CALL TO ORDER

Council President Bialorucki called the City Council meeting to order at 7:00 pm with the Lord's Prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

INTRODUCTION OF NEW ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 033-20 - Health Care Insurance Premium - \$50.00 Surcharge

Council President Bialorucki read by title Resolution No. 033-20, a Resolution Approving the Addition of a Fifty Dollar (\$50.00) Surcharge to City of Napoleon, Ohio Employee Health Insurance Premiums, Amending Resolution No. 073-19; and Declaring an Emergency

Mazur stated this is for adding a surcharge to the health insurance premiums for those that do not get their wellness check. We have been doing this for the past two years and it has worked out well. We had over 90% participation. Since we added spouses, three out of roughly 150 or so that are on our health care plan did not get a wellness check. Therefore, we received a 1% discount on our health insurance premium cost for the next year. As you know, our health care costs are approaching the \$1.5 million-dollar range annually. This year is a little bit different than the previous years due to COVID-19. This year, we will allow everyone to have until December 31, 2020 to get their wellness check completed.

In 2021, employees and spouses on the City's health care plan will be required to get their wellness check from the first of the year to the end of June. The BORMA Group voted on this, the Magis Group that was formerly Chapman and Chapman, run the health insurance piece and want to take the biometrics and try to tailor educational programs for each individual community based on their needs. Obviously, no names will be included. They will just compile all the data and use that to try to do more education and wellness activities based on specific needs. We are asking for first read on this legislation for 2020 and 2021. Bialorucki asked, let's say I'm a procrastinator and wait until the last week of December in 2020 to get all my tests and everything done. Then my resolution for 2021 is to not be a procrastinator and I go on January 3, 2021, would I have to have all the same tests done again even though I just had them done maybe six days ago? Lambert said yes you would have to have them done again. Aetna will cover that cost again because it's not a rolling calendar, it's a calendar year. You can get a wellness check done in December, 2020 and then turn around and have another one done in January, 2021.

Council President Bialorucki read by title Ordinance No. 034-20, an Ordinance Amending Certain City of Napoleon Traffic Schedules, specifically Schedule 1, "On-Street Parking Prohibited" on Certain City Streets and Schedule III, "Stop and Yield Intersections" as listed in the attached Exhibit A; and Repealing Ordinance No.(s) 096-07 and 112-07

Mazur reported we are adding Old School Drive and parking is restricted on both sides, is that correct? Lulfs replied correct, parking is prohibited on both sides. Mazur continued going down to Park Street, this would prohibit parking on the north side of the street to make it consistent with the rest of the project. Lulfs said yes, we are making the entire length of the street the same. Before the three sections were all different now they will all be consistent. Mazur said so parking on the south side. Going down to Schedule III, the Stop and Yield Intersections we talked about this once before, instead of a two-way stop make it a four-way stop at the intersection of Sheffield and Park. Also adding the stop sign on Old School Drive heading onto Clairmont. Comadoll asked what is the timeframe we are talking for this to be effective? Mazur said when it passes. Maassel asked isn't the line already painted on Sheffield? Lulfs said the stop bars are painted but the signs are bagged. Comadoll said I want to make a motion to suspend the rules and make it effective now. Maassel noted to be effective now, the ordinance will need to be amended to add an emergency clause. Bialorucki commented it sounds like it could be confusing if the line is already there. Some people are going to stop and others will not stop. Mazur said the lines were painted as that was part of their contract but this ordinance was not changed. Lulfs confirmed Nagel's did stripe that. During the project they had the temporary stop signs on the wrong street and there was some confusion out there. After discussing the issue with Chief Mack, we agreed it would probably be best to go forward with the four-way stop. Nagel's did paint the line but, we cannot have the actual stop signs until the legislation is passed and in effect. Bialorucki asked Chief Mack is it safer to make this a four-way stop immediately? Chief Mack responded, it would make it safer with the four-way stop, I strongly agree with that. Lulfs said we have had the change of traffic pattern signs up for a few weeks now so there has been some warning.

GOOD OF THE CITY

Acceptance of EMS 2020-2021 Training and Equipment Grant Award in an Amount of \$5,023.99.

Chief O'Brien explained this is an annual EMS Grant that is a reimbursable grant. We are given a set amount to buy certain equipment or supplies that we would need for the ambulances. We have to turn the receipts in to show that we used that money for this year. The amount varies every year. They tell us exactly what we are going to get and encourage you to spend all your money. That is how we have been successful in getting the amounts around the \$5,000 mark. Bialorucki asked with these grants are they guaranteed to the City of Napoleon because they like us or do you have to apply for them every year? Chief O'Brien replied we have to apply for these grants each and every year. There is a specific list of things that you can apply for and then there are certain times that you can spend the money between. For this particular grant, we can only spend the money on their fiscal year that is July to June. So, that is why you we put the expenditure in for after July 1st. Bialorucki said we think of a Fire Chief as helping to put out fires or training new firefighters and hiring them and doing all that. But, there's a lot more that goes into what your job is. We come across a lot of grants that we receive because you seek those out. We appreciate that very much. Maassel asked is this for consumables on the ambulance or is this more for equipment that's going to stick around for a little while? Chief O'Brien answered, it's for equipment that's

going to stick around for a little while. This year we are remounting two of the three ambulances that we have and our big purchase out of this is going to be a refrigerator for each ambulance. We have medications that allow us to do certain procedures out in the field that require refrigeration. We will likely replace the blue bags that we know as the trauma bags, we are buying three of those. There are some thermometers and other things in there too. This is more of a durable equipment grant than for consumable or disposable stuff.

Approval of Plans and Specifications for the Volute Press Procurement for the 2021 Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvement Project

Mazur said approval would allow us to bid out the purchase of the screw presses to replace the belt presses that are in the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The press building was not designed to handle the corrosive atmosphere that is created from pressing wastewater treatment sludge out of the building. There is so much corrosion that it is eating away at the building and the equipment in the building. The belt presses are getting to a point where they are starting to break down and fall apart. The screw presses are for the new treatment system and is a more efficient system. The estimated cost to purchase the equipment is \$740,000. This would be for two presses and will be rolled into the overall debt of the new Wastewater Treatment Plant Rehab Project. These presses have a long lead time and have to actually be manufactured and brought in, that is why we are looking to purchase these now and roll the cost into the overall project later on. We are still working with Courtney and Associates on doing the rate review. We had held off because we wanted to see what effect, if any, the coronavirus had on our revenues. It is looking positive, so hopefully that continues. We were worried there was going to be a negative impact on the revenues in the sewer and water funds. We have seen a negative effect in the electric fund. That is why we wanted to wait and see how things went. I think we are comfortable enough now, at least with the water and sewer rate studies to move forward.

Amend Resolution No. 081-19 Elimination of Competitive Bidding

Mazur stated we are requesting Council to direct the Law Director to draft legislation. We had servers replaced, they came in under budget but we also went ahead and did the police servers also as those needed replaced too. To add Spengler Nathanson who did the legal work for the water contract deal. Lastly, we have to do a name change for one of the companies that we buy chemicals for the golf course from. These are changes to the master vendor ordinance to clean it up. Does that cover everything? O'Boyle responded *yes* and we will be monitoring this quarterly to make sure nothing else goes over the \$25,000 threshold. Bialorucki asked do you need a motion to direct the Law Director to draft legislation to eliminate competitive bidding? Mazur said *no*, we need a motion to amend Resolution No. 081-19.

Maassel confirmed we are not eliminating competitiveness overall, just for these three instances for the legislation that is the master bid ordinance. I was thinking the same thing we are eliminating all competitive bidding because, that is not what we want to do.

AROUND THE TABLE

Mayor Maassel. City Manager Mazur talked with State Representative Hoops about state dollars coming from the Federal Government. Representative Hoops said we'll get Congressman Latta on the phone. Today at 5:00 pm, the four of us, State Representative Hoops, Mazur, myself and Congressman Latta had a 25 to 30-minute conversation on what's going on at the federal level, to help us have some flexibility in the dollars that we already received in the latest stimulus package that's already been passed and had \$4.5 billion dollars for the State of Ohio. Only less than 12% has already been spent. They are working with the state to figure out how to make that more flexible. What you are hearing right now in the media is that the Democrats have a \$3 trillion-dollar bill and the Republicans have a more modest one trillion. If you call a trillion dollars modest. They are trying to hammer out the differences between those. To put that into perspective, the Federal Government's budget for all of 2020 was originally \$1.7 trillion dollars. The Democrats basically, including the money already spent, want to add another three trillion dollars on to that. I think it would behoove them and the city to just kind of free up the money we already have and make it more flexible for us. That was a big part of the conversation. Mazur said we are hoping to get some flexibility. You know we talked about the General Fund expenses and in Moody's report that was published in late-May, it shows they expect most Ohio cities will be hit hard by the coronavirus. We don't know what that number is, but we are actively monitoring it and by September we should have a better idea of how much we will be impacted by 2020. We collect income tax in 2021 for 2020 so we should know what the impact of that is by then. We need flexibility on how we can spend these funds because it's a little restrictive for us right now. Maassel noted message received and message sent so that was good. I talked to a local charity today and I also talked to a local manufacturer. The charities are a little slower than they normally are. A lot of people just kind of hunkered down and have not been using it as much. They are anticipating as things ramp back up their efforts are going to ramp back up too. A local manufacturer saw a little slowdown before COVID hit and they weathered through. They had some layoffs but, are back to full strength now and their business is starting to pick back up. That is a good thing. When Representative Hoops came, the first thing I said to him was unfortunately Ohio had a historic week last week because of the former Speaker of the House of Representatives. We don't need to remind ourselves but, every once in a while it's nice just to rehear, if you are not doing this for the people, then don't do this. I think that was something that gets lost sometimes and we need to make sure we are doing it for the people. I had a complaint from somebody who lives on Bauman Place. We repaved that road about three years ago and it is starting to show some cracks. I didn't know if we could take a look at that. Last week was a good week for Napoleon. We were all here on Monday after the Planning Commission meeting to talk about potential economic development at the old Walmart. We also passed the American Road Reconstruction, then we had a road dedication and nobody could definitely say when was the last time we dedicated a road but we guessed it was 2006 or 2007 at Pickett Fences on the south side. Old School Drive is now where West School used to be and that development continues. We are seeing a lot of positive stuff.

Baer- I was wondering if we have the final results on the citizen survey on the reciprocity tax? Mazur said the survey closed on Friday. We are compiling that data and trying to get it in a format. We will have that in everybody's packet hopefully by the end of the week. Maassel asked Baer if he would like included as a discussion item at the next Council meeting? Baer said *yes I would*.

Bialorucki - the only thing I have is about the Axis LED Group. I know three or four years ago we were talking about JAC Products coming to town for a spec building. I think originally they were talking around 200 employees and we were so excited were hoping to have 10-15 employees. It was amazing they were talking about 200 and have bumped that it up to 300 to 400 employees. Now, we have a company that is coming into Napoleon and occupying a building that has been an eyesore and vacant for eighteen years. This company is doing something that will benefit the whole country making N95 masks and gloves and everything else they are going to do. Not to mention, they are bringing 400 to 500 jobs here in Napoleon. I'm just surprised that this hasn't been talked about more. It has not been like wow this is awesome! I mean every aspect of it is great and I don't know if it's just because we have all been kind of social distancing and we are not getting together and saying man this is awesome. I just wanted to point that out and thank this company for choosing Napoleon and using their knowledge and expertise to manufacture some things that are greatly needed in this country and to choose Napoleon to do it and create another 400 to 500 jobs. Massel added it very exciting. Mazur said it puts Napoleon on a global map. These aren't just going to be these American-made products they will be shipped out all over the country, all over the globe. Haase said Brian Koeller did have an article in the Northwest Signal about it, he didn't really come out and greatly praise it. Maassel noted it was a very positive article and Brian had a nice column in Saturday's paper in his opinion column. Bialorucki said I just think if it was any other time this would be top news with all the Toledo news channels. Since our meeting last Monday, I have really thought about it a lot. Like this is huge for Napoleon, it's awesome and I just want to thank that company and the people that worked hard to get them to come here and to have somebody in that building that's been sitting empty for eighteen years is a great thing.

RESOLUTION NO. 038-20

A RESOLUTION AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 081-19, THE CITY'S YEARLY REOCCURRING COSTS LEGISLATION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City each year has reoccurring costs associated with the conducting of business with groups or associations established for or on behalf of the political subdivisions or instrumentalities of the State, which annually exceed twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000); and,

WHEREAS, the City each year has reoccurring costs associated with the conducting of business, many which result in mandatory payments or merely occur as a result of the method of accounting utilized by the City's Finance Department; and,

WHEREAS, for convenience and efficiency, purchase orders are annually written to vendors by multiple departments of the City with a combined total that exceeds twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000); and,

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 081-19 was previously passed on December 16, 2019; and,

WHEREAS, certain vendors were omitted from Resolution No. 081-19, and Council now desires to add these vendors for proper payment. **Now Therefore**,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, the expenditure of funds by the City in excess of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), in and for the year 2020, is hereby necessary and authorized as a proper public expenditure, subject to appropriation of funds, for purchases, services, coverage, or benefits listed in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

Section 2. That, the expenditure of funds by the City in excess of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000), in and for the year 2020, is hereby necessary and authorized as a proper public expenditure, subject to appropriation of funds, for the following purchases associated with recreation, fund balance maintenance, public labor costs, public auditing, utilities, bonding, accounting, the payment of debt service, postal service, banking, permitting, and codification listed in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

Section 3. That, the expenditure of funds in excess of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) is hereby necessary and authorized as a proper public expenditure, subject to appropriation of funds, for the City's cumulative purchase of product, supply, equipment and/or services periodically through the year 2020 from the following vendors; however, in no event shall the amount exceed twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for any one purchase of product, supply, equipment and/or services or any one specific project under the authority of this Resolution listed in Exhibit "C" attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

- Section 4. That, due to nature or uniqueness of the transactions or vending listed in Sections 1, 2 and 3 of this Resolution, except for the prohibition in Section 3 regarding the one time purchase over twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), any requirement that may exist for competitive bidding is hereby eliminated in the best interest of the City.
- Section 5. That, Resolution No. 081-19 is hereby amended to remove Walter Drain Co. on Exhibit "B" for the purpose of codification services.
- Section 6. That, Resolution No. 081-19 is hereby amended to include Dell Marketing on Exhibit "C" for the purpose of purchasing computer hardware systems.
- Section 7. That, Resolution No. 081-19 is hereby amended to add Spengler Nathanson, PLL on Exhibit "C" for the purpose of outside counsel professional services.
- Section 8. That, Resolution No. 081-19 is hereby amended to include Target Specialty Products, (previously Residex, LLC), on Exhibit "C" for the purpose of purchasing golf course chemicals.
- Section 9. That, nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as to eliminate the necessity of quality based selection as it relates to architect, engineer or construction services for any one project that would otherwise require such a selection process, as such elimination of quality based selection would require separate Council action; moreover, nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as to eliminate the restriction found in Section 3 of this Resolution as it relates to a single purchase or project expenditures.
- Section 10. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.
- Section 11. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Resolution, then the provisions of this Resolution shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Resolution is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution or any part thereof.
- Section 12. That, this Resolution is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for prompt purchases required to remain operational, being operational essential to public peace, health or safety; therefore, provided it receives the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to begin the payment process in a timely manner which affects the public peace, health, and safety accessible to our citizens, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE ADDITION OF A FIFTY DOLLAR (\$50.00) SURCHARGE TO CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO EMPLOYEE HEALTH INSURANCE PREMIUMS, AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 073-19; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, Section 197.15 (a) (2) of the Codified Ordinances (Personnel Code) provides that: Subject to reasonable cost containment measures, the City provides group hospitalization, surgical, and extended medical benefits for each full-time regular employee in accordance with the benefit schedule provided in the City's plan as on file in the office of the City Finance Director marked "City of Napoleon Health Benefit Plan (#HBP-1)" and as may be amended from time to time by Resolution of Council. The City of Napoleon Health Benefit Plan (#HBP-1) shall include covered services, co-pays, and premium contribution; and,

WHEREAS, the Health Care Cost Committee has recommended to City Council to approve a surcharge to City of Napoleon employees' health insurance premiums as follows: to add a fifty dollar (\$50.00) monthly surcharge to employees' health insurance premiums starting January 1, 2021 to employees that do not complete a wellness check, and also to employees' health insurance premiums whose spouse does not complete a wellness check as appropriate, by a licensed physician prior to December 31, 2020. Further, employees and spouses that complete the wellness check during the dates of January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020 and turn in the Preventative Care Physician form by December 31, 2020, will not be assessed a surcharge to the employee's insurance premium. New employees will be afforded an opportunity to get a wellness check in their first year prior to being assessed a surcharge; and,

WHEREAS, the Health Care Cost Committee has also recommended to City Council that, beginning January 1, 2021, the City of Napoleon shall follow BORMA's 2021 Wellness Campaign; and,

WHEREAS, there was no recommendation to change the health plan in the year 2020 regarding the out-of-pocket in network deductible currently; **Now Therefore**,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, upon recommendation of the Health Care Cost Committee, in the year 2020 and for the year 2021, this Council approves amending Resolution No. 073-19, approving a fifty dollar (\$50.00) monthly surcharge to employees' health insurance premiums starting January 1, 2021 to employees that do not complete a wellness check and also to employees' health insurance premiums whose spouse does not complete a wellness check as appropriate, by a licensed physician prior to December 31, 2020. Further, employees and spouses that complete the wellness check during the dates of January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020 and turn in the Preventative Care Physician form by December 31, 2020, will not be assessed a surcharge to the employee's insurance premium. New employees will be afforded an opportunity to get a wellness check in their first year prior to getting assessed a surcharge.

- Section 2. That, also upon recommendation of the Health Care Cost Committee, in the year 2020 and for the year 2021, this Council approves following BORMA's 2021 wellness campaign.
- Section 3. That, all provisions of the BORMA Benefit Plan shall remain in full force and effect.
- Section 4. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.
- Section 5. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Resolution, then the provisions of this Resolution shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Resolution is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution or any part thereof.
- Section 5. That, this Resolution is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, therefore, provided it receives the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to effectuate the stated surcharge in a timely manner which affects the public peace, health, and safety accessible to our citizens, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

A seal shall be provided for the Finance Director, in the center of which shall be the word "Napoleon" and around the margin of which shall be the words "Finance Director." The Finance Director shall cause an impression of this seal to be affixed to all deeds, transcripts, orders, certificates, negotiable instruments, and other documents requiring authentication. (1978 Code 32.62)

137.05 CASH RESERVE.

The Finance Director is authorized by this Council to keep at all times in the vaults of his/her office, as a cash reserve, an amount not to exceed two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

Such reserve, in part or in whole may be administratively distributed to cash drawers or locations under the direction of the Finance Director as deemed appropriate by the Finance Director. (Ord. 39-00. Passed 3-6-00.)

137.06 INVESTMENT POLICY.

- (a) The City previously adopted as the City's official Investment Policy, Investment Policy No. IP 16-0003 currently on file in the office of the City Finance Director, having been recommended by the Finance Director and the Finance and Budget Committee of Council, having been reviewed, and Ordinance No. 013-16 being unanimously approved by Council on May 16, 2016.
- (b) Investment Policy No. IP 16-0003 may be amended from time to time by motion of Council.
- (c) Ordinance No. 013-16 and Investment Policy No. 0003, as well as later amendments thereto, are hereby amended by this Ordinance No. 001-20. (Ord. 001-20. Passed 2-17-20.)

137.07 FINANCE DIRECTOR'S BOND.

The Finance Director shall give bond in a minimal penal sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) with a corporate surety authorized to do business in the State of Ohio. This bond shall be contracted by Council and the expense thereof paid by the City. (Ord. 71-96. Passed 7-1-96.)

137.08 APPLICABILITY OF FINANCE DIRECTOR.

- (a) Every reference to the terms "auditor", "clerk", or "treasurer" in any ordinance, resolution or other act of Council shall hereafter be to the Finance Director of the City and the term "Finance Director" shall be substituted therefor, unless Council later specifically designates another as "clerk of council" at which time any ordinance, resolution or other act of Council passed after such designation that states "clerk" shall mean "Clerk of Council", unless the context in which the term is used clearly indicates otherwise.
- (b) Every reference to the terms "auditor", "clerk", or treasurer", "of the City by any law, contract, rule, regulation, instrument, or other document shall hereafter mean the Finance Director and the term "Finance Director" shall be substituted therefor, unless Council later specifically designates another as "Clerk of Council" at which time any law, contract, rule, regulation, instrument, or other document after such designation that states "clerk" shall mean "Clerk of Council" unless the context in which the term is used clearly indicates otherwise. 143.01 COMPOSITION AND CONTROL OF THE CITY FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT.

- (a) The regular Fire/Rescue Department of the City shall be composed of a department head known as the "Fire Chief", and such other officers, fire fighters, fire rescue personnel, drivers, emergency medical personnel, fire safety inspectors, paramedics, secretaries, clerks and other employees as provided by legislation of the City, the Organizational Chart of the City, and/or the Administrative Code of the City.
- (b) <u>Definitions.</u> For purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings ascribed to them respectively.
 - (1) "Fire Chief" means the Chief of the regular Fire/Rescue Department.
 - "Regular Fire/Rescue Department" means the Fire/Rescue Department of the City composed of the full-time and part-time paid personnel and its auxiliary.
- (c) Notwithstanding any prior ordinance or resolution to the contrary, the regular Fire/Rescue Department shall be composed of the following:
 - Fire Chief (full-time)
 - 4 Officer of the supervisory grade (full-time)
 - 5 Fire Fighter/Paramedics or

Fire Fighter/Emergency Medical technicians, or combination thereof (full-time)

Officers of supervisory grade (part-time)

1 (not to exceed 70) Staff of any combination of the following:

Fire Fighters, paramedics, emergency medical technicians (any level), fire fighter/paramedics, fire fighter/emergency medical technicians, secretary, communication officers, instructors (all of part-time status as approved by the City Manager)

the City Manager)

1 (not to exceed 20) Auxiliary officers.

- (d) The making of an assignment by the Chief of one or more officers to any job or division such as fire fighters, drivers, fire safety inspectors, paramedics, arson investigators, and other similar positions shall not be construed as disturbing the composition of the regular Fire/Rescue Department or violating subsection (c) hereof; moreover, temporary vacancies in the regular Fire/Rescue Department shall not be construed as a departure from this section; finally, adding or eliminating secretaries, clerks, communication and the like positions shall not be construed as disturbing the composition of the regular Fire/Rescue Department.
- (e) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as limiting the number of additional officers that may be required in case of an emergency.

 (Ord. 018-20. Passed 5-18-20.)

143.02 ADMINISTRATIVE HEAD OF FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT.

The Fire Chief of the regular Fire/Rescue Department shall have direction and control over all personnel in the City's regular Fire/Rescue Department, including all auxiliary employees and other officers in the auxiliary unit. However, the City Manager maintains his or her power and authority over the Department as found in Article IV, of the City's Charter and Chapter 133 of the Administrative Code.

(Ord. 81-01. Passed 7-2-01.)

143.03 GENERAL DUTIES OF FIRE/RESCUE DEPARTMENT.

The Fire/Rescue Department shall protect the lives and property of the people in case of fire or other emergency. The Fire/Rescue Department shall perform such other duties as are provided by ordinance, resolution, and/or statute. In case of a conflict between an ordinance or resolution and a statute, the ordinance or resolution shall prevail where permitted. (Ord. 81-01. Passed 7-2-01.)

143.04 ADDITIONAL FIRE PERSONNEL IN EMERGENCY SITUATION.

- (a) In case of riot or other like emergency, Ohio R.C. 737.10 shall control, the Mayor being the person appointing the additional firemen and officers and being the person who calls upon the agencies or entities for assistance as authorized by Ohio R.C. 737.10; however, once appointed, said additional firemen and officers shall come under the control of the City Manager, Fire Chief or other supervisory officer of the regular Fire/Rescue Department. Nothing in this section shall be construed as superseding or modifying in any way any provision of a contract entered into pursuant to law.
- (b) City fire personnel and necessary equipment and apparatus related thereto may be provided to any requesting state agency or instrumentality, county, or political subdivision of this State, or a governmental entity of an adjoining state without a contract to provide fire protection only after having received a request from a person with proper authority and only after approval by the City Manager, Fire Chief or other authorized supervisory officer of the regular Fire/Rescue Department. The provisions of Ohio R.C. 9.60 and 737.10 are applicable to this section insofar as they pertain hereto. Nothing in this section shall be construed as superseding or modifying in any way any provision of a contract entered into pursuant to law.

145.01 COMPOSITION AND CONTROL OF POLICE DEPARTMENT.

- (a) The Police Department of the City shall be composed of a department head known as the "Police Chief" and such other officers, dispatchers, clerks, secretaries and other employees as provided by legislation of the City, the Organizational Chart of the City, and/or the Administrative Code of the City.
- (b) Notwithstanding any prior ordinance or resolution to the contrary, the Napoleon City Police Department shall be composed of the following:
 - 1 Police Chief
 - 4 Sworn officers of the supervisory grade
 - 12 Sworn officers of the patrol grade
 - 6 Communication officers
 - 1 (not to exceed 20) Auxiliary officers
- (c) The making of an assignment by the Chief of one or more officers to an investigative division shall not be construed as disturbing the composition of the Police Department or violating subsection (b) hereof; moreover, temporary vacancies in the Police Department shall not be construed as a departure from this section.
- (d) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as limiting the number of additional officers that may be required in case of an emergency.

 (Ord. 008-20. Passed 3-2-20.)

- (b) No person shall operate a vehicle across public or private property for the purpose of avoiding compliance with a traffic control device.
- (c) It shall be prima-facie evidence of a violation of this section for the operator of a vehicle to cross public or private property as provided herein without using the service of such property, stopping the engine or both.
- (d) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to one predicate motor vehicle or traffic offense, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of two or more predicate motor vehicle or traffic offenses, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree.

331.42 LITTERING FROM MOTOR VEHICLE.

- (a) No operator or occupant of a motor vehicle shall, regardless of intent, throw, drop, discard or deposit litter from any motor vehicle in operation upon any street, road or highway, except into a litter receptacle in a manner that prevents its being carried away or deposited by the elements.
- (b) No operator of a motor vehicle in operation upon any street, road or highway shall allow litter to be thrown, dropped, discarded or deposited from the motor vehicle, except into a litter receptacle in a manner that prevents its being carried away or deposited by the elements.
- (c) As used in this section, "litter" means garbage, trash, waste, rubbish, ashes, cans, bottles, wire, paper, cartons, boxes, automobile parts, furniture, glass or anything else of an unsightly or unsanitary nature.
- (d) Whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. (ORC 4511.82)

331.43 WEARING EARPLUGS OR EARPHONES PROHIBITED.

- (a) As used in this section:
 - (1) "Earphones" means any device that covers all or a portion of both ears and that does either of the following:
 - A. Through either a physical connection to another device or a wireless connection, provides the listener with radio programs, music, or other information;
 - B. Provides hearing protection.
 - "Earphones" does not include speakers or other listening devices that are built into protective headgear.
 - (2) "Earplugs" means any device that can be inserted into one or both ears and that does either of the following:
 - A. Through either a physical connection to another device or a wireless connection, provides the listener with radio programs, music, or other information;
 - B. Provides hearing protection.
- (b) No person shall operate a motor vehicle while wearing earphones over, or earplugs in, both ears.
 - (c) This section does not apply to:
 - (1) Any person wearing a hearing aid;
 - (2) Law enforcement personnel while on duty;

- (3) Fire Department personnel and emergency medical service personnel while on duty;
- Any person engaged in the operation of equipment for use in the maintenance or repair of any highway;
- (5) Any person engaged in the operation of refuse collection equipment;
- Any person wearing earphones or earplugs for hearing protection while operating a motorcycle.
- (d) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to one predicate motor vehicle or traffic offense, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of two or more predicate motor vehicle or traffic offenses, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree. (ORC 4511.84)

331.44 VEHICLES LAUNCHING OR RETRIEVING BOATS.

- (a) All vehicles launching or retrieving boats shall have the right-of-way at all boat launches in the City.
- (b) All traffic on streets, alleys, or drives and crossings intersecting launching areas in the City shall stop and give the right-of-way to vehicles launching or retrieving boats.
- (c) Stop signs shall be erected on all streets, drives, and alleys intersecting and crossing landing areas in the City. (1978 Code 72.33)
- (d) Whoever violates any provision of this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor on a first offense; on a second offense within one year after the first offense, the person is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree; on each subsequent offense within one year after the first offense, the person is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree.

331.45 CENTER TURNING LANE.

- (a) On streets or roadways providing for vehicle traffic in both directions where a center lane is reserved for left turn only, such lane shall not be entered by a vehicle or a motor vehicle, except for making left turns as hereinafter provided. Entry into such lane for left turns shall not be made more than 100 feet from the point of turning, except that no person shall traverse a street or roadway intersection while operating a vehicle or a motor vehicle in whole or in part in the center lane. There shall be no travel or passing of other traffic in such turning lane. This section is not applicable when passing in the event of an emergency or when directed by a police officer or during construction, striping or pavement of the street or roadway.
- (b) Signs shall be erected at appropriate points as determined by the City Manager designating the center lane as reserved for left turn purposes only. (Ord. 44-96. Passed 5-6-96.)
- (c) Whoever violates any provision of this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor on a first offense; on a second offense within one year after the first offense, the person is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree; on each subsequent offense within one year after the first offense, the person is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree.

335.091 OPERATING WITHOUT DEALER OR MANUFACTURER LICENSE PLATES.

- (a) No person shall operate or cause to be operated upon a public road or highway a motor vehicle of a manufacturer or dealer unless the vehicle carries and displays a placard, except as provided in Ohio R.C. 4503.21, issued by the Director of Public Safety that displays the registration number of its manufacturer or dealer.
- (b) Whoever violates subsection (a) of this section is guilty of illegal operation of a manufacturer's or dealer's motor vehicle, a minor misdemeanor. (ORC 4549.10)

335.10 LICENSE PLATES TO BE UNOBSTRUCTED.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Former Section 335.10 was repealed by Ordinance 112-02, passed August 19, 2002.)

335.11 USE OF ILLEGAL LICENSE PLATES; TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The provisions of former Section 335.11 are now codified in Section 335.09.)

335.111 REGISTRATION WITHIN THIRTY DAYS OF RESIDENCY.

- (a) Within thirty days of becoming a resident of this State, any person who owns a motor vehicle operated or driven upon the public roads or highways shall register the vehicle in this State. If such a person fails to register a vehicle owned by the person, the person shall not operate any motor vehicle in this Municipality under a license issued by another state.
 - (b) (1) Whoever violates subsection (a) of this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor.
 - (2) The offense established under subsection (b)(1) of this section is a strict liability offense and strict liability is a culpable mental state for purposes of Ohio R.C. 2901.20. The designation of this offense as a strict liability offense shall not be construed to imply that any other offense, for which there is no specified degree of culpability, is not a strict liability offense.
- (c) For purposes of subsection (a) of this section, "resident" means any person to whom any of the following applies:
 - (1) The person maintains their principal residence in this State and does not reside in this State as a result of the person's active service in the United States Armed Forces.
 - The person is determined by the Registrar of Motor Vehicles to be a resident in accordance with standards adopted by the Registrar under Ohio R.C. 4507.01. (ORC 4503.111)

335.12 STOPPING AFTER ACCIDENT UPON STREETS; COLLISION WITH UNATTENDED VEHICLE.

(a) (1) In the case of a motor vehicle accident or collision with persons or property on a public road or highway, the operator of the motor vehicle, having knowledge of the accident or collision, immediately shall stop the operator's motor vehicle at the scene of the accident or collision. The operator shall remain at the scene of the accident or collision until the operator has given the operator's name and address and, if the operator is not the owner, the name and address of the owner of that motor vehicle, together with the registered number of that motor vehicle, to all of the following:

- (h) (1) Except as provided in subsection (h)(2) of this section, no person shall operate or be a passenger on a snowmobile or motorcycle without using safety glasses or other protective eye device. Except as provided in subsection (i)(3) of this section, no person who is under the age of eighteen years, or who holds a motorcycle operator's endorsement or license bearing "novice" designation that is currently in effect as provided in Ohio R.C. 4507.13, shall operate a motorcycle on a highway, or be a passenger on a motorcycle, unless wearing a United States Department of Transportation-approved protective helmet on the person's head, and no other person shall be a passenger on a motorcycle operated by such a person unless similarly wearing a protective helmet. The helmet, safety glasses or other protective eye device shall conform with rules adopted by the Ohio Director of Public Safety. The provisions of this subsection or a violation thereof shall not be used in the trial of any civil action.
 - (2) Subsection (h)(1) of this section does not apply to a person operating an autocycle or cab-enclosed motorcycle when the occupant compartment top is in place enclosing the occupants.
- (i) No person shall operate a motorcycle with a valid temporary permit and temporary instruction permit identification card issued by the Ohio Registrar of Motor Vehicles pursuant to Ohio R.C. 4507.05 unless the person, at the time of such operation, is wearing on the person's head a protective helmet that has been approved by the United States Department of Transportation that conforms with rules adopted by the Director.
 - (2) No person shall operate a motorcycle with a valid temporary instruction permit and temporary instruction permit identification card issued by the Registrar pursuant to Ohio R.C. 4507.05 in any of the following circumstances:
 - A. At any time when lighted lights are required by Section 337.02(a)(1);
 - B. While carrying a passenger;
 - C. On any limited access highway or heavily congested roadway.
 - Subsections (i)(1) and (i)(2)A. of this section do not apply to a person who operates or is a passenger in an autocycle or cab-enclosed motorcycle when the occupant compartment top is in place enclosing the occupants.
- (j) Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting the carrying of a child in a seat or trailer that is designed for carrying children and is firmly attached to the bicycle or electric bicycle.
- (k) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to one predicate motor vehicle or traffic offense, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of two or more predicate motor vehicle or traffic offenses, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree. (ORC 4511.53)

373.03 ATTACHING BICYCLE OR SLED TO VEHICLE.

(a) No person riding upon any motorcycle, bicycle, electric bicycle, coaster, roller skates, sled, skateboard or toy vehicle shall attach the same or self to any vehicle upon a roadway.

925.13 RATES.

(a) The following rates are established as a monthly base fee as it relates to City bag refuse service, and shall be charged to each subscriber utilizing or mandated to utilize the City's bag refuse service. Commercial use of residential type recycling service is permitted in accordance with paragraph (c). Nothing in this provision shall be construed as mandating the City to provide refuse service outside its corporate limits.

Inside Corporate Limits \$18.00 Outside Corporate Limits \$24.30

- (b) Each subscriber to the City's bag refuse service will be permitted to have two (2) bags of garbage or refuse, per week, at no additional cost (without necessity of a tag), as part of the established monthly fee paid by all City bag refuse subscribers; thereafter, there will be a charge of \$2.00 per tag that shall be affixed to the outside of each bag after the first two (2) bags as provided for in Section 925.07. Tags may be purchased at the office of the City Utilities Department or at other locations as may be designated.
- (c) Commercial recycling service when provided by the City, in or outside the corporation limits, shall be at the rate of \$18.00 per month for up to six residential type recycling bins with additional bins, up to ten in total, at the rate of \$1.00 per month for each additional bin over six. Levels of service shall be established on an annual basis.
- Low occupancy: The City will allow residential customers to request a partial credit on the monthly refuse charge provided the residential customer demonstrates and/or proves that no garbage was generated during the entire month and/or billing cycle. Proof will be in the form of a sworn affidavit signed and notarized by the residential customer stating the reason for nongeneration of garbage and requesting a partial credit for the period of the billing cycle. Refuse charge will remain on the monthly bill and requests must be made after each billing cycle, and no later than sixty (60) days after the utility bill "billing due date" for which the request of is being made. Proof will be subject to verification by the Refuse Collection Department in operations. Additionally, the customer's utility account will be checked for consumption history of electric, water, and sewer. If consumption history is minimal for electric and there is neither water nor sewer consumption during the time period of the billing the request will be approved. However, if there is average or normal consumption history for electricity or there is water or sewer usage the request will not be approved. Approved requests will be credited to the customer account on the next earliest possible billing. However, the customer will not receive any credit for special sanitation services as established in Section 925.17(b). The customer's affidavit is only valid for six (6) months and must be renewed thereafter. Affidavit forms will be provided upon request. (Ord. 007-20. Passed 4-6-20.)

925.14 RULES AND REGULATIONS.

- (a) The City may promulgate other rules and regulations not inconsistent herewith, pertaining to the collection and disposal of solid waste, garbage, refuse, rubbish, yard waste, hazardous waste, and all other waste herein mentioned or not, as may be deemed advisable.
- (b) The City may establish rates for exceptional classifications not herein provided for. Collections may be discontinued whenever it shall appear that a person receiving service has violated any of the provisions of this chapter or any of the rules and regulations provided for herein, or has failed to pay the charges for service billed to him. Sanitation Department collection crews will carry information tags to place on container advising of infractions of the rules and regulations when a violation is found. However, the failure to place an information tag on the container does not bar prosecution of a violation.

- (c) The Board of Public Affairs, in and for the City, shall recommend rules and regulations governing the disposal and dumping at a yard waste collection site of the City that may be adopted by resolution or ordinance of Council. Any rules and regulations in effect prior to the adoption of this chapter shall remain valid. Said rules and regulations shall be posted in a conspicuous place at the yard waste site and shall be filed with the office of the City's Finance Director. Said rules and regulations shall be strictly complied with by all persons. It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to fail to comply with the rules and regulations so established.
- (d) The City Manager or his designated agent of the City shall enforce this chapter and make all reasonable effort to discover alleged violators, notify the proper prosecuting authority whenever the City Manager has reasonable grounds to believe that a violation has occurred, act as a complainant in the prosecution thereof, and aid officers to the best of his ability in prosecutions. The City Manager shall direct the employees of the City's Sanitation Department to make the investigations and inspections. (Ord. 28-95. Passed 4-3-95.)

925.15 UNAUTHORIZED REMOVAL OF GARBAGE OR REFUSE.

Except as provided for in Section 925.06, it shall be unlawful for any person, other than a duly authorized employee of the City Sanitation Department or an authorized licensed collection service, to take, collect, or remove any garbage, refuse, rubbish or other waste, herein mentioned or not, of another which has been placed for collection or disposal. (Ord. 28-95.) Passed 4-3-95.)

925.16 PURCHASE OF TAGS AND UTILITY PAYMENTS

- (a) Tags shall be purchased in advance from the Utilities Department of the City or their designated agent and, when required, shall be firmly affixed to the bag containing the garbage or refuse. If no tag is found affixed at time of scheduled collection (except for the two (2) weekly bags of garbage or refuse that is allowed at no additional charge by the City), the garbage or refuse will not be collected.
- (b) If a customer makes payment on or before the due date of a bill to an agent designated or authorized by the public utility to accept payment, the payment shall not be considered past due regardless of whether or not it is received in the company offices by the due date. (ORC. 4905.775) (Ord. 007-20. Passed 4-6-20.)

925.17 CHARGE FOR SPECIAL SANITATION SERVICES.

- (a) No additional fee, except as may be otherwise provided in this chapter, shall be charged to subscribers utilizing the City's bag refuse service within the corporation limits of the City for the purpose of providing the following special sanitation services:
 - (1) The City's seasonal pickup program at a time or times as determined by the City;
 - (2) Limited leaf collection each year;
 - (3) Mosquito control (within the City);
 - (4) Specially-announced pickups for storm debris;
 - (5) Yard-waste drop-off site operation;
 - (6) Equipment and supply costs for a curbside recycling program;
 - (7) Operating costs for a curbside recycling program;
 - (8) Pickup of public garbage containers (within the City).
- (b) The sum of \$5.00 per month shall be charged to all electric utility accounts, other than all subscribers utilizing the City's bag refuse service as provided in division (a) above, within the corporation limits of the City for the purpose of providing the following special sanitation services:
 - (1) Mosquito control;
 - (2) Specially-announced pickups for storm debris;

Reciprocity Survey Results

City Manager Joel L. Mazur

A proposal to change the City's reciprocity percentage has been discussed since November 2019. A few months ago, a member of Council asked staff to put together a survey to get a sample from our citizens to hopefully aid in your decision.

Finance Director Kelly O'Boyle

Attached please find a Reciprocity Information Summary and the Survey Results from the online survey that was posted on Facebook to assist Council in deciding what direction is best for the City.

Law Director Billy D. Harmon

Please keep in mind the following when reviewing the survey results:

Public Works Director Chad E. Lulfs, P.E., P.S.

- Small sample of population took the survey of which a smaller sample of those would be affected by this change.
- This was only posted on Facebook, which limits people that do not use social media or online resources.
- Unable to determine if someone took the survey multiple times.
- Due to COVID-19, people may not have been comfortable committing to coming to a future open house meeting.

I want to thank our team that worked together to gather information and figures to provide Council with the tools to make your decision. Thank you for your consideration of this important matter for the City.

RECAP OF RECIPROCITY PROPOSED CHANGE

- **What is it?** The amount of Income Tax credit given to someone who lives in the City of Napoleon but works outside the City limits. Currently the reciprocity amount is 100%.
- **Proposal**? Recommend adjusting the Reciprocity credit to 50% from 100%
- ♣ Generate? Estimated to generate approximately \$392K a year. COVID-19 will likely affect this amount. This would be split between Recreation (.2%) and General Fund and Capital based on Council approved split after Recreation removed. 2020 split is 65% General Fund and 35% Capital.
- **How many City of Napoleon residents will it effect?** 2,638 maybe around 2,100 actual people
- **How much will it cost to those effected?** Estimated at \$7.50 per \$1,000 of income
- ♣ **Proposed uses of additional funds?** Pay for 1 full-time firefighter, 1 part-time fire fighter, 1 full-time dispatcher, road construction and assist with balancing the General Fund Budget as available/needed.
- ▶ Need for additional firefighters and dispatcher? As demonstrated in prior Safety & Human Resources Committee meetings and to Full Council, the number and type of calls has increased significantly over the years. The staffing issues of the Police and Fire Department are even more pressing with COVID-19. These Departments are very proud of the services they provide the citizens and feel that to continue the level of service, modifications to staffing need to be addressed.
- **Cost of 1 Full-time Firefighter?** Projected salary and benefits for 1st Year is \$72,635 and grows to \$92,630 for the 4th Year. Net the 24% Township reimbursement per contract is \$55,203 to \$70,399.
- **Cost of 1 Part-Time Firefighter?** Projected range for salary and benefits for the 12-hour shift is \$72,917 \$77,380. Net the 24% Township reimbursement per contract is \$55,417 \$58,809.
- **Cost of 1 Full-Time Dispatcher?** Projected salary and benefits for 1st Year is \$62,044 and grows to \$81,689 for the 4th Year. Net the conservative projection for savings in overtime of \$12K per year with the 6th Dispatcher is \$50,044 \$69,689.
- **Additional for Roads?** Additional paving per year depending on cost of materials and labor at that time.

- **4 2020 Revenue Estimate vs. 2020 Budget?** \$6,384,094 vs. \$7,039,366 difference of \$655,272 from cash balance. Historically underspend budget and receive more revenue. During 2020 Budget process, appropriation was reduced to come closer to revenue estimate so less underspend possible. Revenue may not be more due to COVID-19 in the areas of Income Tax and Interest Income. We are monitoring and providing information to Council as we receive.
- ♣ Why need Cash Balance? Healthy cash balance is needed to sustain downturns in the economy and for cash flow purposes. Revenue received at different points throughout the year, but expenses are going out monthly with the largest being payroll, payroll taxes and benefits. This would assist in not "dipping" as far into the cash balance each year.
- **COVID-19?** When this very important conversation was started in November 2019 our world looked different than it does today. No one would have ever imagined a pandemic would affect the City of Napoleon or our lives as it has these last few months and will continue to for an unknown amount of time. The dollars generated from this change will not only allow the City to address these concerns but may also have to play a role in maintaining the service level for the next year until the economy bounces back.
- ♣ Do the residents who work outside the City still receive the services? Yes, they still have all services available to them. The problem is that the residents who live and work in the City are paying for them to have those services.
- What happens if vote "No" to adjust Reciprocity? Funding will not be available for additional Firefighters and a dispatcher, money to cover shortfall in General Fund not available and less money for roads. We will likely continue to <u>lose good, trained staff</u> to other jurisdictions who have more employees to reduce the stress.
- ♣ Other Solutions? SAFER Grant was explored, but not feasible for the City at this time. Reductions in service levels to stay with-in anticipated revenue? Revise the General Fund vs. Capital split for the Income Tax? Place an increase for the Income Tax on the ballot to generate the necessary revenue needed to provide all the services? Place a levy on the ballot for operations of the police and fire departments as other jurisdictions do? Reduce staffing in non-emergency service area to offset the shortfalls? Look at a phased approach to the reciprocity or a period of three years? Look at a combination of a levy and reciprocity percentage? Other options?

Thank you for your consideration of this important issue. We are well aware of the magnitude of this decision for Council. We are confident in the ability of this Council to lead and do what is best for the City and to ensure success of the City for many years to come.





The information in this document includes results from the reciprocity survey. The results were screened to those who are residents of the City of Napoleon.


This resulted in a total of 162 survey responses from residents of Napoleon. According to the 2010 census this would be 1.85% of the total population based on a population of 8,749 people. Of the 162 responses there were 90 people that responded to the survey that would be directly impacted. 



CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Etzler called the Tree Commission meeting to order at 6:00 pm.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Hearing no objections or corrections, the minutes from the March 16, 2020 Tree Commission meeting stand approved as presented.

TREE CALL REPORTS

Lulfs said there were five new call tree calls. 1442 Oakdale, 1 Yeager Court, 1448 Oakwood Drive, 644 Welsted and 527 Sheffield. The tree on Sheffield is dropping limbs and appears to have a lot of ants. We are going to take a look at that tree this week and see if it is an issue that needs to be addressed this fall. Etzler noted we have had a lot of calls on Sheffield, is that the same place? Deblin said this is a new call. Volkman asked if there was any storm damage? Lulfs said there was some storm damage and there is a potential insurance claim on Webster. We do plan on removing that tree this fall. Deblin confirmed we are planning on removing that tree unless Jamie Howe has other advice. Lulfs said we asked Howe to take a look at that tree but have not heard back from him.

FALL PLANTINGS

Lulfs reported right now we only have three fall plantings on the list, there are two on Rohrs Street and one on Welsted. We are running short on the budget for tree trimming and our recommendation would be to forego the fall tree plantings until the spring. Etzler asked how many trees were planted in the spring this year? Deblin informed the commission fourteen trees were planted this spring.

FALL REMOVALS

Lulfs said there are ten trees and eleven stumps on the list. We asked the Electric Department if they have any stumps to be removed and have not heard back from them. There are two (2) very large trees,

one is on Pontious close to First Street, we are estimating that tree alone to cost \$1,800 for removal. The tree on Webster is similar in size, there is a large silver maple on West Clinton and another one on Park Street. There are other trees but, those are the largest ones on the list. The trees on Pontious and Webster have both been dropping large limbs. The tree on Webster has caused some damage. The removals and topsoil are scheduled to go out for bid on July 27, 2020. We asking for approval of the list as we have it and if something comes in from the Electric Department, we may add that to the list and request the Electric Department to cover that cost. Etzler asked what do you estimate the cost to be for removal of the ten trees and eleven stumps? Lulfs said \$8,450.00. Clausing asked about the tree on Sheffield at the corner of Strong Street. Deblin said when Tawa trimmed the limb off, they found the limb was hollow. There are not any other signs of decay so, we were going to hold off and monitor that tree for now. There was another one at the corner of Park that Tawa recommended be removed and that one is coming out but, not the one at Strong and Sheffield.

TOPSOIL

Lulfs reported there are 22 locations with 28 holes on the topsoil list. The estimated cost is \$2,500. Did we move to do topsoil once a year now? Deblin said we were going to do topsoil once a year, but this year we tried to do it twice to get caught up. The \$2,500 is a not-to-exceed price. We do not anticipate having to spend the whole \$2,500 but, it will be close. The cost in the spring was \$80 for each hole.

FALL TRIMMING

Lulfs stated the tree removals and topsoil go out for bid on July 27, 2020. When those bids come in, we will not have put out our trimming list yet. We planned to budget \$13,000 for trimming, we do not have \$13,000 available at this time. However, if the other projects come in low, we would like to use the remaining amount in the fund for trimming. Right now we are short \$1,800 of our \$13,000 budget. The trimming is bid on an hourly rate basis and the contractor trims until they are out of time. It is based on the budget number so having it as our last item to bid we can up the budget to what we have. The area we are planning to trim is Glenwood on the left, the railroad tracks on the North except we are not doing Woodlawn. Then south of Woodlawn over to Scott Street. Deblin commented we can review and approve the Fall Tree Trimming list at the next meeting.

Etzler asked about the newer trees on Woodlawn. Those trees should be big enough that if there are any branches that may be difficult to mow under or are causing problems to the property owners in that area, that if the commissioners want to go out, we can go out and prune them. Lulfs noted if any of you

do spend time out there, please let us know so we can log your time of volunteer hours for the Tree City USA application.

ARBOR DAY

Lulfs said Arbor Day was delayed in the Spring. We had originally hoped to do something this Fall. This year the requirement has been waived to have Arbor Day as a Tree City USA qualification. You are not required to have a ceremony or a planting. If we do not do a fall planting, we can still have Arbor Day but it is not necessary to have Arbor Day for Tree City USA. I don't know if ODNR will encourage it as they are still not holding any in-person events with the pandemic. We do not have to make a decision this evening, that may be something to reconsider next month or cancel. Etzler asked if the tree in the spring was planted? Deblin replied the tree was planted, we were going to do a different location with a different tree for Arbor Day. The spring plantings were done the first couple of weeks of the pandemic. Etzler said Stephanie Miller from ODNR had ideas for possible alternatives to group gatherings for Arbor Day Celebration we can bring up next meeting.

OTHER MATTERS

Lulfs said the Tree Academy has not been rescheduled. If there are any members that want to go to the next class, we can get you on the list.

Etzler welcomed Molly Knepley as City Council's representative on the Tree Commission.





Energy market update

The September 2020 natural gas contract decreased \$0.026/MMBtu to close at \$2.165 yesterday. The EIA reported an injection of 33 Bcf for the week ending July 31, which was above market expectations of 30 Bcf. The year-ago build was 58 Bcf and the five-year average was 33 Bcf. Storage is now 3,274 Bcf, 22.5 percent above a year ago and 15.1 percent above the five-year average. The natural gas seasonal injection running total is +1,288 Bcf versus the five-year average of +1,151 Bcf.

OML UPDATE AT-A-GLANCE

Here are the top three things you need to know from this past week:

- The National League of Cities (NLC) released its 35th City Fiscal Conditions
 report, which provides insight into the fiscal health of local governments across
 the nation. According to the report, cities are experiencing the fiscal impacts of
 the COVID-19 pandemic at an unprecedented speed and it will take years for
 municipal budgets recover from the impact. You can read a one-pager HERE and
 the full report HERE.
- Gov. DeWine has decided Ohio will not be kicking in \$100 a week on top of an additional \$300 a week in federal unemployment benefits to COVID-19-impacted unemployed workers. An executive order signed by President Trump that offers states additional federal jobless assistance was initially a \$400 a week unemployment benefits boost, but that required states to kick in \$100 of that amount, which Gov. DeWine says Ohio's budget cannot afford. The figure has been reduced to \$300 per week on top of existing state benefits after Ohio and other states said they could not afford the new payments.
- No progress has been made on a phase 4 coronavirus relief aid bill as Congress recesses for the month of August. Both Republicans and Democrats say they have made no progress toward an agreement. The U.S. Senate will not return for the rest of the month after ending its session this Thursday, while the U.S. House of

Representatives have already left Washington for the entire month. There is currently no word on when negotiations will restart.

LEAGUE THANKS PRESENTERS AND ATTENDEES FOR JOINING OML/NLC WEBINAR ON RACIAL EQUITY

The League wants to thank all those who took the time to participate in our webinar on racial equality on Wednesday, which was hosted jointly by the League and the National League of Cities (NLC). We also want to thank the webinar's presenters for giving participants valuable information on how local leaders can advance racial equity within their own communities.

Attendees had the opportunity to hear from NLC's Race Equity and Leadership (REAL) Director Leon Andrews, who gave a compelling and informative presentation outlining the need for greater racial equity. During his presentation, Andrews explained that the mission of REAL is to help strengthen local leaders' knowledge as well as their capacity to understand their role in eliminating racial disparity, healing racial tension and building more equitable communities.

The webinar also included a panel discussion featuring Athens Mayor Steve Patterson and Akron Councilmember Russel C. Neal, Jr., to highlight examples of local leadership. It was also announced that they will both co-chair the working group being formed by the League as part of our continuing efforts to provide best resources, information and network opportunities to advance racial equity in our local communities.

OHIO COVID-19 RESPONSE UPDATE

- As of this Thursday, Ohio is reporting 105,426 cases of coronavirus, 3,755 deaths, 12,023 hospitalizations and 2,743 ICU admissions.
- Gov. DeWine released this week's new Ohio Public Health Advisory System map:
 - Upgraded to Level 3 (Red): Brown, Clermont, Muskingum
 - **Remaining at Level 3 (Red):** Cuyahoga, Erie, Fairfield, Franklin, Licking, Lucas, Marion, Mercer, and Montgomery
 - Downgraded to Level 2 (Orange): Allen and Medina
 - **Downgraded to Level 1 (Yellow):** Adams, Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Knox, Lake, Paulding, and Williams

• There are no counties on Ohio's Watch List

Minority Health Strike Force Update:

- Governor DeWine released the final Minority Health Strike Force report and the state's executive response. The Minority Health Strike Force was formed in April to examine the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on minority communities, as well as broader health disparities and racial injustices. The COVID-19 Minority Health Strike Force Blueprint lists 34 recommendations on dismantling racism, removing public health obstacles, improving the social/economic and physical environments, and strengthening data collection to better track disparities.
- In response to the Strike Force's report, Gov. DeWine issued Ohio's Executive Response: A Plan of Action to Advance Equity. The action plan outlines efforts to reinforce the DeWine Administration's commitment to advancing health equity and establishing Ohio as a model for justice, equity, opportunity, and resilience.
- As part of his commitment to equity, Gov. DeWine also announced the creation of the new Ohio Governor's Equity Advisory Board. The Board will work to improve Ohio's work to dismantle racism and promote health equity. Board members will draw on the expertise within Ohio's communities of color and will represent diverse viewpoints from sectors like education, healthcare, public and private business, community organizations, and members of the criminal justice community.

Job and Employment Updates:

- Ohioans filed 20,969 initial jobless claims last week, according to statistics the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) reported to the U.S. Dept. of Labor today. This was 253,246 fewer than the peak earlier this year. Ohioans filed 374,751 continued jobless claims last week, which were 401,551 fewer than the peak earlier this year.
- Over the last 21 weeks, ODJFS has distributed more than \$5.9 billion in unemployment compensation payments to more than 778,000 Ohioans. Of the more than 1 million applications the agency has received, about 94% have been processed, with about 6% pending. In addition, ODJFS has issued more than \$5 billion in Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) payments to more than \$14,000 PUA claimants.

Education Updates:

- Governor DeWine continued to stress the importance of masks, social distancing, and proper hygiene as Ohio's school students approach the start of the upcoming school year. Currently, Ohio has left the decision to individual school districts on how to approach the new school year.
- According to information gathered by the Ohio Department of Education, 325 public school districts in Ohio are planning to return to school full-time which equates to approximately 590,000 students. A total of 55 districts representing approximately 398,000 public school students will begin the school year remotely. Approximately 380,000 students in 154 public school districts will start the school year with a hybrid of online and in-person learning. Information on 78 public school distracts was not readily available. Attached is the education model planned for the start of SY21.
- Schools can begin applying for the new BroadbandOhio Connectivity Grant on Monday, August 10. A total of \$50 million will be allocated through the grant program to help provide hotspots and internet-enabled devices to students. The application period will close Friday, August 21st.

Other Updates:

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• Governor DeWine shared updated data on the percentage of cases in Ohio by age group. The data shows a significant increase in positive cases among younger adults over the summer, particularly in the age range of 20-29. Attached is a graph with the percentage of cases by age group.
