Garringer stated during the life time of this program they have had over \$2.1 million in customer savings and the program only cost us \$719,000, which is a 114% return on investments. Lulfs stated nothing has been changed since the first read. This allows for non-bargaining personnel to receive overtime pay after 8 hours instead of after a 40 hour week. We've run into some issues with the scheduling of overtime at the police department and the engineering department with employees not getting overtime when they are required to work on holidays. This just cleans it up to make it more similar to the contracts that we have in place with the bargaining units.

Lulfs stated this legislation would adjust the upper end of the pay scale for the Municipal Court Bailiff. They have had issues retaining personnel out there. After reviewing pay in the area for similar positions we discovered we were low. This is to bring the scale to the range of municipalities of our size. Durham stated Harmon sent out an email earlier in the week addressing this. Thank you for that clarity, I appreciated it. I reached out to Garringer to get some clarity on this because I felt like it was coming at a weird time with budget right around the corner. Also, I felt like we had addressed this topic relatively recently. I did a little bit of research into it and Ordinance 001-21 was effective in February of last year. We took the top of the pay from \$1,450 for every 80 hours to \$1,730, which was a jump of about \$9,000 in salary. This most recent legislation is an additional \$15,000 worth of salary added to the top. That is where my questing came in. We're raising it 41% over a two year period. It is my understanding that the bailiff has only been employed for a two year period. I don't know if he was aware of the pay grade coming in or if it just wasn't properly explained, but it seems to be a dramatic increase in my opinion. Maassel asked Harmon if the Judge could basically set it herself? Harmon replied by statue unless it's horribly unreasonable the Judge can set the pay scale for the bailiff. It doesn't really matter much if Council agrees or disagrees. Potentially we would have an argument if she were to triple it, but in this situation I don't think we would have much to say.

That doesn't happen on accident. It happens from all the work put in over a three year period not letting things fester. Continuous conversation throughout is the key. Lulfs stated earlier this year I was made aware that the State of Ohio was planning to pave State Route 110 from Route 109 up to the City's Corporation Limits. I reached out to them to acquire if they would pave inside the City Limits to State Route 108, which they agreed. Garringer and I have incorporated those cost into the proposed 2023 budget. We will see a large saving getting in a paving program with ODOT. This legislation would allow us to enter into a program and financially participate in the work that is being done. I request this be approved, so we can allow that project to be extended to State Route 108 (S. Perry St.). Siclair asked what the savings to the City would be? Lulfs replied we projected the savings to be somewhere around \$200,000. Right now I believe the number we have in the budget is \$250,000. We are looking at over \$400,000 if we paved it ourselves.

Mack stated the Fire Department is continuing to build out our MARCS Radio, which is our 700 and 800 systems. Chief Frey would like to apply for a fire marshals grant that would cover the costs of a few radios. There are some upgrades with encryptions that are going to be occurring, which we've been notified of for a couple of years. It's happening State wide and some of the older radios that we didn't get replaced in the initial rollout a few years ago won't take that encryption, so this will take care of that and some user fees. Chief Frey stated we would like to apply in total for \$47,531.20 for the MARCS Radio grant. The State Fire Marshal's Office always opens this grant once a year and we weren't expect it to be in place this year. The idea is to get 14 new mobiles that will already have the dual layer identification that we need and the programing. I'm also going to be applying for user fees for our current radios and the upgrades we need for our current radios that we got when we went to the Lucas County system to be able to have the dual layer of identification in them and the programing for it too. Hopefully we get it. They are known to cut out things so they might cut out the radios, but give us all the

programing fees. I'm in coordination with all the other departments in Henry County except for one, who wants to go in as a region for the grant as well. If we had the last department we could apply as a county wide project, which would give more points. Our idea is to go in as a regional approach for the interoperable abilities and the county's that we mutual aid with. Maassel asked if there was a match component. Frey replied no. Harmon advised that previous years required legislation. Are you asking for legislation? Frey replied no, just a simple motion. It's a real easy one page online application. We have a Chiefs meeting on Wednesday to discuss it a little further with all the departments and then hopefully we will all hit submit on Thursday.

#### Change Order No. 1 for VanHyning Pumping Station Replacement.

Lulfs stated during the course of building the VanHyning Pump Station the replacement of that pump station requires the construction of a wet well, which is just as it sounds a big hole in the ground that's concreate that's wet. That is where the sewage collects that we pump out to send it to the Waste Water Plant. The wet well is approximately 47 feet deep and while we were excavating to construct the wet well we hit rock at 15 feet. We had a contingency line item in the bid for only 20 cubic yards in there just so we could get a price, but we ended up excavating an additional 356 cubic yards of rock. It's a big change order of \$168,000. However with the bid price for the project and the contingency funds we have over half a million dollars of contingency funds in the loan agreement, so this will be covered within that loan. This is finance through DEFA, I believe it's at 0.66% interest. To date we've had no other price increases on the project, but we can't build the pump station without the rock being excavated. I'm asking for the approval of Change Order No. 1 for \$168,000.

#### On recommendation to approve the GIS Position

Lulfs stated this item was taken to committee and was recommended to bring to Council to move forward. Essentially the Engineering Department is spending more money each year to hire consultants to preform our GIS tasks and we would like to create a GIS position in house. We've had the position approved by Council in the past, but there was never a pay classification to put them in. We've restructured our pay classifications. We have the engineering technician, senior engineering technician, staff engineer and licensed staff engineer. Those are the relevant positions we're looking to modify. We looked at surrounding communities pay scales. We lowered the scale a little bit for the engineering technician, which is basically a position straight out of high school without formal education required. We increased the staff engineer position by about a dollar per hour. The GIS technician requires minimal training and would mirror the engineering technician pay scale. The senior GIS technicians' pay scale will mirror the staff engineer as both those positions require a 4 year degree. My staff engineer recently resigned. Pay was a factor, but it wasn't the only factor. Maassel asked who the staff engineer was? Lulfs replied Nate Franz who was unlicensed, so he falls in the staff engineer category. We're hoping to create a pay classification for the senior GIS technician and the GIS technician, so that we can advertise and hire someone with a pay classification to put them in. Durham stated this was a position that Jeff Rathge told Knepley and me about when we went on our tour starting Council how desperately in need the position was and how he has been working on GIS updates for years. Lulfs replied I currently have my staff engineer, for another three days, do those updates between projects. He is self-taught because he went to school to be a civil engineer not GIS, but he has picked it up. Once he leaves we will be sending all that to a private firm to get our maps updated. This adds up and I don't think we get as quality of work when we have someone outside doing the work. Maassel stated we had an issue with a resident where they dug for a waterline two different times before finding it in the third spot. That what this GIS does. Lulfs interjected GIS stands for geographic information system. Maassel continued it tells you where to dig, so if a water line breaks you want to be able to dig in the right spot the first time. Lulfs stated when we have a main break Rathge and I would pull out our phones, since we access to GIS on our phones and that's how we know where to find the valves to shut the line down. Maassel stated that's how powerful this stuff is. If we can have someone in house do it that would save us money and you'd have another person to help in the office. I'm 100% for it because were already spending the money. I'd rather spend it on someone who's here versus a firm that is not here. Siclair asked if the pay scale is going to be effective? Lulfs replied yes, Roof did quite a bit of research and it would be competitive in the area. Now, are we going to pull someone out of Columbus? Maybe not, but we're where we need to be. If we struggle I can always ask to come back and add to it, but I won't be able to take away. I prefer to start at these numbers and see how it goes.

**On recommendation to approve the Assistant Police Chief Job Description and Wage Scale Layout** Lulfs stated it has been proposed with some of the changes that we are experiencing at the police department to create an assistant chiefs position. We have lieutenants and sergeants, but we don't currently have an assistance chief positions. With some of the duties already being done as well as retirements it's been discussed to restructure to a position such as this. I will note that in order to keep a 7% different in pay from sergeants, lieutenant, assistant chief and chief we had to restructure all of this pay. Sergeants are set at a certain percentage above patrol and the sergeants were catching the lieutenants. We had to adjust that in the past and now were getting to a point where lieutenants are starting to catch the chief. It's just a side effect of cost of livings for unions versus cost of livings for nonbargaining not matching. Mack stated one of the bigger issues when I took over was not having enough movement for careers. There are almost zero departments in Northwest Ohio or inside the City who doesn't have a second in command. These are job duties that Lt. Legg has been doing. When I took over he participated in the Chief assessments as well as 2-3 other, which was part of what I used to put him in what we call the administrative lieutenant roll. The problem is that he has taken things on and is involved than what our standard lieutenant are doing on a normal bases. He's truly available when I'm not and has taken on that roll, but being compensated the same as the guy doing 8 hours and going home. Lieutenant salaries were adjusted down to take care of the jump between lieutenant and sergeants. Currently our contract is that a first year sergeant gets 10% over patrol and a second year gets 15%. That guickly comes into the lieutenant salary and even all the way up to my salary at this point. I refer to it as the accordion effect over the years. We had a couple of adjustments in lieutenant structure pay scale and this would extend it out for a little bit, but as the years progress we've gotten to the point where were squeezing that accordion down. What we're trying to do is find a long term solution for that and an easier budget concept, so that we know what those numbers are when we're negotiating. Maassel asked if there would still be an admin lieutenant? Mack replied no. When I started the two things I asked for was to replace a couple lieutenants with sergeants, which we did one and now were doing another. We had 4 lieutenant for a long time in my career, but when Mike Brown retired several years ago we went down to 3 lieutenant and when I came on we added that forth supervisor back on. This allowed me to have Lt. Legg in the admin role. Now, we want have an assistant chief, a lieutenant and three sergeants. That way each shift would have a supervisor on it. Baer stated this doesn't require hiring extra personnel. Mack replied this is a restructure and not an additional position request. Maassel asked if the detective is a lieutenant spot? Mack replied no, our detective is a patrol spot and they get an extra I believe 6% above patrol. On a structure of command they are theoretically corporal style in between the sergeants, but they have no rank. Maassel asked if the man unit representative is a sergeant? Mack replied no he is a detective. Currently the two people we had up until Friday was detective Mendez and Detective Augustine. Detective Mendez has moved on to Bryan PD as of Friday, so Detective Augustine has stepped out of the man unit and is working major crime for us now. We are currently down two patrol officers. Maassel asked if that included the officer that was swore in tonight? Mack replied yes, technically we were 3 down when we hired him and now we're 2 down. Harmon advised that this would require legislation. Durham asked Garringer if he had any comments on a financial stand point? Garringer replied yes, but what we need to look at is beyond the finance standpoint. We are not immune to trying to find and keep people. I'm optimistic that this would help our cause with that. To have that many openings just not in that department but other departments it's a sign we need to take care of our people right. It's going to cost us more, but people are leaving for a reason it's not like we have people knocking on our door. We have to make it an incentive for people to stay in my opinion.

#### On recommendation to approve the Operations Wage Restructure

Lulfs stated this is simple to summarize. We have superintendents at the Waste Water Plant, Water Plant and Operations. They all require licenses and in fact the operations superintendent is required to have a license in both water and waste water as well as backflow, yet the operations superintendent is

paid less than the superintendents at the plants. This was an issue when we were trying to hire an assistant because he realized in 3 years he would make as much as the superintendent if he stayed in the union with overtime included. All we're proposing is not the creation of a new scale, but to adjust the operations superintendent scale to match the superintendent at the two plants. The top of the scale at the plants is \$34.63 and the top of the scale at ops is \$33.28. It's not a large increase, but it gives us a little more room between the operations superintendent and the foreman. Again we didn't want to create a new scale we just wanted to match the scale at the other plants. Maassel asked if that was a non-bargaining position? Lulfs replied yes. This would not affect the current temporary assistant position, which has already been established. It gives that individual something more to look forward to as they progress over the years. Maassel asked if we are just adjusting the top? Is the new operations superintendent going to start at the top of the scale? Lulfs replied no. I told him I wouldn't start him at the top of the scale, but he would be in the scale. Personally I like to see department heads work their way towards it. Traditionally we haven't started at the top. Maassel replied we shouldn't be. That's why I wanted to make sure. Durham stated I personally don't like the timing of these request, but I understand something has to be addressed. Last year when we assembled the ADHOC Committee for Compensation I think we were making progress. I don't know if it's something we have to look back into. Obviously this went to Safety and Human Resources, but I think to review compensation across the board might not be a bad idea moving into 2023. I really enjoy these presentations, so thank you Roof for all the research that you've done to prepare those and gather the info. It would definitely make that committee much easier. It's something for Council to consider moving forward. Roof stated I would like to bring awareness when we look at contracts. I think we forget to look at the administrative staff that's over top of it and I think that what Chief is talking about with the accordion effect that happens. Then we have to catch ourselves up in the future, so going forward I think all the administration with unions underneath it would be good to look at their wages every three years with the contracts. Just to make sure that adjustment is there so were not struggling to catch up. Overall it would save us more money than to catch up in the future. Siclair replied we did talk about doing a three year review for salaries, so that would make sense. Maassel stated it would be good to have a new city manager in that to give an idea.

#### Award of Orwig Avenue & W. Main Street Waterline Improvements project

Lulfs stated last Wednesday we opened bids for the Orwig and W Main waterline project. The engineers estimate for the project was \$440,000 and the project consisted of replacing the waterline on Orwig from Welsted to W. Washington and Main St. from Sheffield to Orwig. Something to note on this is that on a property on W. Main St. we've had 5 main breaks in their front yard. I believe on these 4 blocks we've had somewhere in the neighborhood of 12-15 water main breaks in the last 10 years. We received four bids and the lowest bidder was Salenbien Trucking and Excavating. I've verified their bid and went through it line by line. I believe it to be a solid bid. It is my recommendation to award the project to Salenbien Trucking and Excavating in the amount of \$387,697. The completion date for this

project is the end of October of 2023. Maassel asked where the group is out of? Lulfs replied Dundee, MI. They are the ones that did American Rd last year. When I reviewed their work history they had three different waterline projects each between \$3-8 Million in Michigan. They have a lot of waterline experience, but they haven't done a waterline for us. The American Rd project went smoothly overall. Maassel asked if the road would be tore up to do this? Lulfs replied the waterline on Orwig is on the westerly side of the road between the curb and the houses and on W Main it's on the north side of the road in the boulevard. We do drop into the Sheffield intersection to make our connections, but most of the work will be in the grass. We will be putting services across the road. Maassel stated unless we would cut the road, put it underneath there and patch. Lulfs stated we will either cut it or allow the contractors to push the services. If they push then we pay them for the asphalt they would have removed and replaced, but we usually leave it up to the contractor.

**Feasibility Study (**refer to Municipal Properties, Building, Land Use & Economic Development Committee**)** Lulfs stated we are looking to request this item to the Municipal Properties, Building, Land Use & Economic Development Committee. We would really like Chief O'Brien to participate in that meeting before he takes on new adventures. O'Brien stated we have worked with Mull & Weithman for the last year and a half on this project. I think we've put together a good plan to at least give us something to discuss a little bit further. Between Lulfs, Mack and myself I really appreciate the opportunity to be here to discuss it. Durham asked if the Chair is okay with that being assigned? Knepley replied yes.

#### Safety Services Strategic Plan (refer to Safety and Human Resources Committee)

O'Brien stated I will not be here that day, but it will be done and ready to go. I've discussed this a lot with Assistant Chief Frey and Chief Mack. We're putting it all together, so it will be completed and ready to go. It's just up to them to present it. Durham asked if the Chair is okay with that being assigned? Baer replied yes.

#### AROUND THE TABLE

Baer-I have nothing.

Haase- I have nothing.

Cordes- I have nothing.

Harmon- Nothing for me.

Lulfs- I'm all set. Thank you.

Garringer- A fair warning is that we have Budget Hearing coming up Friday and Saturday. Hopefully they go as smooth as last year. I'm anticipating that they will, but my warning is that you're going to see something's that are needs not wants and it's going to be very tight. I'll just leave it at that. There will be some decisions to make in those two days.

Knepley- Chief O'Brien is this our last Council meeting with you? O'Brien replied no, I'll have one more. Knepley stated never mind then I'll save it.

Siclair-First of all the bike path is looking awesome and I've had several people talk to me about that. Lulfs stated just to clarify the intent is to complete everything by Thanksgiving, except for the hill going down in will sit until spring. Siclair asked what the crossing would be over Riverview from Jahns to the path? Lulfs replied a stripped crosswalk with crossing beacons similar to Westmoreland are to be installed at the crosswalk. I believe a similar beacon will be installed at the crosswalk near the railroad as well. Maassel asked if we need to slow down traffic at the crossing from 40mph to 35mph? Lulfs replied I would recommend to see how it goes, 40-35 isn't a big change. I don't know if changing the speed limit by 5 miles an hour, which is probably the max we could do, if it would have a lot of effect. I recommend letting it in for a while and if we have an issue we can address it. Mack stated I would like to wait and see as well. There are some other things we can consider in that area as well, but lets see how it goes first. Siclair stated I would also like to thank Lulfs for seeing an opportunity to get the paving done on West Maumee. I appreciate that. Lulfs replied thank you, I like inexpensive. Siclair stated I haven't been up to look at it myself, but I received a complaint about potholes in the crosswalk on Scott st and Washington by the Post Office. Lulfs replied we can take a look at that, but you'll find out on Friday that is one of the streets I am proposing to pave next year. We can take a look at that and if there is something that needs addressed before winter we will take care of it. Siclair stated I think that there is only the approval of the PSCAF on the Electric Committee meeting on Monday, so I would like cancel and move the other meetings up.

Haase-I have a mulligan. Is it street right of way for the property owner who are losing yardage on Jahns? Lulfs replied yes, it's street right of way. Haase stated I know property owners are supposed to take care of sidewalks. Are they going to be forced to take care of that? Lulfs replied yes. The path on Riverview because of its width will be addressed by the Parks and Rec Department, but the walk on Jahns road is technically a sidewalk will be the responsibility of the property owners. Haase stated that is putting a pretty good load on them. There's going to be some static over that. Siclair replied possibly, but I think it's a better benefit to so many people walking up and down that street.

Maassel-Tomorrow is Election Day, so if you haven't voted please go out and do so tomorrow. The nicest part about that besides getting that vote done is getting all those political ads off every piece of paper that I have seen recently. When you sat down today there was a choice of lunches for Friday. Please give your order to Flogaus before you leave tonight. Do you know what the status of Brownfield is, Lulfs? Lulfs replied I was in communication with the representative from the Ohio DOD late last week. The representative has recommended approval of this to his boss and are awaiting signatures, but there has not been a formal award at this time. I spoke to Dennis Miller at Maumee Valley today. He called me and told me we were on the list, but we have not received confirmation. Until we have the confirmation we can't move forward with anything, but I'll say it looks good. Maassel stated I see that the school board is considering litigation against the CCHC to make them do what they said they were going to do. I think the School Board is in the right. I would like to have something in our Council meeting next time saying that we support the School Board in making the CCHC do what they said they were going to do. Harmon stated I can draft a Resolution. Maassel replied then we can vote on it the 21<sup>st</sup> it's probably just a simple one time vote to see where we're at with that. It doesn't cost us anything, but it say that we support what they're doing. I have a few questions about housing. I know we can't have a tiny house on a property that is in a residential area, but can you put one in an area that's a R-4? Lulfs replied I can look at the code. I know there are some restrictions on the square footage of building the house versus square footage of the property itself. Specifically in a R-4? Maassel replied no, is there a residential thing that will allow for a tiny house right now? Lulfs replied to the best of my knowledge it's just considered a residential unit as long as you have the requirements, which is generally living space and a bathroom. I think there wouldn't be any difference to that and a normal house. The only square footage

requirement is that you can't have too much square footage on the house if you have a small property. I can review that with the zoning administrator just to verify. Maassel stated I was just curios obviously housing is a big thing and if tiny houses are the way to go. Typically at this time we do a Resolution to extend the provisions contained in the housing moratorium that we put on every year. It's a temporary reductions for temporary elimination of certain residential buildings, permit fees and declaring and emergency. We usually do this on an annually bases to remind ourselves and to also remind builders that we're not trying to nickel and dime them for every little fee. I would like to see this on the next Council agenda. Harmon stated if I can just get an official vote from Council. If we could do both of them now please.

Maassel asked Lulfs if he put in a number in for raises for non-bargaining? Lulfs replied yes. Roof stated 3.5%, just so there was something in the spreadsheet. Whatever you would like to change it to would automatically adjust down, but we just left it at 3.5% the same as AFSCME. Maassel stated we'll leave it at that until we're all here for Council to go into executive session to see what we want to do. Garringer stated positions that are not filled are being budgeted for too. There are place holders in our personnel tab that will say vacant. We also put in the family insurance. Roof stated we put the pay at the highest max, so its worst case scenario.

Durham- I have a few other request for items to be referred to a committee. For Safety and Human Resources the restructure of the clerk of councils position and the new admin assistant to public safety. As long as Baer is okay with that we'll get those assigned. Baer had no objections. For Municipal Properties, ODOT acquisition of City Property for US Route 24 projects. As long as Knepley is okay with that we'll get those assigned. Last thing I have is that Chief O'Brien will sadly be leaving, but we will be having a sendoff for him on the 17<sup>th</sup> from 11am-2pm at the Fire Station. If you're able to do so please attend.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 064-22**

#### AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE NON-BARGAINING POSITION OF GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEMS (GIS) TECHNICIAN/SENIOR TECHNICIAN FOR THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

**WHEREAS**, Council previously adopted Ordinance No. 053-21, creating a 2022 Classification Pay Plan for its non-bargaining employees; and,

WHEREAS, the Safety and Human Resources Committee met on October 24, 2022 and approved the creation of the position of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Technician/Senior Technician for the City of Napoleon, Ohio, effective January 1, 2023, and unanimously recommended said position be approved by Council; and,

WHEREAS, Council now desires to create the non-bargaining position entitled "Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Technician/Senior Technician" for the City of Napoleon, Ohio effective from January 1, 2023; Now Therefore,

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, notwithstanding any Ordinance or Resolution to the contrary, the City of Napoleon, Ohio had previously established a new 2022 Position Classification Pay Plan for its non-bargaining employees, Ordinance No. 053-21 passed by Council on December 20, 2021.

Section 2. That, this Council desires to create a new position, pursuant to Article II, Section 2.14 of the Charter of the City of Napoleon, entitled "Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Technician/Senior Technician" for the City of Napoleon, Ohio.

Section 3. That, said position is hereby created and established in and for the City for the Napoleon and shall be considered a non-bargaining, full time regular employee having an hourly, non-exempt status. The Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Technician/Senior Technician shall not be entitled to any longevity pay.

Section 4. That, the pay rate for the Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Technician/Senior Technician shall be set by the Position Classification Pay Plan for the employees of the City of Napoleon, Ohio, based on an eighty (80) hour pay period and shall be effective January 1, 2023.

Section 5. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 6. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 7. That, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for proper payment of wages to employees, proper payment being essential to the harmony of the necessary workforce; therefore, provided the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. #### **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON,** OHIO:

Section 1. That, notwithstanding any Ordinance or Resolution to the contrary, the City of Napoleon, Ohio had previously established a new 2022 Position Classification Pay Plan for its non-bargaining employees, Ordinance No. 053-21 passed by Council on December 20, 2021.

Section 2. That, this Council desires to create a new position, pursuant to Article II, Section 2.14 of the Charter of the City of Napoleon, entitled "Assistant Chief of Police" for the City of Napoleon, Ohio.

Section 3. That, said position is hereby created and established in and for the City of Napoleon and shall be considered a non-bargaining, full time regular employee having a salary, exempt status. WHEREAS, in order to provide a more feasible, economical, and expedited method of bidding procedures, it is deemed necessary to give to the above mentioned Department Directors authority to bid such projects, services, equipment, materials, or supplies without the necessity of continued legislation; Now Therefore,

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, the City Manager, City Finance Director, and City Law Director, for their respective departments, subject to Council's approval as to the specifications, plans, agreements, and other related bid documents when applicable, are hereby authorized to advertise and receive bids or take proposals as applicable for the projects, services, equipment, materials, or supplies that are anticipated to be in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) as listed in attached Exhibit "A," (such exhibit being incorporated into this Resolution by attachment and made a part hereof), without the necessity of further legislation in the year 2023; further, Council finds that the expenditure of funds in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for each project, service, equipment, material, or supply listed in said Exhibit "A," is necessary and authorized, subject to an approved motion of Council permitting the respective Department Director to make award. If a contract for said project, service, equipment, material, or supply is awarded to a successful bidder (lowest and best) as a result of a competitive bid, the City Manager, City Finance Director, and City Law Director, for their respective departments, are directed to enter into a contract with the awardee subject to the terms and conditions of an agreement approved by Council, said agreement subject to any non-material changes deemed appropriate by the respective Department Director and approved as to form and correctness by the City Law Director. In the case of a non-competitive bid, the City Manager, City Finance Director, and City Law Director, for their respective departments, are directed to enter into a contract with the awarded subject to the terms and conditions of an agreement approved by Council, said agreement subject to any non-material changes deemed appropriate by the respective Department Director and approved as to form and correctness by the City Law Director.

Section 2. That, Council reserves the right, by motion of Council, to approve for award, direct no award, reject all or some bids, or rebid, when deemed in the best interest of the City as it relates to the projects identified in Section 1 of this Resolution; moreover, Council may waive any informalities in the bidding process.

Section 3. That, Chapters 105 and 106 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio, shall continue to be applicable to any projects, services, equipment, materials, or supplies listed in attached Exhibit "A;" moreover, nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as limiting the Department Directors in making purchases or contracting for services in any manner as provided for in said Chapters, statutory law or as otherwise provided by Council. WHEREAS, the City each year has reoccurring costs associated with the conducting of business with groups or associations established for or on behalf of the political subdivisions or instrumentalities of the State, which annually exceed fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000); and,

**WHEREAS**, the City each year has reoccurring costs associated with the conducting of business, many which result in mandatory payments or merely occurs as a result of the method of accounting utilized by the City's Finance Department; and,

WHEREAS, for convenience and efficiency, purchase orders are annually written to vendors by multiple departments of the City with a combined total that exceeds fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000); Now Therefore,

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, the expenditure of funds by the City in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), in and for the year 2023, is hereby necessary and authorized as a proper public expenditure, subject to appropriation of funds, for purchases, services, coverage, or benefits listed in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

Section 2. That, the expenditure of funds by the City in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), in and for the year 2023, is hereby necessary and authorized as a proper public expenditure, subject to appropriation of funds, for the following purchases associated with recreation, fund balance maintenance, public labor costs, public auditing, utilities, bonding, accounting, the payment of debt service, postal service, banking, permitting, and codification listed in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

Section 3. That, the expenditure of funds in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) is hereby necessary and authorized as a proper public expenditure, subject to appropriation of funds, for the City's cumulative purchase of product, supply, equipment and/or services periodically through the year 2023 from the following vendors; however, in no event shall the amount exceed fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for any one purchase of product, supply, equipment and/or services or any one specific project under the authority of this Resolution listed in Exhibit "C" attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

Section 4. That, due to nature or uniqueness of the transactions or vending listed in Sections 1, 2 and 3 of this Resolution, except for the prohibition in Section 3 regarding the one time purchase over fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), any requirement that may exist for competitive bidding is hereby eliminated in the best interest of the City.

Section 5. That, nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as to eliminate the necessity of quality based selection as it relates to architect, engineer or construction services for any one project that would otherwise require such a selection process, as such elimination of quality based selection would

require separate Council action; moreover, nothing in this Resolution shall be construed as to eliminate the restriction found in Section 3 of this Resolution as it relates to a single purchase or project expenditures.

Section 6. 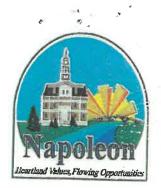

## A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A CONTRIBUTION TO THE COMMUNITY IMPROVEMENT CORPORATION OF HENRY COUNTY, OHIO, IN AND FOR THE YEAR 2023; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

**WHEREAS**, the City, by Ordinance in accordance with Section 1724.10 of the Ohio Revised Code, designated The Community Improvement Corporation of Henry County, Ohio ("CIC") as the agency of the City for the industrial, commercial, distribution, and research development of the City; and,

WHEREAS, a "Plan" as defined in Section 165.01 of the Revised Code was prepared and confirmed to advance, encourage, and promote the industrial, commercial, distribution, and research development of the City in a manner which among several things, creates and preserves jobs and employment opportunities in the City and the State and improves the economic welfare of the people of the City and of the State; and further, encourages and causes the maintenance, location, relocation, expansion, modernization, and equipment of sites, buildings, structures, and appurtenant facilities for industrial, commercial, distribution, and research activities within the City and thereby preserves, maintains, or creates additional opportunities for employment within the City; and,

WHEREAS, this Council desires to further advance the Plan and has determined to financially assist the CIC with operational and the other expenses in the year 2023; Now Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, in an effort to further advance the "Plan" referenced in the preamble of this Resolution, the City Finance Director is directed and authorized to pay to The Community Improvement Corporation of Henry County, Ohio ("CIC") the amount of forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) in and for the year 2023 to the CIC for operational expenses and costs for the advancement of economic development projects for both present companies and future companies. The amounts contributed herein are deemed by this Council to be a proper public expenditure of public funds.

Section 2. That, the monies contributed as found in Section 1 of this Resolution shall be used for operational expenses and to advance the "Plan" as referenced in the preamble of this Resolution and shall not be pledged to secure any debt of the CIC.

Section 3. That, all payments stated in this Resolution are subject to appropriation of funds by Council. In the event appropriation of funds by Council is satisfied, payment shall be made by the Finance Director in quarterly installments to the CIC, all in and for the year 2023.

Section 4. That, Resolution Number 058-21 is repealed upon the effective date of this Resolution.

Section 5. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 6. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Resolution, then the provisions of this Resolution shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Resolution is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Resolution or any part thereof.

Section 7. That, this Resolution is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for economic projects to timely move forward; projects that will create jobs; therefore, provided it receives the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law.

## A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE FINANCE DIRECTOR TO TRANSFER CERTAIN FUND BALANCES FROM RESPECTIVE FUNDS TO OTHER FUNDS PER SECTION 5705.14 ORC ON AN AS NEEDED BASIS IN FISCAL YEAR 2023, LISTED IN EXHIBIT A; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

**WHEREAS,** the City is a charter municipality having those powers of self government as stated in Article I of its Charter; and,

**WHEREAS**, in order to provide Fund Balances for approved expenditures in certain funds on an as needed basis, it is necessary to transfer funds from respective funds to other funds; **Now Therefore**,

## BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, pursuant to Section 5705.14 of the ORC and this Resolution, the Finance Director is hereby authorized and directed to transfer monies among the various funds on an as needed basis in Fiscal Year 2023 as listed in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution.

Section 2. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of the City of Napoleon, Ohio.

Section 3. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Resolution, then the provisions of this Resolution shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Resolution is found to be invalid for any reason, only that portion shall be held invalid and the remainder shall remain valid.

Section 4. That, this Resolution is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to assure the prompt and efficient conduct of the municipal operations related to public peace, health or safety of the City; therefore, provided it receives the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for proper payment of expenses, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

## **ORDINANCE NO. 075-22**

## AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE ALLOCATION OF FUNDS AS FOUND IN SECTIONS 193.11 AND 194.013 OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

# BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, Section 193.11 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio, shall be amended and enacted as follows:

## "193.11 ALLOCATION OF FUNDS.

(a) Effective January 1, 2023, the funds collected under the provisions of this chapter shall be deposited in the "General Fund equivalent" of the City for municipal income taxes and shall be disbursed in the following order:

(1) Such part thereof as shall be necessary to defray all costs of collecting this tax and all costs of administering and enforcing the provisions of this chapter and the rules and regulations adopted by Council in connection therewith.

(2) Not more than sixty-five percent (65%) of the net available tax receipts received annually may be used to defray operating expenses of the City.

(3) At least thirty-five percent (35%) of the net available tax receipts received annually shall be set aside and used for capital improvements including, but not limited to, development and construction of storm sewers and street improvements; for public buildings, parks, and playgrounds; and for equipment necessary for the Police, Fire, Street, Traffic, and Safety Departments.

(b) Effective January 1, 2024 and thereafter, the funds collected under the provisions of this chapter shall be deposited in the "General Fund equivalent" of the City for municipal income taxes and shall be disbursed in the following order:

(1) Such part thereof as shall be necessary to defray all costs of collecting this tax and all costs of administering and enforcing the provisions of this chapter and the rules and regulations adopted by Council in connection therewith.

(2) Not more than sixty-five percent (65%) of the net available tax receipts received annually may be used to defray operating expenses of the City.

(3) At least thirty-five percent (35%) of the net available tax receipts received annually shall be set aside and used for capital improvements including, but not limited to, development and construction of storm sewers and street improvements; for public buildings, parks, and playgrounds; and for equipment necessary for the Police, Fire, Street, Traffic, and Safety Departments."

Section 2. That, Section 193.11 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio, as existed prior to the enactment of this Ordinance, is repealed effective December 31, 2022 at 11:59 PM.

Section 3. That, Section 194.013 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio, shall be amended and enacted as follows:

## "194.013 ALLOCATION OF FUNDS.

(A) Effective January 1, 2023, the funds collected under the provisions of this Chapter shall be deposited in the "General Fund equivalent" of the City for municipal income taxes and shall be disbursed in the following order:

(1) Such part thereof as shall be necessary to defray all costs of collecting this tax and all costs of administering and enforcing the provisions of this Chapter and the rules and regulations adopted by Council in connection therewith.

(2) Not more than sixty-five percent (65%) of the net available tax receipts received annually may be used to defray operating expenses of the City.

(3) At least thirty-five percent (35%) of the net available tax receipts received annually shall be set aside and used for capital improvements including, but not limited to, development and construction of storm sewers and street improvements; for public buildings, parks, and playgrounds; and for equipment necessary for the Police, Fire, Street, Traffic, and Safety Departments.

(4) One-hundred percent (100%) of the net available tax receipts received annually pursuant to Napoleon Ordinance 194.081 may be used to defray operating expenses incurred due to the provision of police and fire services.

(B) Effective January 1, 2024 and thereafter, the funds collected under the provisions of this chapter shall be deposited in the "General Fund equivalent" of the City for municipal income taxes and shall be disbursed in the following order:

(1) Such part thereof as shall be necessary to defray all costs of collecting this tax and all costs of administering and enforcing the provisions of this chapter and the rules and regulations adopted by Council in connection therewith.

(2) Not more than sixty-five percent (65%) of the net available tax receipts received annually may be used to defray operating expenses of the City.

(3) At least thirty-five percent (35%) of the net available tax receipts received annually shall be set aside and used for capital improvements including, but not limited to, development and construction of storm sewers and street improvements; for public buildings, parks, and playgrounds; and for equipment necessary for the Police, Fire, Street, Traffic, and Safety Departments.

(4) One-hundred percent (100%) of the net available tax receipts received annually pursuant to Napoleon Ordinance 194.081 may be used to defray operating expenses incurred due to the provision of police and fire services."

Section 4. That, Section 194.013 of the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio, as existed prior to the enactment of this Ordinance, is repealed effective December 31, 2023 at 11:59 PM.

Section 5. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 6. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. Further,

if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 7. That, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for passage before the deadline; moreover, this must timely take effect to meet the intent of the law; therefore, provided it receives the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for timely allocation of funds, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

AN ORDINANCE APPORTIONING THE EXPENSES INCURRED INCLUDING WAGES, SALARIES AND FRINGE BENEFITS OF THE MAYOR, COUNCIL, AND VARIOUS OTHER DEPARTMENTS OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON WHICH ARE NOT OTHERWISE DIRECTLY CHARGED TO SPECIAL AND/OR CAPITAL PROJECTS AMONG VARIOUS ACCOUNTS EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2023; AMENDING ORDINANCE NO.(S) 104-09, 087-19, 069-20, AND 059-21; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

# BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, the expenses incurred, including wages, salary and fringe benefits of the Mayor, City Council, and various departments within the City as found in Exhibit "A," that are not otherwise directly charged to special and/or capital projects, shall be apportioned among the funds using the direct reimbursement method as found in attached Exhibit A which is made part of this Ordinance.

Section 2. That, the City Finance Director is directed to adjust the affected funds (retroactive if necessary) effective January 1, 2023 to accomplish the intent of this Ordinance.

Further, if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 6. That, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for proper payment of wages to employees, proper payment being essential to the harmony of the necessary workforce; therefore, provided the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to commence the amendments in a timely manner which affects the public peace, health, and safety accessible to our citizens, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

# **ORDINANCE NO. 077-22**

# AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A NEW POSITION CLASSIFICATION PAY PLAN FOR EMPLOYEES OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO FOR THE YEAR 2023; REPEALING ORDINANCE NO. 053-21; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

**WHEREAS**, Council reviewed the proposed Year 2023 annual appropriation measure and finds, in general, as it relates to non-bargaining employees of the City of Napoleon, Ohio, that a compensation increase of three and one half percent (3.5%) is generally warranted subject to various considerations as contained herein; and,

WHEREAS, Exhibits A, B, and C attached hereto and incorporated herein, reflect pay scales for City of Napoleon non-bargaining employees. The pay scales noted in these Exhibits generally contain a three and one half percent (3.5%) pay increase from the 2022 pay scales; and,

**WHEREAS**, Council desires to make said compensation increases effective on the pay period commencing on or about December 26, 2022; and,

WHEREAS, Council now desires to adopt a new 2023 Classification Pay Plan for its non-bargaining employees as stated in this Ordinance and Exhibits A, B, and C; Now Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, notwithstanding any Ordinance or Resolution to the contrary, the City of Napoleon, Ohio, (the "City") had previously established a new 2022 Position Classification Pay Plan ("Pay Plan") for its non-bargaining employees, passed by Council on December 20, 2021.

Section 2. That, effective with the first pay period for the Year 2023, that commences on or about December 26, 2022, the pay scale (steps) for the City's non bargaining employees (full time) positions of this city shall be provided, unless modified, as established in Exhibit A, attached and incorporated herein. Subject to the provisions of the City's Personnel Code, the Employment Policy Manual as Amended 2014-1 (Ordinance No. 084-14), and Section 3 of this Ordinance, the Department Director or Appointing Authority may place any employee affected by this Ordinance at the level of compensation the Department Director or Appointing Authority deems appropriate as listed in Exhibit A.

Section 3. That, effective with the first pay period for the Year 2023, which commences on or about December 26, 2022, each non-bargaining employee (full time regular) (hourly), subject to Employment Policy Manual Policy §8.10 (Compensation Reviews), is eligible on such employee's annual hiring anniversary date of uninterrupted full time service with the City, to be advanced one (1) step in the Pay Plan until the maximum step is reached. The non-bargaining employee's (full time regular) (hourly) step location prior to advancement in the Pay Plan shall be determined by contrasting the base hourly rate said employee received prior to the enactment of this Ordinance with the table found in Exhibit A for the respective year. For new hires or current employees, the Department Director or Appointing Authority may place an employee within the scale where the Department Director or Appointing Authority deems appropriate considering

merit and fitness. Nothing in this Section shall be construed to prohibit a decrease in pay. Step increases for transfer employees shall be in accordance with §197.09(e) of the Personnel Code. A mere reclassification of a current position, where job duties are substantially the same, does not constitute a transfer.

Section 4. That, effective with the first pay period for the Year 2023, that commences on or about December 26, 2022, the pay scale for non-bargaining employee (salaried) (full time) positions of this City which are exempt under the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) as it relates to overtime, shall be provided, unless modified, as established in Exhibit B, attached and incorporated herein, (expressed in base biweekly salary amounts). Subject to the provisions of the City's Personnel Code, the Employment Policy Manual as Amended 2014-1 (Ordinance No. 084-14), and Section 5 of this Ordinance, the Department Director or Appointing Authority may place any employee affected by this Ordinance at the level the Department Director or Appointing Authority deems appropriate as listed in Exhibit B.

Section 5. That, effective with the first pay period for the Year 2023, that commences on or about December 26, 2022, each non bargaining employee (salaried) (full time) position of this City as defined in Section 4 of this Ordinance, is eligible to have a minimum salary increase of three and one half percent (3.5%) for Year 2023, subject to Employment Policy Manual "Policy §8.10 (Compensation Reviews)," calculated from what the employee is making at the time just prior to the proposed increase period, and as reflected in the amounts expressed in Exhibit B. In no event shall any increase place the employee above the top scale as established in Section 4 of this Ordinance. For new hires or current employees, the Department Director or Appointing Authority may place an employee, at any time, within the scale where the Department Director or Appointing Authority deems appropriate considering merit and fitness. Nothing in this Section shall be construed to prohibit a decrease in pay.

Section 6. That, effective with the first pay period of the Year 2023, that commences on or about December 26, 2022, the Pay Scale (steps) for part time, permanent part time, and temporary employees of this City shall be provided unless modified, as stated in the table found in Exhibit C (attached and incorporated herein), except when Federal or State minimum wage of a higher amount is required, then the higher amount of the Federal or State minimum wage shall apply. Subject to the provisions of the City's Personnel Code and Employment Policy Manual as Amended 2014-1 (Ordinance No. 084-14), the Department Director or Appointing Authority may place any employee affected by this Ordinance at the level the Department Director or Appointing Authority deems appropriate as listed in Exhibit C. Employment Policy Manual 2014-1, Policy Section 8.10, (compensation reviews), is applicable only to permanent part time employees, not part time or temporary employees.

Section 7. That, all paid part time, permanent part time, and temporary employees of the City shall, effective with the first pay period of the Year 2023, that commences on or about December 26, 2022, have a minimum hourly base pay increase of three and one half percent (3.5%) for Year 2023 calculated from what the employee's base rate was just prior to this proposed increase, and as is reflected in the amounts expressed in Exhibit C (the amounts include the three and one half percent (3.5%) increase). Only permanent part time employees are subject to Employment Policy Manual 2014-1 Policy §8.10 (compensation reviews), when applicable. For new hires or current employees of the City, the Appointing Authority or Department Director may

place an employee within the scale where the Appointing Authority or Department Director deems appropriate considering merit and fitness. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit a decrease in pay. The non-full time status positions found in Exhibit "C" (i.e. temporary part time or permanent part time) may be modified by the Appointing Authority or Department Director at any time, except that Council shall approve any modification to a full time status. Additionally, the position of Probation Officer PIIG Grant is hereby set as expressed in Exhibit C.

Section 8. That, compensation for employees' appointments made in order to fill temporarily vacant positions shall be at a rate established by the Department Director or Appointing Authority, except that it shall not exceed the top pay scale established in this Ordinance for the position being filled. Temporary positions being filled by temporary employees for whom no pay scale has been established shall be at a pay scale established by the Department Director or Appointing Authority by comparing the temporary position created to the most similar position established within the same department that is utilizing the temporary employee. In the event no such similar position exists, then it shall be paid in an amount as determined appropriate by the Department Director or Appointing Authority so long as the amount paid may be accomplished without exceeding the department's annual budget.

Section 9. That, notwithstanding any section of this Ordinance to the contrary, compensation of the Clerk of the Napoleon Municipal Court shall be as found in Section 4 of this Ordinance and as stated in Exhibit B unless otherwise set by the Municipal Court Judge pursuant to ORC §1901.31 (C).

Section 10. That, compensation for the Chief Deputy Clerk and all other Deputy Clerks of the Napoleon Municipal Court shall be as set by the Clerk of the Napoleon Municipal Court pursuant to ORC §1901.31and as stated in Exhibits A, B, and C.

Section 11. That, the compensation for Municipal Court Bailiff and/or Deputy Bailiff shall be established by the Municipal Court pursuant to ORC §1901.32 and as stated in Exhibits A, B, and C.

Section 12. That, all positions and/or classifications found in this Ordinance shall be deemed created, established, and existing in and for the City of Napoleon, Ohio. The status of part time employees may be further defined by the Department Director or Appointing Authority as permanent part time, temporary, seasonal, or intermittent employees without affecting the compensation status as stated in this Ordinance. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed as mandating that each and every position and/or classification be filled by this City.

Section 13. That, this Ordinance allows the terms and conditions of this pay increase to be retroactively applied, the same being hereby approved as it so exists.

Section 14. That, those employees who are covered by collective bargaining agreements shall be paid in accordance with the respective collective bargaining agreement.

Section 15. That, all compensation paid under this Ordinance is subject to appropriation of funds by Council.

Section 16. That, the Finance Director may adjust compensation for all affected employees to meet the intent of this Ordinance.

Section 17. That, all pay scales reflected in this Pay Plan shall be rounded, utilizing the five rule, to the nearest penny.

Section 18. That, no position mentioned in this Ordinance shall receive longevity benefit unless specified in this City's adopted longevity plan unless otherwise specifically provided for herein, or except as may be permitted by the City's longevity policy.

Section 19. That, any employee who is employed by the City in more than one position shall be paid overtime in accordance with State and Federal wage and salary laws (specifically, after forty hours of work within one week the person should receive overtime based on the salary or wage for the position they are working when they surpass forty hours for that work week). However, but for the employee's normal scheduled employment, the department that causes the overtime shall be liable for the payment of overtime regardless of where the hours where worked.

Section 20. That, Ordinance No. 053-21 is repealed in its entirety effective December 26, 2022.

Section 21. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 22. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 23. That, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for proper payment of wages to employees, proper payment being essential to the harmony of the necessary workforce; therefore, provided the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage; otherwise, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for proper processing of wages to employees, this being essential to the harmony of the necessary workforce, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 063-22**

# AN ORDINANCE APPROVING THE EXECUTION OF AN EFFICIENCY SMART SCHEDULE WITH AMERICAN MUNICIPAL POWER, INC.; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the City of Napoleon, Ohio ("Municipality") owns and operates an electric utility system for the sale of electric power and associated energy for the benefit of its citizens and taxpayers; and,

WHEREAS, American Municipal Power, Inc. ("AMP") is an Ohio nonprofit corporation, organized to own and operate facilities, or to provide otherwise, for the generation, transmission or distribution of electric power and energy, or any combination thereof, and to furnish technical services on a cooperative, nonprofit basis, for the mutual benefit of AMP members ("Members"), such Members, including Municipality, being, as of the date hereof, political subdivisions that operate, or whose members operate, municipal electric utility systems in Delaware, Indiana, Kentucky, Maryland, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia; and,

WHEREAS, AMP and Municipality have entered into a Master Services Agreement (MSA), AMP Contract No. C-11-2005-4440, pursuant to which AMP provides certain services to Municipality as set forth in various schedules to the Master Services Agreement (the "Schedules"); and,

WHEREAS, AMP and the Vermont Energy Investment Corporation ("VEIC") will enter or have entered into an agreement (the "ES Agreement") for the implementation of an energy efficiency program known as Efficiency Smart ("ES"), and to provide a program of energy efficiency services ("ES Services") designed to lower the total need for higher cost electric generation facilities or purchased power and thereby reduce Municipality's customers' bills, to be offered to AMP Members; and,

**WHEREAS,** AMP and Municipality desire to enter into a Schedule ("ES Schedule"), under the MSA, which provides that AMP will obtain and sell to Municipality, and Municipality will agree to take and pay for, a share of the ES Services which AMP will acquire through the ES Agreement; and,

WHEREAS, in furtherance of such purpose and in accordance with Resolution No. 064-13, passed unanimously by City Council on November 18, 2013, the Municipality entered into an Efficiency Smart Rebate Agreement with AMP; Now Therefore,

# BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:

Section 1. That, the Efficiency Smart Schedule between this Municipality and AMP, substantially in the form on file with the Clerk of Council, including Appendices thereto, is approved, and the City Manager is hereby authorized to execute and deliver such Schedule, with such changes as the City Manager may approve as neither inconsistent with this Resolution nor materially detrimental to the Municipality, the execution of the Efficiency Smart Schedule to be conclusive evidence of such approval.

Section 2. That, the City Manager is hereby authorized to take any action necessary for the Municipality to fulfill its obligations under the Efficiency Smart Schedule.

Section 3. That, the Efficiency Smart Schedule shall begin upon the effective date of 12:00 am, January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023, and remain effective until 11:59 pm, December 31, 2025, unless otherwise terminated per the provisions of the Schedule.

Section 4. That, it is found and determined that all formal actions of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon Ohio.

Section 5. That, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. Further, if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 6. That, if any section, subsection, paragraph, clause or provision or any part thereof of this Ordinance shall be finally adjudicated by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance shall be unaffected by such adjudication and all the remaining provisions of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect as though such section, subsection, paragraph, clause or provision or any part thereof so adjudicated to be invalid had not, to the extent of such invalidity, been included herein.

Section 7. That, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for timely administration of the rebate (s) necessary to assure public peace, health or safety; therefore, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law. Further, the Emergency Clause is necessary to continue the process in a timely manner which affects the public peace, health, and safety accessible to our citizens, and for further reasons as stated in the Preamble hereof.

**WHEREAS**, the Safety and Human Resources Committee met in a regular meeting held on September 26, 2022, and reviewed certain sections of the City Personnel Code, specifically Section 197.14(d)(8), Section 197.16(f)(1), and Section 197.14(d)(5), regarding suggested changes presented by City staff, and recommended that the City should adopt the amended Personnel Code; and,

**WHEREAS,** the amended language also appears in the City of Napoleon Employment Policy Manual, Policy 4.2 and Policy 4.4; and,

**WHEREAS**, City Council acknowledges that from time to time it must review the various codes and policies of the City of Napoleon; and,

**WHEREAS**, City Council now desires to amend the Personnel Code and the Employment Policy Manual of the City of Napoleon; and,

**WHEREAS,** Council desires to make said amendments effective beginning January 1, 2023; **Now Therefore,** 

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:** 

Section 1. That, the City of Napoleon does hereby amend Chapter 197, Section 197.14(d)(8) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Napoleon, Ohio as follows:

# **"197.14 Hours of Work and Compensation**

#### (d) <u>Compensatory Time</u>

#### (8) **Overtime – Basic Rate**

All work performed in excess of eight (8) continuous hours or in excess of the regular forty (40) hour work week, shall be overtime and shall be compensated at the rate of time and one half (1-1/2) times the employee's regular rate of pay, except as provided below. (The eight (8) continuous hours is subject to all nonbargaining employees, no pyramiding. Must be approved by Department Head.)"

Section 2. That, the City of Napoleon does hereby amend Chapter 197, Section 197.16(f)(3) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Napoleon, Ohio as follows:

# **"197.16 PAID LEAVES OF ABSENCE**

## (f) <u>Legal Holidays</u>

(1) Effects of Vacations and Days Off on City Observed Legal Holidays

When one (1) of the City observed legal holidays falls within an eligible employee's approved vacation period or scheduled day off, he/she shall be entitled to holiday pay for the legal holiday in lieu of his/her vacation pay. Those employees who work "shift work" may elect to receive the pay, to bank the holidays, or to bank the vacation day. Except for salary employees, shift work hourly employees who work on any of the herein City observed legal holidays listed shall have the option of electing one (1) of the following when applied for in writing by the employee to the payroll department prior to the next scheduled pay period following the holiday: (No Pyramiding)

Receive eight (8) hours holiday pay plus one and one-half (1-1/2) times their regular rate of pay for all time worked, except in the case of the Assistant Chief of the fire department position(s) which shall receive 11.2 hours holiday pay plus one and one-half (1-1/2) times his/her regular rate of pay for all time worked.

Receive an additional banked holiday (to be taken off prior to the ending of the next to last full pay period of the current fiscal year) plus receive one and one-half (1-1/2) times their regular rate of pay for all time worked. If the additional banked holiday is not taken off by the end of the next to last full pay period of the year it shall be paid in cash for eight (8) hours at straight time (except for the positions of Assistant Chief of the fire/rescue department which shall be 11.2 hours) rate payable the first pay in December of the current fiscal year."

Section 3. That, the City of Napoleon does hereby amend Policy 4.4 of the City of Napoleon Employment Policy Manual as follows:

# "Policy 4.4 Effects of Time Off on Ability to Earn Overtime Pay

Overtime is controlled by the Personnel Code §197.14, and is computed on work performed excess of a regular forty (40) hour work week eight (8) continuous hours per day or in excess of a regular forty (40) hour work week, except fire and rescue. For all nonbargaining hourly employees, including fire and rescue personnel, time actually worked does not include leave of any type paid leave. When a Police Lieutenant is forced to work as a contracted Police Officer, then he/she shall be paid per Article 25.1 of the Police Union Contract. A Department Head may require an employee to return to work on any particular day to work over and above the standard work schedule without the necessity of paying the overtime rate, so long as the above formula for overtime is followed. (No Pyramiding)"

Section 4. That, the City of Napoleon does hereby amend Chapter 197, Section 197.14(d)(5) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Napoleon, Ohio as follows:

# "197.14 Hours of Work and Compensation

- (d) <u>Compensatory Time</u>
- (5) Minimum Call-out Time

Except as provided in the Section below entitled "Court Appearance Time", when an employee is required to and does report back to work at a time not contiguous to his regular scheduled work shift, he/she shall be guaranteed a minimum of one (1) three (3) hours pay. However, additional callouts during any one (1) three (3) hour callout period will not result in additional guaranteed one (1) three (3) hour minimum pay (no pyramiding)."

Section 6. That, this Ordinance hereby amends Ordinance No.(s) 048-14, 035-22, and 050-22 so as to incorporate and adopt all identified changes noted herein, commencing January 1, 2023. The remaining, unchanged portions of Ordinance No.(s) 048-14, 035-22, and 050-22 remain in full force and effect as they existed prior to the changes.

Section 7. That, any changes needed to pages, page numbers, or appendixes are hereby approved to accommodate for the above amendments.

Section 8. That, it is found and determined that all formal action of this City Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in open meetings of this City Council, and that all deliberations of this City Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal actions were in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 21.22 of the Ohio Revised Code and the Codified Ordinances of Napoleon, Ohio.

Section 9. That, unless otherwise stated, if any other prior Ordinance or Resolution is found to be in conflict with this Ordinance, then the provisions of this Ordinance shall prevail. **WHEREAS,** Council now desires to amend Ordinance No. 053-21 to amend the pay scale for the position of Municipal Court Bailiff; and,

**WHEREAS**, Exhibit B, attached hereto and incorporated herein, reflects the amendment to be made; and

WHEREAS, Council desires to make said compensation amendments effective on the pay period starting on or about January 1, 2023; Now Therefore,

# **BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NAPOLEON, OHIO:**

Section 1. That, notwithstanding any Ordinance or Resolution to the contrary, the City of Napoleon, Ohio, (the "City") had previously established a new 2022 Position Classification Pay Plan ("Pay Plan") for its non-bargaining employees, passed by Council on December 20, 2021.

Section 2. That, effective with the pay period for the Year 2022, that commences on or about January 1, 2023, the amendments as listed in Exhibit "B" shall be in effect.

Section 3. That, this Ordinance allows the terms and conditions of this pay Ordinance to be retroactively applied, the same being hereby approved as it so exists.

Section 4. That, the position of Municipal Court Bailiff as established in and for the City for the Napoleon Municipal Court shall be considered a full time regular employee having a salary, exempt status. Further, if any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or any part thereof.

Section 8. That, this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety of the City and its inhabitants, and for the further reason that this legislation must be in effect at the earliest possible time to allow for proper payment of wages to employees, proper payment being essential to the harmony of the necessary workforce; therefore, provided the required number of votes for passage as emergency legislation, it shall be in full force and effect at the earliest time permitted by law.

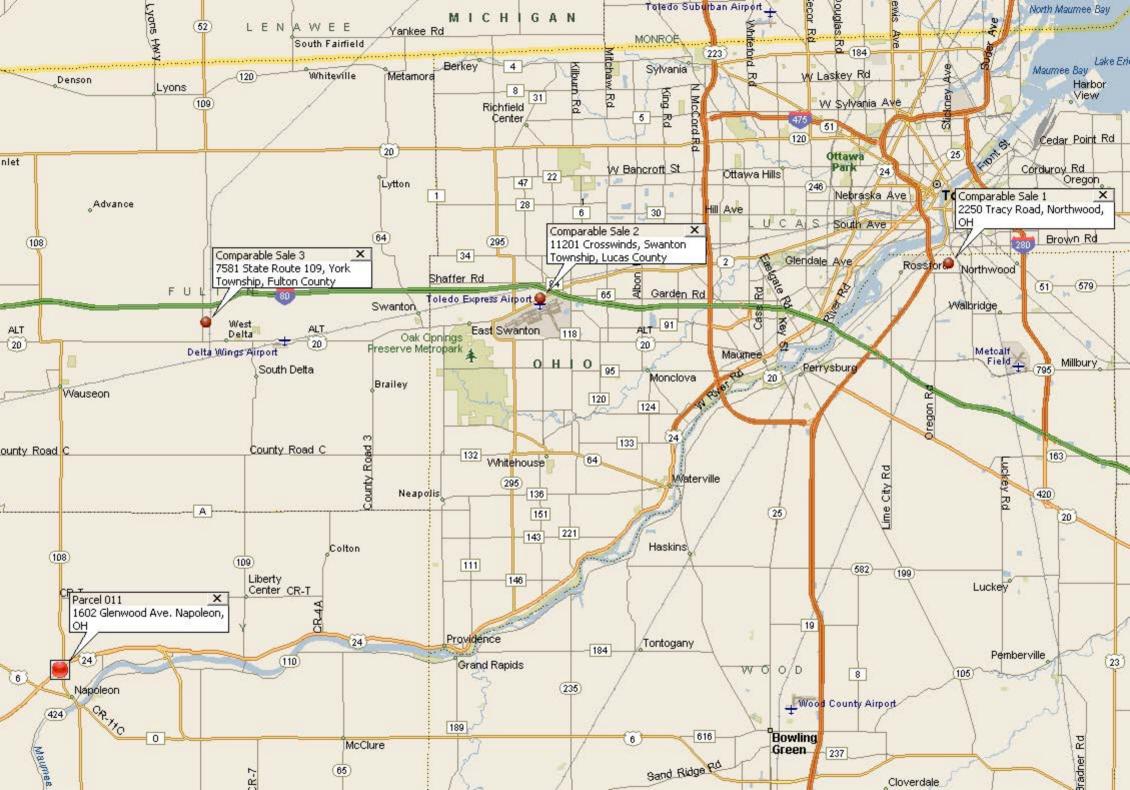
