Finance and accounting webinar covers how Moody's rates municipal bonds

Energy markets update

The January 2018 natural gas contract decreased \$0.031/MMBtu to close at \$2.684 yesterday. The EIA reported a withdrawal of 69 Bcf for the week ending Dec. 8. Market consensus for this week was a withdrawal of 63 Bcf. For comparison this week last year was a withdrawal of 147 Bcf. Gas in storage now stands at 3,626 Bcf. This is 1 percent under the five-year average of 3,653 Bcf.

On-peak power prices for 2018 at AD Hub closed yesterday at \$34.45/MWh which was \$.81/MWh lower for the week.

Legislative Bulletin

December 15, 2017

OML UPDATE AT-A-GLANCE

Here are the top three things you need to know from this past week:

- On behalf of 22 of their members, the Regional Income Tax Agency (RITA), filed suit Monday against the state over the centralized collection of municipal net profit language and the Home Rule violations via HB 49, the recently passed two-year state operating budget. This challenge is in addition to the existing lawsuit filed by 137 municipalities in November.
- The Cuyahoga County Court of Common Please ruled last Thursday in favor of several municipalities, including Cleveland, in their challenge of constitutional violations included in SB 331, from the last General Assembly, on the subject of small cell wireless infrastructure. The court agreed with the challenge that the inclusion of the language to the Petland bill violated the single-subject rule.
- Infrastructure: The nation has roughly 1 million miles of pipes, many of which were laid in the early to mid-20th century. Those pipes have a typical lifespan of 75 to 100 years.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY FINISHES WORK FOR 2017

Wednesday was the last day for the Ohio General Assembly to hold committee hearings and voting sessions for the year. It has been a busy first half of the 132nd GA legislative session, as our members will attest. The League will not produce a legislative bulletin next week as activity around Capital Square grinds to a halt until the legislature returns to Columbus in mid-January. We will have a final year-end legislative bulletin the last week of December, as a recap of 2017.

From all of our staff and our families, we wish everyone a safe and enjoyable holiday and a bright new year!

SERP AMENDMENT NOT ADDED TO HB 69

As those who have been following our special bulletins this week will know, we are pleased to share that the Senate Ways and Means committee followed the advice of our municipal officials from around the state and did not include an amendment to HB69 exempting Supplemental Executive Retirement Plans (SERPs), along with other non-

qualified defined benefit plans including non-statutory stock options and restricted stocks, from municipal income tax. The language was also retroactive to Jan. 1, 2016, meaning municipalities would have had to pay two years' worth of refunds out of 2018 municipal budgets with funding that does not exist. A copy of the amendment that was to be offered can be found **HERE** along with a letter the League sent to members of the General Assembly **HERE** outlining concerns our members have with the proposal.

The League wants to extend our thanks to both the local leaders who reached out to legislators and to the members of the General Assembly who recognized the significant blow the amendment would have to already fragile municipal revenues and encouraged their fellow legislators to support rescinding the language.

As a reminder, this is the second attempt by some influential special interests who are motivated to see language like this inserted into legislation that is on track for passage. The first attempt was on the Senate floor last year in late November during the Lame Duck session. Like the language that was proposed this week, time had not been afforded for the language to be properly vetted by all parties impacted by the proposal, including municipalities, and would have resulted in harmful consequences (both intended and unintended) to municipal governments and taxpayers alike. We are hopeful that as the legislature continues to pursue the exclusion of SERP income from the municipal definition of a pension, that there will be more opportunity to review what the courts ruled and how that effects municipal ordinances statewide.

With that being said, we fully expect legislative language will be proposed next year to address this issue. We ask that our members remain vigilant on the subject with their legislative delegation. The legislature is listening and values the input from their local leaders who will be directly impacted by any changes made.

There were four amendments that did make it into HB 69 which cover a range of local issues. They were:

- \$80 million in "transition funds" to counties in relation to the loss of the Medicaid MCO sales tax revenue. The money, which is in addition to the budget's allocation of \$207 million in transition funds, will be taken from the budget's "unclaimed funds".
- a change that clarifies HB 49 language on local sales tax levies by allowing for increments of 0.1 mills as well as 0.25 mills;
- a streamlined procedure for including retail enterprises in enterprise zones;
- the elimination of a requirement that local governments have to get certifications from county auditors when seeking additional property tax revenue.

We will keep our members aware of any new developments on this issue when the legislature returns to the Statehouse early next year.

AUDITOR'S FINANCIAL HEALTH INDICATORS SHOW MORE CITIES IN FISCAL STRESS

This week, State Auditor David Yost held a press conference to share data collected from the recently developed Financial Health Indicator (FHI) system for 2016. The FHI, which was unveiled by the Auditor's office a year ago January, exists to help cities and

counties recognize, fix or prevent fiscal stress. Using 17 factors to conduct what the auditor terms a "fiscal physical", the system is meant to be used as a tool for cities and counties to address fiscal challenges. New changes to the online reporting system enable users to more easily search by population size and geographic location.

According to the FHI, 9 cities are showing signs of financial stress in 2016 that also showed fiscal stress in 2015. Indicators point to six other cities which could be two or three years from experiencing fiscal stress as well. As Auditor Yost explained, the signs of fiscal stress are often a result of financial factors that are beyond the cities' control - not the result of mismanagement.

The FHI also indicates 111 of the 247 cities being tracked show more cautionary or even critical indicators than they did in 2015. It's worth noting that a change in how pension liabilities should be reported could have apparently caused a false negative for some cities in 1 to 3 indicators.

COMMITTEE RECAP: MUNICIPAL BILLS OF INTEREST

In a flurry to give bills additional attention before the new year and before the brief legislative calendar next year due to the election year, there was a significant amount of legislative activity this week. Below are the bills that impact municipalities which received committee hearings that you should be aware of:

- HB 371 PROPERTY TAX. Sponsored by Rep. Merrin (R Monclova Township), the bill would exempt from property taxation the increased value of land subdivided for residential development until construction commences or the land is sold. During its fifth hearing before the House Ways and Means committee, the bill was amended to put a 10-year cap on the exemptions. The amendment also clarifies that the frozen property value is based on what county auditors deem "fair market value" and not CAUV, and it changes how the bill describes unexempted value versus ascribed value. It clarifies the bill language should not be implemented counter to normal appraisal methods and adds a technical amendment from LSC. Even with these amendments, the bill still preempts municipalities and would cost local governments revenue, so the League remains opposed to this legislation.
- HB 298 SICK DAYS. Sponsored by Rep. Merrin (R Monclova Township), the bill would make changes with respect to the number of sick days provided to public employees. In sponsor testimony, Rep. Merrin shared with committee members that his legislation would grant state and local employees equity and save taxpayer dollars. As this legislation would preempt current municipal administrative practices and local decisions, the League opposes the bill.
- HB 343 PROPERTY VALUES. Sponsored by Rep. Merrin (R Monclova Township), the bill would require local governments that contest property values to formally pass an authorizing resolution for each contest and to notify property owners. During its fifth hearing before the House Ways and Means committee, the bill was amended to establish standard requirements for the ownership of parcels versus individual parcels. It also allows notices to be sent either through certified or regular mail and clarifies that if an owner is misidentified in a complaint then it can't be dismissed. The amendment also clarifies that municipal complaints need

- the approval of the city council. Due to the unnecessary burden this bill would place upon municipal legislative bodies, the bill is opposed by the League.
- HB 415 ROAD IMPROVEMENT. Sponsored by Rep. Greenspan (R Westlake) and Rep. Ryan (R Granville), the bill would allocate one-half of any surplus revenue to a new Local Government Road Improvement Fund, from which money will be distributed directly to local governments to fund road improvements. During its second hearing before the House State and Local Government committee, proponents of the bill spoke to local government's need for more funding for road maintenance and improvement. The League supports this bill.
- SB 61 PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION. Sponsored by Sen. Skindell (D Lakewood), the bill increases General Revenue Fund dollars for the current fiscal year by \$5 million and increases public transportation funding to \$25 million for FY 2018 and 2019. During its first hearing in the Senate Transportation, Commerce and Workforce committee, Sen. Skindell cited a 2015 Ohio Statewide Transit Study that concluded Ohio needs to double public transportation services by 2025 or the state would not be able to keep up with demand. The League supports this bill.
- HB 281 BROADBAND EXPANSION. Sponsored by Rep. Carfagna (R Genoa Township), the bill would establish the residential broadband expansion program within the Development Services Agency to award matching grants for last mile broadband expansion in municipal corporations and townships and to make an appropriation. During its third hearing in the House Finance committee, the bill was amended to offer interested local governments more funding options and eliminates the funding ratio requirements. It also reduces the speed of internet that must be available for an area to be considered under served. The League supports this bill, and provided joint written testimony with the Ohio Township Association, which you can read HERE.
- HB 378 BROADBAND GRANTS. Sponsored by Rep. Smith (R Bidwell) and Rep. Cera (D Bellaire), the bill would create the Ohio Broadband Development Grant Program and to make an appropriation. During its second hearing before the House Finance Committee, proponents along with the Ohio Municipal League and the Ohio Township Association, testified in support of the bill. You can read the joint testimony HERE.
- SB 180 FIREARM LAWS. Sponsored by Sen Uecker (R Miami Township) and Sen. Hottinger (R Newark), the bill assigns to the prosecution the burden of disproving a self-defense or related claim, expands the locations where a person has no duty to retreat before using force under both civil and criminal law, and modifies the Concealed Handgun Licensing Law regarding a licensee's duty to keep the licensee's hands in plain sight, the penalties for illegally carrying a concealed firearm or improperly handling firearms in a motor vehicle, and the posting of warning signs regarding the possession of weapons on specified premises. During its third hearing before the Senate Judiciary committee, both proponents and opponents testified on the bill. The League remains neutral on this legislation.
- AM HB 3 DATAOHIO. Sponsored by Rep. Duffey (R Worthington), this bill
 would create the DataOhio Board, specify requirements for posting public records
 online, require the Auditor of State to adopt rules regarding a uniform accounting
 system for public offices, establish an online catalog of public data at
 data.Ohio.gov, and establish the Local Government Information Exchange Grant

Program. The bill had been amended in an earlier committee hearing to remove a \$10 million appropriation from the bill. During its third hearing in the House Finance committee, the bill was voted out of committee. The League, though disappointed with the removal of the appropriation, is a supporter of this bill.

- HB 276 UTILITY WORKERS. Sponsored by Rep. Rezabek (R Clayton) and Rep. Greenspan (R Westlake), the bill would expand the offense of aggravated menacing to prohibit threatening a utility worker with intent to obstruct the operation of a utility. During its third hearing in the House Criminal Justice committee, the bill was amended to add language dealing with the use of deadly weapons, to remove the provision enhancing the offense to a fourth-degree felony menacing and to provide other definitions for clarity. As some municipalities employ utility workers, the League is in support of this bill.
- HB 392 APIARY DAMAGES. Sponsored by Rep. Stein (D Norwalk), the bill would grant specified apiary owners immunity in personal injury or property damage cases. During its third hearing in the House Economic Development, Commerce and Labor committee, the bill's opponents testified against a special exemption for beekeepers and questioned the necessity of the bill. The League believes there are better ways to address concerns that may be associated with this issue and has had conversations with the bill sponsor. At this time the League is neutral on this bill.
- HB 164 ROOFING CONTRACTORS. Sponsored by Rep. Patton (R Strongsville), the bill would require commercial roofing contractors to have a license. During its third hearing in the House Economic Development, Commerce and Labor committee, opponents of the bill argued against the necessity of licensure. The League is neutral on this legislation.
- HB 142 CONCEALED WEAPONS. Sponsored by Rep. Wiggam (R Wooster) and Rep. Holmes (D McDonald), the bill would modify the requirement that a concealed handgun licensee notify a law enforcement officer that the licensee is carrying a concealed handgun when stopped. During sponsor testimony before the Senate Government and Oversight Reform committee, Rep. Wiggam explained his bill updates current law, which says that not informing a police officer that you have your handgun with you is a misdemeanor of the first degree. The League Is neutral on this bill.
- HB 269 WORKERS COMPENSATION. Sponsored by Rep. Henne (R Clayton), the bill would rename the entities who carry out workers' compensation functions in this state, require the Administrator of Worker Safety and Rehabilitation to develop incentives for employers to participate in safety consultations and loss prevention programs, require an employee who is receiving temporary total disability compensation to comply with a return to work plan, and make changes with respect to compensation for permanent total disability and death benefits. During its third hearing in the House Insurance Committee, business groups spoke in opposition to the legislation. The League is neutral on the bill.
- SB 6 BRIDGE PROGRAM. Sponsored by Sen. Hoagland (R Mingo Junction), the bill would extend the Ohio Bridge Partnership Program through the end of fiscal year 2019 and require the Director of Transportation to submit a report to the Governor, Senate, and House of Representatives recommending ways to continue to fund the program. The bill, according to Sen. Hoagland's sponsor testimony, would simply extend the existing program. The bill was amended to

make failure to display a front license plate a secondary offense. The League is in support of the bill and neutral on the amendment.

GREATER OHIO UNVEILS CAPITAL BUDGET "ASKS"

The OML is happy to announce our support for several important initiatives the Greater Ohio Policy Center (GOPC) is pursuing through the 2019-2020 Capital Budget. As we have been sharing with our members in previous bulletins, every biennium, the state legislature passes a Capital Budget bill that earmarks funds for eligible community projects, including projects related to infrastructure and community develop programs. The Capital Budget bill for years 2019 and 2020 will be introduced early next year.

In addition to the founding of two new grant programs as a way to financially assist Ohio's local communities, the Center is asking for a 25% funding match from the state starting in FY 2020.

GOPC is proposing two new grant programs, entitled the "Quality Places, Quality Jobs" grant and the "Clean Ohio 2.0" grant. The first proposal would fund projects aimed at catalyzing revitalization in smaller, distressed Ohio cities. The second, "Clean Ohio 2.0", would be aimed at brownfield cleanup and redevelopment. The request being made is for a 25% match, or \$12 million each, which includes the creation of advisory councils made of relevant state agencies, representatives from nonprofit organizations and industry groups - all appointed by the Governor. The newly created council would choose which projects would be funded by the grants.

Both of these programs would be a significant boost to support local efforts to retain current jobs and attract new economic development opportunities statewide, while providing crucial financial assistance to Ohio's smaller distressed communities.

The League will be working hard to support these measures and we hope our members will see the same value in these investment opportunities for the state.

OML UPDATE AT-A-GLANCE: CHRISTMAS EDITION

Ready for the Christmas season? How well-versed are you in Christmas trivia? Let's find out!

- Did you know America has Ohio to thank its introduction to the candy cane? It's true! While the candy cane was invented in 1670 by a German choirmaster, Americans didn't know about the candy until a German immigrant named August Imgard decorated the tree in his home in Wooster, Ohio with candy canes in 1847.
- Despite the introduction to the candy cane, Ohio did not make Christmas a legal holiday for another ten years: the holiday was legally recognized by Ohio in 1857.
- While the classic Christmas movie "A Christmas Story" was based in small-town Indiana, the movie's famous Parker family house is actually in Cleveland! Fans can visit the house and the nearby museum for a behind-the-scenes movie experience.

COURTS RULE ON MUNICIPAL CASES

While the Legislature has left the Statehouse in anticipation of the upcoming holidays, the courts have been kept busy. Two separate rulings on cases impacting municipalities occurred last week. Here's what happened:

SUPREME COURT RULING FAVORS MUNICIPALITIES IN RED LIGHT TRAFFIC CASE

On Wednesday of last week, the Ohio Supreme Court sent both Toledo and Springfield's cases involving traffic cameras back to the trial courts. Both cases are based on SB 342 of the 131st General Assembly, which regulated how red-light and speed cameras could be operated within municipal jurisdictions. Both *Toledo v. State* and *Springfield v. State* have been sent back to the Lucas and Clark County Courts of Common Pleas, after the Supreme Court vacated the

decisions made in both cases by the Sixth and Second District Court of Appeals rulings.

The Second District ruled in *Springfield* against the city in favor of the state in August 2015. The following August, the Sixth District ruled in favor of Toledo. The Supreme Court accepted the appeals of both cases, but decided to stay each case pending the ruling of *Dayton v. State*. Last summer, the *Dayton* ruling struck down the bill's requirement to have a police officer at working traffic cameras as an unconstitutional breach of local control. Other provisions that were ruled unconstitutional include the state prohibiting fines for those driving less than 10 mph over the speed limit in most areas, and the requirement that cities conduct both safety studies and public-information campaigns prior to issuing civil citations. These provisions, as the court ruled, were clear violations of Home Rule.

In remanding both cases back to the trial courts, the Supreme Court has also instructed that the common pleas judges apply the *Dayton* ruling to each case. Their decision also includes an Attorney General appeal, which accuses the Sixth District court of violating the separation of powers in blocking the Legislature's provision withholding Local Government Funds (LGF) from municipalities that operate traffic cameras outside SB 342's provisions.

This decision is a victory not only for those municipalities, but for Home Rule authority across the state. The League is glad to see the courts recognize the importance of local control and hopes the state continues to recognize the rights of cities and villages to make the best decisions for their communities on a local level.

COURTS UPHOLD MUNICIPAL HIRING AUTHORITY

Thursday of last week, the Eight District Court of Appeals ruled in favor of Cleveland, upholding the city's right to require the contractors working big government jobs to hire local workers.

The law, known as the "Fannie Lewis" law, mandates that projects costing \$10,000 or more within the city's jurisdiction must have 20% of its work done by city residents. The city filed its suit this past August, right before HB 180 of the 131st General Assembly would have taken effect. HB 180 had a provision banning local hiring quotas for public construction contracts.

According to the court's decision, the ruling was based on a city's constitutional power of local self-government under Home Rule. It is unclear yet whether or not the Attorney General's office will appeal the court's ruling to the Ohio Supreme Court. Meanwhile, the League is glad to see the courts continue to honor and uphold municipalities' constitution right to Home Rule.
