternate Bid with two crews at \$360/hour for 36 hours to Tawa Tree. There was discussion on why we are receiving just one bid on the tree proposals and possible other companies we can reach out to. Fitzenreiter suggested planting trees at Pickett Fences to enhance that area. He measured the boulevard at 7-8 feet and thought Deblin could send letters to the homeowners. Deblin said Trail Drive is being extended and Raymond Street is
	going in now, that would be just a block. Fitzenreiter added there are two new houses going in at Twin Oaks with another one on Sycamore.
Review Next Year's Budget/Plans	Deblin reported the last couple of years we've had \$60,000 in the budget. Chad informed me, the pre-budget amount is \$50,0000, he said \$60,000 was due to construction projects that needed trees replanted. I don't think we can go backwards and will ask Chad to push for the additional \$5,000 this year with an increase of \$1,000 each year after. The Ohio average is \$7.69 per capita and the National average is \$8.40 per capita, Napoleon's is \$7.38 per capita. We spend 54% on trimming and 40% is split between tree plantings and removals. ODNR recommends a 5 to 7-year cycle for tree trimming and ours is on an eight to ten- year cycle. Etzler pointed out by doing the tree trimmings we have not had a lot of damage from high winds, trees at risk are being taken down and that is what tree trimming buys us. Deblin added removals are on an as needed basis and we try to plant as many as we have taken down if not more. To meet Ohio's average, we would need \$64,000 and to meet the Nation's average that figure would be \$70,000. My proposal is we need the extra \$5,000 to keep up.

### **BACKGROUND:**

An application for public hearing has been filed by Frank S. Cashman, 120 Wayne Park Dr. Napoleon, Ohio 43545. The applicant is requesting a variance to Section 1147 regarding the building setbacks in an R-1 Zone, Suburban Residential. The applicant is requesting a variance to the side yard setback, from 10' to 6', to build a 24x40' building.

### **RESEARCH AND FINDING**

- 1. These lots were originally platted before the zoning determination was set for this area.
- 2. The natural contours of this area limit the buildable space
- 3. Upon approval of this variance and issuance of a zoning permit, a building permit from Wood County Building Inspection shall be required followed by a Certificate of Occupancy.

### **STANDARDS FOR A VARIANCE :**

The Board, after a hearing, may grant a variation from the regulations of the City's Planning and Zoning Code, but only when such variation is in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Planning and Zoning Code, and the Board finds all of the following:

(a) That there are exceptional or extraordinary circumstances or conditions applicable to the property or to the intended use that do not apply generally to the other property or use in the same vicinity or district;

(b) That such variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right possessed by other property in the same vicinity or district but which is denied to the property in question;

(c) That granting such variance will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to the property of improvements in the vicinity or district in which the property is located;

(d) That granting such variance will not alter the land use characteristics of the vicinity or district, diminish the value of adjacent land and improvements, or increase the congestion in the public streets. (Ord. 69-01. Passed 7-2-01.)



### **OML UPDATE AT-A-GLANCE**

Here are the top three things you need to know from this past week:

- *Area Development Magazine* named Ohio as ninth on a list of "Top States for Doing Business" for the year 2019. In a subcategory, Ohio ranked first in "most improved economic development policies." As Ohio's economic engines, municipalities play a critical role in providing a business-friendly environment that supports jobs and economic development throughout the state.
- The League regrets to report that Delaware Country Treasurer and former state representative Jon Peterson passed away earlier this week. Peterson represented Delaware County in the House of Representatives for five terms, from 1998 to 2008. We also regret to report the passing of former state senator Cooper Snyder, who represented Highland county just over four terms from 1979 through 1996. Our thoughts are with their families.
- Ohio's September tax revenue estimates were exceeded by 2%, or \$37.3 million. Total tax revenues totaled at \$1.93 billion for the month. This marks the third month in a row of exceeded revenue estimates. The first three months of the fiscal year have seen their estimates surpassed by \$71.4 million in total.

### SENATE INTRODUCES "BAG TAX" PREEMPTION BILL

The Senate has introduced a companion bill to HB 242, which is the municipal preemption on taxing auxiliary containers. The Senate's version of the bill, SB 222, was introduced this week by Sen. Rulli (R - Salem). (Link: <u>https://bit.ly/2MmvbVN</u>).

Like the bill in the House, SB 222 prohibits a municipality from taxing containers such as plastic bags and takeout boxes, as well as applying existing anti-littering laws to those containers. This bill is yet another in a long line of legislative preemptions from the General Assembly that continue to erode the Home Rule authority granted to Ohio's cities and villages in Article XVIII of the state's constitution.

The League's Executive Director, Kent Scarrett, published an op-ed in the Columbus Dispatch last month discussing the "bag tax" municipal preemption, as well as the history of preemptions passed by the legislature over the past several years. You can read his column in full <u>HERE</u>.

As with HB 242, the League opposes SB 222 and will follow closely any progress the misguided proposal may receive. If the bill receives committee action, we will notify our members with a Call-to-Action to let them know when there is an opportunity for municipal leaders to come to Columbus and testify against this bill and its violation of the principles of Home Rule authority.

In the meantime, we strongly encourage our members to contact their state senators and alert them of this dangerous piece of legislation and the challenges it will present for the tenets of local control and respect for Home Rule authorities.

### GOV. DEWINE'S "STRONG OHIO" LEGISLATION INTRODUCED

This week, Sen. Dolan (R - Chagrin Falls) introduced SB 221, which is the official legislation implementing Gov. DeWine's "STRONG Ohio" plan dedicated to curbing gun violence in Ohio. (Link: <u>https://bit.ly/2Mk4Pn4</u>). The bill as written would do the following:

- issue a Safety Protection Order in specific circumstances regarding a person who a court determines is under a drug dependency, chronic alcoholic, or mental health-related firearms disability.
- specify Law Enforcement Automated Data System (LEADS) and National Crime Information Center (NCIC) reporting and removal procedures for certain types of protection orders.
- require submissions to the Attorney General to include findings of incompetent to stand trial (IST) or not guilty by reason of insanity (NGRI) in LEADS.
- modify some of the prohibitions under the offense of "unlawful transactions in weapons", such as increased penalties for "straw purchases" (purchasing a firearm

for someone legally unable to purchase a firearm).

- add new prohibitions and exemptions under the "unlawful transactions in weapons" offense, including a new exemption if a state background check mechanism enacted by this bill is used to determine that the individual receiving the firearm is not barred from possessing a firearm.
- provide a seller's protection certificate in certain circumstances under the bill's new state background check mechanism.
- increase the penalty for certain firearms-related offenses in specified circumstances, such as committing a felony while possessing a firearm.
- modify the law governing the entry of arrest warrants into LEADS as extradition warrants.
- expand the law regarding the provision of drug and alcohol test results to law enforcement personnel.
- provide a new exception to testimonial privilege for specified medical and dental personnel regarding certain probate court proceedings.

The League will be tracking this legislation closely as it begins committee hearings and we will inform our members of any changes that are made as it moves through the legislative process.

### COMMITTEE UPDATE: BILLS OF MUNICIPAL INTEREST

Here are the bills impacting municipalities that received committee hearings this week:

- HB 295 ELECTRIC SCOOTERS. Sponsored by Rep. Hoops (R Napoleon), would establish requirements governing low-speed electric scooters. During its fourth hearing before the House Transportation and Public Safety Committee, the bill was voted unanimously out of committee. It now heads to the Senate for further hearings. The League is neutral on this legislation.(Link: <u>https://bit.ly/30I0H4t</u>)
- SB 39 INSURANCE TAX. Sponsored by Sen Schuring (R Canton), would authorize an insurance premiums tax credit for capital contributions to transformational mixed-use development projects. During its first hearing before the House Economic and Workforce Development Committee, the bill's sponsor said the bill is targeted towards "mega-development projects designed to revitalize downtown areas and boost local economies.
