The Napoleon City Police Department Officers have proudly served the residents of Napoleon since the early 1900's and we continue this function to the best of our abilities. Our members feel that our greatest assets in the community is the citizens we serve, and they work in partnership with all people to solve the issues that affect our public safety.

I am a firmly committed to partnerships with other local leaders, organizations and agencies to better understand the needs of the community so that we can develop solutions that not only work for today's problems, but the problems of tomorrow as well. Through this commitment, and partnerships with other local, state and federal law enforcement agencies, we are taking a proactive approach to law enforcement, knowing that these partnerships are vital to our success. Our Department has 21 members. The Chief, 3 Lieutenants, 2 Detectives, 10 Patrol Officers, and 5 Dispatchers. Biography of Chief David J. Mack

Chief Mack received his Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice in 1995 from The Defiance College. He began his career in 1996 as a patrolman with the Napoleon Police Department, after serving as an Auxiliary Officer with the Department. Mack was then promoted to the Detective Bureau in 2000. After 4 years, Chief Mack was promoted to a Lieutenant and assumed supervision of 3rd shift patrol. In 2000 he became an instructor at the Northwest State Community College Law Enforcement Academy. Instructing in numerous areas of study, he assisted in training many future Ohio Police Officers. Chief Mack was then assigned to Administrative Lieutenant in 2011 where he took over administrative duties and supervision of the Dispatch and Records Offices. In May of 2013 Chief Mack accepted the position of Commander of the Academy. His duties include verifying that all cadets meet the standards set for by the college and the Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission which are required for graduation and certification as a Police Officer in the State of Ohio. He supervises the instructors and verify that their credentials are current and in proper order. He was finally Promoted to Chief of Police in 2017.

Chief Mack is also trained as an Instructor in the following disciplines: OPOTA Academy, Blue Courage, Firearms, Excited Delirium, CIT (Crisis Intervention Team) and ALICE. He is the supervisor for the Tactical Team, is a Board Member of the Criminal Justice Advisory Board for Four County Joint Vocational School and a Board Member of Recovery Services.

During his career Chief Mack has earned two (2) Life Saving Awards, two (2) Chief's Citation 1st Class Awards, a Meritorious Service Award and Officer of the Year Award.

In his free time Chief Mack coaches for Napoleon High School football team. He is the varsity offensive line coach and assists the defensive line coaches which he has done since 2003.

Hiring and retention of hired officers is a major focus of Chief Mack's. In the last year, many changes have occurred in the rules of our hiring and the requirements to be hired, all with the support of City Council and Napoleon's Civil Service Committee.

The police department has joined hundreds of small, medium and large departments across the country in their efforts to recruit officers by the use of technology and other resources. The police department made changes to his physical fitness standards to enable testing to be done year around indoors or outdoors. We also became a member of the National Testing Network which allows candidates to test electronically from all across the country. Looking forward into 2019, efforts will be made to begin the process of restructuring the department, announcing specialized assignments, developing a K-9 program again, which has been dormant for many years and to develop an SRO partnership with the local school district.

In 2018 the department did hire 2 new patrol officers and 1 dispatcher. We ended the year with 2 vacancies that remained unfilled due to a retirement.

The Napoleon Police Auxiliary aids the City of Napoleon in many aspects. They have assisted with security at multiple school events; such as sporting events, concerts and plays. They have maintained traffic control for all parades and special events in the City; such as the Rib Fest and the Henry County Fair. DEPARTMENT HISTORY







Shafer, Rudolph, Thomas, Kessler, Decker, Stiles, Stevens, Klug

In 2018, Chief David Mack began researching the department's history, in an effort to highlight some of the forgotten stories and history of the department. The Henry **County Historical Society** provided information describing the department all the way back to 1901. It was learned that from 1901 to 1942 there were nine Marshals: George Jalim, Frank Hiser, Ed Yeager, J.M. Barton, F. Frepple, H.L. Dehmart, Sherm Edwards, Ross Liddle, and Homer Kessler. In 1942 Napoleon promoted their first Chief of Police.

Chief Mack learned that the Chief of Police was Homer Kessler from 1942-1950. For 19 yrs., from 1951-1970, Dwight Decker was the Chief and Christ Klug as acting Chief between Kessler's and Decker's appointments. Richard Rudolph was the Chief of Police from 1970-1985 for a total of 15 yrs. George Schmidt was promoted to Chief serving for 13 yrs from 1985 to 1998. Prior to Chief Mack becoming the 5thChief of Police in the department's history in 2017, he proudly served for Chief Robert Weitzel, who was the longest standing Chief of Police in the departments history. Chief Weitzel retired in 2017 after serving 19 yrs. as Chief which was the post he was promoted to in 1998.

FALLEN OFFICER

NAPOLEON POLICE OFFICER CLARK TEEPLE

In November of 2018, our office was contacted by Rick Geppert, who is a retired Police Officer with the Oakmont Police Department in Pennsylvania. Rick is a volunteer Investigator/Secretary for the Law Enforcement Officers Memorial of Allegheny County in Pittsburgh.

Rick and his son (Rocky) have discovered 161 fallen officers in the State of Pennsylvania over the last 10 years. After a recent move to Ohio, Rick began to search for fallen officers in Ohio. His search resulted in finding Officer Clark Teeple. After some further investigation by Police Chief Mack, the following has been submitted and added to the Officer Down Memorial Page. An application has also been submitted to the National Law Enforcement Memorial Office in the hopes of having Officer Teeple's name added to the Memorial Wall.

Police Officer Clark Teeple was struck by a vehicle while performing a traffic stop at the intersection of Perry Street and Front Street.

At approximately 7:30 pm, Officer Teeple had initiated a traffic stop for a missing headlight. After speaking to the driver he was attempting to walk around the vehicle when he was struck by another vehicle. He was rushed to Memorial Hospital where he died shortly after arrival.

As the driver of the vehicle provided aid to Officer Teeple the man who was pulled over for the traffic violation fled the scene and was never apprehended. The driver who struck Officer Teeple was a Fish and Game Warden and a close friend of Officer Teeple.

Police Officer Teeple served with the Napoleon Police Department for 10 years. He was survived by his wife.

NAPOLEON POLICE TRAINING

Annually, the State of Ohio Attorney General's Office releases requirements for each Law Enforcement Agency regarding Continued Professional Training (CPT). Additionally, updates or "catch-up" training requirements are released occasionally and are currently taught in the Police Academy.

This year there were no CPT requirements, but our Department Officers completed all mandated training to reflect what is currently taught in Ohio Police Academies.

Each year our Officers have re-certification training that they are required to complete. Most of these are firearms or defensive tool training, such as Taser, OC (Pepper) spray, and ASP (Baton).

In July, Officer David Steward completed 40 hrs of training with the International Police Mountain Bike Association sponsored at the Sylvania Police Department.



The dispatch center put in a combined 232 hrs of training in Emergency Medical Dispatching. The training included 5 Dispatchers and 2 Patrol Officers who are also dispatch certified. All new dispatchers will also receive EMD as part of their training.

The Ohio Collaborative, a 12-person panel of law enforcement experts and community leaders from throughout the state, established state standards for the first time in Ohio's history on August 28, 2015, for use of force including use of deadly force and agency employee recruitment and hiring that can help guide law enforcement agencies in Ohio. These new standards will hold everyone accountable and instill a greater confidence with the public. The Collaborative works closely with partners, including the community and law enforcement agencies, to implement the new standards

The City of Napoleon Police Department received its Final Certification under the Ohio Collaborative Community-Police Advisory Board on October 5, 2016. Collaborative Standards include, Use of Force/Deadly Force, Recruitment and Hiring, Community Engagement, Telecommunicator Training and Bias Free Policing. The Collaborative periodically determines new standards that Certified Departments implement to insure continued certification. ANNUAL BIAS BASED POLICING REPORT

The following Report includes two (2) official complaints on Officers by Citizens and 1 official complaint on a Dispatcher by Department Personnel. One of the complaints on an officer involved a claim of misconduct in response to a Records Request and was exonerated; the other involved an officer accused of being rude to an intoxicated female on a call, who was found to be reasonable in his response. The Complaint on the Dispatcher involved a "No Call No Show for Duty" and resulted in the resignation of the employee.


There were three incidents of employees being written up for being Late for Duty.

During 2018 there were a small number of incidents that citizens complained about Officer Conduct to a Supervisor or other City Official and "did not wish to file an official complaint" or "did not wish to get anyone in trouble". These incidents were handled at the Supervisor Level and various coaching techniques were utilized. This lead to a process change to document this coaching, which is still in its beginning stages.

The Napoleon Police Department serves and protects the City of Napoleon and its almost 9,000 residents.

In 2018 the Department handled a total of 15,302 calls for service, compared to 13,003 in 2017.

This is a 17% increase in calls for service.







Grant Awards

Replacement of police radios and enhancing them to the new standard, with grant funding and state capital budget moneys was secured with significant assistance from the Henry County EMA. This resulted in a significant savings to the City of Napoleon of an approximate amount of \$156,000.

We applied for and were awarded funds from two different grants to replace ballistic and tactical vests reducing our costs to about 25% of their total cost.

With a partnership with Henry County Commissioners, we were able to update and purchase radios for our Auxiliary Officers at a 0% interest rate for 10yrs.

PUBLIC RELATIONS & COMMUNITY POLICING

The department was involved in 114 public relation events at outside businesses such as the Henry County Hospital, Napoleon Area Schools and local factories. Some of these involvements included providing training on topics like Active Shooter, ALICE Training & Threat Response

When Chief Mack took over as Police Chief last year, one of his goals was to have more community outreach for the department. Chief Mack commented, "Instead of just having an officer drive around the school, we're trying to get inside the schools more, greet the kids, give them a fist bump as they come in or whatever, let them see us as we're there to help."



In our efforts to further protect the safety of our community our Instructors taught numerous sessions of ALICE (Alert, Lock down, Inform, Counter and Evacuate) at the area schools as well as at Henry County Hospital.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

In September, which is Suicide Awareness and Prevention Month, the Four County Suicide Prevention Coalition hosted its Stomp the Stigma campaign. The Napoleon Police Department supported this effort by displaying pairs of shoes, which represented a portion of suicides in Henry, Defiance, Fulton and Williams Counties.













This year officers handled 332 accident calls, an 8% decrease from 2017. 137 accidents reported were on private property and 195 on public roadways. 25 injuries were reported and 64 citations issued.



COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

Staffed by five full-time employees; along with handling all incoming phone calls for service and dispatching appropriate resources to the call, dispatchers also handle all after hours calls for the city utilities. This year over 20,000 phone calls were handled. Dispatchers also fill requests for records and conduct local background checks, this year filling over 900 requests.

DETECTIVE DIVISION

As of 2018 The City Napoleon Detective Division currently consists of one Lieutenant as the direct supervisor to a primary Detective and a Narcotics Detective that is currently assigned to the Multi Area Narcotics Unit. The primary Detective is tasked with the investigation, review and follow- ups to all reported felony crimes. On a daily basis every complaint that is filed with the Napoleon Police Department is reviewed by the primary Detective and if requested, follow-ups will be conducted other cases as well.

The Detective Division investigated or assisted with investigation in over 290 cases. These numbers are not to represent a total call volume for the entire Police Dept. but are instead estimated call numbers for one division. The cases will be broken down into four criminal categories. Other calls for service such as miscellaneous information reports, assist other departments, and death scenes investigations have also been included in the estimated call volume.

- Crimes Against Persons
- Property Crimes/Fraud
- Narcotics
- Special Assignments



Crimes against Persons:

The Detective Division was involved with in over thirty (30) complaints. Some examples of this would be Aggravated Assault, Kidnapping, Gross Sexual Imposition, Sexual Imposition, Pandering Sexually Oriented Material Involving a Minor, etc.... Out of the general sex complaints there were three (3) Rapes and seventeen (17) sex complaints investigated through the division. The Division assisted with or directly investigated five (5) Domestic Violence complaints and four (4) Aggravated Menacing. Two (2) Abduction complaints were investigated as well.

Property Crimes/Fraud:

The Division was involved with over seventy (70) complaints. Twenty-eight (28) Breaking and Entering's and Burglaries. The Division was involved with Thirty-four (34) felony thefts and Two (2) Receiving Stolen Property complaints were looked into. One (1) Fraud, ten Forgeries, and one (1) Auto theft were completed through the Bureau. Four (4) Robberies have also been investigated.

Narcotics:

The Detective Division investigates or coordinates the investigation of narcotic complaints. Department. The Narcotics Detective has worked closely with ATF, BCI, Ohio State Highway Patrol, Air National Guard, and Henry County K9 Deputies. The Multi-Area Narcotics Agent investigates narcotic overdose incidents of which four (4) were fatal. The Multi-Area Narcotics Agent assisted in the lengthy investigations in March 2018 of the death of two (2) individuals at the Bowling Alley and Aggravated Robbery of Speedway in August 2018. The Multi-Area Narcotics Agent was directly involved in the apprehension of an escapee from Putnam County Jail and murder suspect from Paulding County.

Multi-Area Narcotic Unit Statistics:

- Investigated or coordinated the investigation of over sixty-eight (68) complaints
- Henry County had 37 Indictments from 31 cases handled by county and city agents
- There were 18 Overdose Calls for Service handled by our agents and 11 Fatal Overdose Deaths Investigated
 - o Locally eleven (11) overdose incidents were investigated with four (4) being fatal
- Detective Augustine had the 2nd highest Lead Investigator Statistics
- Total Cases handled by the Unit in 2016 was 416, 2017 it was 438 and in 2018 they investigated 576 cases.
- Detective Augustine had 71 Case Involvements in 2018 and 123 Total Involvements
 - o Eleven (11) Narcotics trafficking complaints
 - o Twenty-two (22) Search Warrants

Special Assignments:

The City of Napoleon Detective conducted background checks of potential new hires for the City of Napoleon. Other responsibilities include the tracking of Pawn Slips and comparing them to theft complaints and Public Relation requests.

The Division is responsible for Municipal Court, Henry County Common Pleas Court, and Henry County Juvenile Court documents to be delivered and prepared for each court date. Regarding the responsibilities for the Henry County Common Pleas Court, this Division is responsible for all charged felony offenses to be prepared and reviewed with the County Prosecutor for Grand Jury. The Detective is responsible for any follow up needed by the County Prosecutor or City Prosecutor when it comes to charged offenses.

The Division is responsible for any evidence that is taken during an investigation whether it is an Officer or Detective that has seized the items. When testing of any type is needed, the Division transports the evidence to the Bowling Green BCI and brings back anything that has been completed. Any polygraph examinations needed are conducted at BCI of Bowling Green and are scheduled and attended by the Detective. The Division works with Administration in being responsible for the documentation and logging of all evidence and or found property.
